## From the Minister

Dear Friends:

Religious Education as defined by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) has been evolving for quite some time. “Lifespan Religious Education” is the term more recently used in our materials – but what does it mean?

Recently five of us from FPUU participated in a workshop hosted by the Mass Bay District (MBD) of the UUA led by Deborah Levering, Director of Faith Formation. In that workshop we wrestled with questions that I hadn’t thought as deeply about since seminary.

Collectively we realized that since we were fortunate to have our former religious educator, Jeanette Ruyle for more than a decade it has also been a long time since the congregation has reflected on the many proposed questions and ideas that were presented to us. Questions like: What should the goal of UU children’s religious education be? Should we be striving to develop adult UU’s? What should the structure of our Sunday time be? Should we have intergenerational services every Sunday? What trends involving lifespan religious education have developed in our churches across the U.S. and Canada? What amount of adult programming would our church like to support? No doubt you may have strong opinions one way or another when considering these questions.

On Saturday January 29<sup>th</sup> from noon until 4:00 p.m. Deborah Levering, Director of Faith Formation is coming to Medfield to facilitate a “Religious Education

Visioning” which requires your participation. We need everyone to attend in order to discern what is

important to us regarding religious education. This information will inform our future planning, i.e.; program development, financial and human resource allocation, and help to define our identity to the outside community. This workshop needs the input of everyone whether you have children or not, whether your children have come through our programs already or whether they are just beginning.

Strong religious education programs attract members and families to our church. What we offer and how we offer it is a matter of concern to every member of FPUU. Our support of religious education is articulated in both our third and fourth principles which state: (3<sup>rd</sup>) We affirm and promote: acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations. (4<sup>th</sup>) A free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

Creating the environment for these principles to be realized by every member is the responsibility of all of us. Please mark your calendars now for the 29<sup>th</sup>. I will ask that you sign up for this workshop as we need to ensure a discussion group size of fifty or more to cost justify this workshop which the district is providing at no cost to us.

## From the Director of Religious Education

### *Strong Language Will Be Used, Viewer Discretion is Advised*

Hello fellow UU's,  
I'm in the throes of preparations for Solstice, with an eye toward our Congregational Visioning session planned for late January. I'm still getting acquainted with many of you, and it occurred to me that I don't yet have a sense of where different people stand on the issue of strong language. Oh, I'm not talking about the four-letter kind, I'm talking about the kind that the religious right has taken hostage...the kind that, because of its use by the religious right still causes ruffled feathers in many UU congregations. I want to prepare you for this visioning session, because some of that language will be used.

Language like values, beliefs, religion, and faith formation for example. Many UU's bristle at the term "faith formation" in particular, because in the common usage of our day faith implies endorsement of particular beliefs in a particular formulation of God. Even renowned mythologist Joseph Campbell once said, "I don't have to have faith, I have experience."

In response to that concern, allow me to share some favorite quotes:

"Faith in reason is the trust that the ultimate natures of things lie together in a harmony which excludes mere arbitrariness...The faith in the order of nature which has made possible the growth of science is a particular example of a deeper faith...To experience this faith is to know that in being ourselves we are more than ourselves." ~Alfred North Whitehead, Mathematician and Philosopher

"Faith is...an inner quality that unfolds as we learn to trust our own deepest experience...No matter what we encounter in life, it is faith that enables us

to try again, to trust again, to love again." ~Sharon Salzberg, Buddhist Meditation Instructor

Isn't that what we would all like for our children? The ability for them to trust their inner voices? To try again after disappointment? To trust again after life's betrayals? To love again after loss? That is part of what we aim to cultivate in our Religious Education program, and not just for our children, but for our adults as well.

As we near the visioning session, I invite you to open your mind to other ways of hearing faith language. If there are terms that are particularly problematic for you, I invite you to meet with me for coffee and talk about the experiences that give rise to those terms. And lastly, most importantly, please stay at the table and listen for the deeper meaning, because when you disengage from the conversation, the fundamentalists win.

## From the Executive Board

### Dear First Parish Members and Friends:

The First Parish Unitarian-Universalist semi-annual meeting was held on December 5, 2010.

The Church finances and status of the wireless facility were discussed at length. Glen D'Abate, Treasurer, gave a complete report of Church expenses and income for this fiscal year and predicted a deficit of around \$25,000. The shortfall was the result of unbudgeted expenses for buildings repair, lower rental and fundraising income and, most significantly, by a delay in the anticipated start of the wireless facility. At the meeting, a "barn-raising" of \$25,000 was suggested.

The membership of First Parish has elected to maintain the vitality of the Church and spur long term health and growth. You have supported hiring a professional Director of Religious Education to work half time to maintain and grow the program. You have supported a professional Music Director to build the choir and music programs. You have supported the hiring of a 12 hour per week Administrator to improve Church communication and reduce the pressure on volunteer time. The Church is on a very positive path to grow the capacity, capability and offerings to attract new members.

The improved programs and inflation have raised expenses 14% since 2006. However, pledge income has not kept pace. The 2010 average pledge is \$1,691 with 67 pledge units, compared to 2005 when the average pledge was \$1,663 with 69 pledge units. Therefore, the 2010/2011 fiscal year pledge income budget is approximately the same as it was in 2005/2006.

Rental, fundraising, grants, etc. have had to increase from \$31,000 to \$48,000 (50%) to keep pace with rising expenses. For 2010/2011, the anticipated wireless facility startup was to bring in \$13,400. With the delays, however, the income will likely not start until next fiscal year.

The Church needs to take action to reduce the deficit. The Board does not recommend cutting expenses. We do not want to risk all the positive improvements on the foundation for growth. We want to work on increasing income. We are very optimistic on having the wireless facility income starting in the 2011/2012. We are working to increase other rental income including plans for a Farmers Market. We will continue to search for other sources of income such as grants and other donations.

The Church has a \$25,000 hole to fill before the end of this Church year. A "bridge" to the 2011/2012 wireless income must be built. Accordingly, the Board is asking each Church member to participate in a "Bridge Building" campaign. If every member could bring forward a substantial (more than 25%) advance of their 2011/2012 pledge by March 1, 2011, the Church will then have the bridge it needs to finish 2010/2011. The startup of the wireless facility will make up for the diminished pledges for next year. With one wireless renter, the Church can balance the budget and begin setting aside a capital reserve for future large repairs. With two or more renters, the Church can plan on additional capital reserve funding, new capital projects, social action projects, improving programs, and starting a marketing campaign to grow Church membership.

We hope everyone will contribute. More details will be sent in January.

## News from the Social Action Committee

### "The Rising Tide of Elder Homelessness"

The First Parish Medfield Social Action Committee is pleased to announce that on **January 30, 2011** Hearth President and CEO Mark D. Hinderlie will speak on the organization's initiatives to end elder homelessness.

The faces of homelessness we see or hear about do not usually include images or stories of elderly persons who are homeless. Homeless elders, although increasing in numbers, continue to be a forgotten population.

Hearth is dedicated to the elimination of homelessness among the elderly through housing, outreach, and advocacy. Hearth was founded as *The Committee to End Elder Homelessness, Inc.* (CEEH) in 1991 by a group of seven professional women with diverse experience in housing, finance, health, and human services. They realized that elders were a growing percentage of the homeless population and that no one was expressly addressing the issue.

Mr. Hinderlie began his service to Hearth in 2006. His former positions include President and Executive Director of Federated Dorchester Neighborhood Houses, President of Hinderlie Associates, Chief Development Officer for Franciscan Children's Hospital and Rehabilitation Center, President of the Boston Children's Institute, Executive Director of Boston Children's Services, and Director of Development for Project Bread/The Walk for Hunger. Throughout the 1980s, Mr. Hinderlie held leadership positions with the United Way of Massachusetts Bay, the Community & Youth Services Division of the City of Cambridge, and the Community Learning Center. He graduated from Yale and holds a Masters Degree in Public Administration from Harvard's Kennedy School.

## January 26<sup>th</sup> Facilitated Bible Reading

First Parish offers a Facilitated Bible Reading with our minister, Bob McKetchnie once a month in the U-House. All meetings begin at 7:00 p.m. and run no later than 9:00 p.m. The class meets again on **Wednesday January 26<sup>th</sup>**.

## Annual Fund Drive 2011-2012

Our annual fund drive will kick off during the week of March 22 – 27 with the **Nurture Your Spirit Help Heal Our World** theme, with a fund drive event to be announced, and with the annual fund drive Sunday Service on March 27.

This year's Annual Fund Drive Committee welcomes two new Committee members, Mark Samels and Jeff Zarker, who will be joining Greg Beedy, Duncan Glover, and Marshal Sugarman. We are grateful for the expertise, new energy, and fresh ideas that Mark and Jeff bring to the Committee.

The Annual Fund Drive Committee is responsible for planning and conducting the annual fund drive each spring. Together with volunteer fund drive leaders, the Committee contacts every member and friend in the church to ask for a pledge. If you would like to participate, please contact any member of the Committee.

Our 2010-2011 budget is approximately \$150,000, with about 75% of funding realized through the generous financial pledges made by us during our annual fund drive. This year presents as a financial challenge in part due to increased expenses including the cost of the U-House roof replacement as well as a delay in the anticipated startup of cellular income from our T-Mobile contract. Over the next few months, the Committee will provide more information about First Parish finances so we all know why our pledges are important and how they work for us.

First Parish Medfield is blessed to have generous members and friends who understand that First Parish needs our financial support every year at the annual fund drive time, in addition to the many hours of volunteer work we contribute. Our collective generosity is evidenced by last year's annual fund drive, which increased by 9% from the previous year to approximately \$113,000.

Whether you value First Parish for the Sunday worship services, the religious education programs, the social events, the opportunity for social action, or because it is important to you to have a home for liberal religious thought in the Medfield area and in this country – or for all of the above reasons – your support is most important.
