Dear friends,

Welcome to the new Church year, from your new minister. Wait a minute, did you say "new minister." Aren't you the same guy we had last year, and the year before? Well, yes and no. As of August 16, by Ministry Agreement with your Governing Board, I am now "minister," and no longer "Interim Minister."

The interim ministry of First Parish officially concluded Aug. 15, 2018. That means the two-year interim period is completed and you no longer need an Interim Minister. There is no longer an interim process for that minister to lead. The specific interim responsibilities formerly in my

Ministry Agreement have been removed in the new version, except for assisting the Ministerial Search Committee. They have already begun the new round of Search for the new settled minister who will greet you this time next year. They plan to present a candidate for member approval next May, and my agreement ends on Aug. 15, 2019. The MSC has the same seven members as last year and is again chaired by Karen Wians and Shirley Riga.

While no longer in an interim period, FRUU is still in a transition period. I am pleased to be with this wonderful community for another year. My job is to help the Board and the Search Committee, who are already working on the most

effective ways to present the opportunity here to the ministers who will be "in Search" in early 2019. I am not a candidate for your settled pulpit and will not become one. I am also, by agreement and professional ethics, not to discuss specific individuals who are or may become candidates for your pulpit. That leaves me free to give the best advice I can.

Our first Sanctuary worship is Sept. 9 – Ingathering Sunday. We hope you will share our Water Communion for all ages. Bring some water;

bring some words of renewal or reflection; come ready in your heart to renew and reconnect your individual water and your individual self into our shared community.

We live every day headed into the future. It will be new, and it is most excellent to travel through this amazing universe in such good company.

Ingathering Sunday – Special Offering



Our Ingathering Service on Sept. 9 will include a Special Offering to replenish the Minister's Discretionary Fund. Last year we received more than \$500 in donations from generous members and friends.

The MDF meets pastoral needs that emerge suddenly. The funds are not part of the FPUU budget. They are kept in a separate account and disbursed directly by the minister. This makes the response quick and also maintains confidentiality about who receives aid. The minister is responsible

for record keeping and reconciliation for the annual audit.

Much of last year's Offering was used to help people attain or continue in permanent housing. MDF is also available to assist people who come to or call the church needing a tank of gas or a meal or help with heating oil.

Ingathering Sunday is a service that connects all of the giving and receiving that sustains our community. If you wish to donate on Sept. 9, please designate your checks to the MDF. Contributions to your Pledge are also welcome, of course. Please mark them "pledge," so the collectors can be clear.



Message from Your Executive Board



Your Executive Board met for it first official meeting in the 2018/2019 church year on Thursday, August 23rd. As you

The entire Executive Board (EB) was excited to get started on what proves to be an exciting, yet challenging, year for our congregation. An EB Retreat has be scheduled for early September to develop our strategy, including Ministerial Search, EB Goals and Congregation Growth.

The Ministerial Search Committee is meeting at the end of August to start the process of our search. We have contracted with Rev. Dave for at least one more year to help in our search and to be our minister. He is officially a "contract minister" and no longer our "Interim minister", therefore he is titled our "Minister". The EB will be discussing strategies for attracting the best ministerial candidates at its retreat and sharing those thoughts with the Search Committee shortly after.

Many of the Committees have met through the summer to start planning for the coming year. Building and Grounds is carrying the momentum started last year forward into this year. You may have noticed some upgrades to our vestry kitchen and some general clean-up around the grounds. David Russell, as the EB's liaison to B&G, and will work with Eve Potts, the B&G's chair, to continue


their splendid work. Please feel free to contact them, if you have any comments or suggestions.

A new Task Force has been formed to explore avenues of funding to help maintain "Medfield's Old Meeting House" as a site of historic importance to the town of Medfield and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Fritz Fleischman and Kay Bennett have agreed to be cochairs of the Task Force and are looking for others to help in this important effort. If successful in raising awareness and funds to maintain the Old Meeting House building, this would obviously ease the burden on our resources, freeing them up for other needs. This Task Force will be reporting to the EB once they have a plan to recommend.

year, location and directions.





a clarinet, but would welcome almost any instrument, even if we already have it (with the exception of the piano, where we are happily supplied with the only one we need).



Refreshments from Starbucks are served. Medfield TV films event and posts to Youtube.


Among Ourselves

As a member of First Parish UU in Medfield, Shirley Riga, recently opened a part-time office in Natick as a Spiritual Director.

Liz Budd Ellmann, MDiv, former Executive Director of Spiritual Directors International defines spiritual direction as a way to "explore a deeper relationship with the spiritual aspect of being human. Simply put, spiritual direction is helping people tell their sacred stories everyday. Spiritual direction has emerged in many contexts using language specific to particular cultural and spiritual traditions. Describing spiritual direction requires putting words to a process of fostering a transcendent experience that lies beyond all names and yet the experience longs to be articulated and made concrete in everyday living. It is easier to describe what spiritual direction does than what spiritual direction is. Our role is not to define spiritual direction, but to describe the experience. Spiritual direction helps us learn how to live in peace, with compassion, promoting justice, as humble servants of that which lies beyond all names."

It is of the utmost importance that we find balance and comfort in these challenging times in this world. Finding support and guidance within can enhance our ability to be more focused and calm. There are practiced tools easily learned to achieve these goals. I'd be happy to talk with you about any questions or inquiries. Bottom line - take care of yourself!

The mission of NewLife Furniture Bank of MA is to distribute "gently used" household goods at no cost to individuals and families who need help to rebuild their lives. Our clients come to us through referrals from social service and government agencies, as well as area clergy.

First Parish is scheduled to volunteer at NewLife Furniture Bank from 8:00 AM to Noon on Saturday morning September 22 (normally it's the third Saturday of the month, but due to Medfield Day we will volunteer at NewLife the 4th Saturday of September) at the warehouse in Walpole.

- 2. **Enter your email address:** (You will NOT need to register an account on VolunteerSpot)
- 3. **Sign up!** Choose your spots VolunteerSpot will send you an automated confirmation and reminders. The warehouse is located on Route 27 at the Walpole Station Business Center. The address is 102 Elm Street, Walpole. From Medfield, take Route 27 South towards Walpole. Just after passing under a railroad overpass, take a right into the warehouse parking lot. You will see three loading docks. Enter the door to the left of the loading docks. A NewLife volunteer should be waiting for you inside the warehouse on the first floor. The NewLife space for the stored furniture is on the fourth floor.

Annual Meeting Minutes May 20, 2018 First Parish Unitarian Universalist of Medfield Medfield, MA 02052

Meeting commenced at 11:52 p.m. A quorum was reached, 29 members signed in. Fritz Fleischmann as Chair called the meeting to order.

1. <u>State of the Church Report:</u> Fritz welcomed members of the congregation in attendance. Rev. David spoke briefly on the state of the church, reminded us to continue to agree with humility and disagree with restraint. He reiterated that he will be our minister for another year. He also pronounced the state of the church to be healthy and full of life. Then, Fritz referred to the annual report, minutes and various committee reports submitted to the congregation.

2. Reports:

<u>Approved</u>: After discussion, Fritz moved to accept and approve all annual reports as presented from the Minister, the Executive Board, various officers, standing committee chairs, and representatives of various Church organizations and the annual and semi-annual meeting minutes. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

3. Ministerial Search Committee:

Shirley and Karen spoke to the congregation on behalf of the Ministerial Search Committee (Chris Flaherty, Duncan Glover, Jessica Razza, Shirley Riga, Rebecca Stephenson, Karen Wians and Sarah Zitoli). They concluded that the listing of the minister's position at 2/3rds time did not seem attractive, and there were not enough candidates for a variety of reasons. The good news is that the committee worked extremely well together and have agreed to continue this coming year if asked to do so by the congregation. It is important to not repeat what did not work this year, and therefore the congregation needs to have a continuing discussion about how to revise our listing with the UUA Transitions report, most especially with respect to whether the minister would be 2/3rds or 3/4ths time. Fritz mentioned there will a thorough analysis continuing in to the Fall and a Special Meeting of the Congregation will be called to discuss and vote on this point.

<u>Approved</u>: After discussion, Fritz moved to extend by one year the formal Ministerial Search Committee in order to conduct a search process for a new Minister to begin serving on or about August 16, 2019, such Minister to be called and settled only by affirmative congregational vote as specified in the Bylaws. Don Rolph seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

<u>Approved</u>: Don made a motion to thank the members of the Search Committee for its diligent efforts this past year. Marshall seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

4. Nominating Committee Report:

a. <u>Executive Board elections:</u> Jen Bartle presented and moderated the process of electing the slate of officers for the Executive Board, to fill vacancies with nominees as follows:

Chair: Richard Mastronardi
Clerk: William Wians

At-Large: David Russell Darline Lewis

<u>Approved:</u> After discussion, Fritz moved to put the above names on a single slate. David Stephenson seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

<u>Further Approved</u>: After discussion, Fritz moved to accept and approve the slate. Don Rolph seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

b. <u>Election of the Nominating Committee</u>: Fritz then presented and moderated the process of electing the slate of officers for the Nominating Committee:

Chair: Jen Bartle, Vice Chair: Glen D'Abate

<u>Approved</u>: After discussion, Fritz moved to accept and approve the slate, Marshall Sugarman seconded, and the motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

5. Amendment to By-laws:

<u>Approved</u>: After discussion, Fritz moved to accept and approve a change to the existing Bylaws and Policies and Procedures as follows: the term "Communications Clerk" in the First Parish Unitarian Universalist Bylaws and related documents be changed, wheresoever it may appear, to the word "Clerk" including without limitation in the following Articles:

Article 4.4 entitled "Notice";
Article 5.4 entitled "Executive Board Officers";
Article 5.5 entitled "Term Continuity"; and
Article 6.1 entitled "Executive Board Meetings"."

David Stephenson seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

Budget for Fiscal Year 2019:

Nate Razza discussed basics of the proposed budget for next year as presented in the Annual Report. The proposed budget is very similar to last year's budget and shows a deficit. Pledges are coming in a bit slower this year than last. There have been several B&G issues that were costlier than anticipated, the UHouse porch had to be rebuilt and utilities have been subject to higher rates and a higher degree of usage due to frozen pipes in the vestry this winter. Expenses other than B&G are in line with the 2018 budget. Discussion ensued about the results of the last fiscal year and projections for FY19. We are expecting some increases in pledges but not enough to override the projected deficit.

Dan Bibel asked how long can the congregation continue to have a deficit budget? In the past few years, Nate indicated we have not had to dip into funds to solve our deficit problem, and that we have cured the deficit by fund raising and other activities, but that did not happen this year because of unusually high B&G costs. Don Rolph suggested the EB engage in an exercise to determine what it will take to have a balanced budget for FY 2020. Our budget will impact the charge to our search committee.

Fritz stated that inheriting the care of the church's historic building is difficult. He proposes we try to get larger community involvement in the building. The Gloucester UU church for example has set up an historic meeting house foundation. Katrin, Kay Bennett, Rich and Fritz will meet soon to start reviewing the feasibility of doing something similar. The front lawn serves as a public space, so the town should be in conversation with us about how to maintain it as well. This year the church is not increasing funds in capital reserves. If there is a major repair, the congregation will have to raise funds very quickly.

There was a consensus that the congregation needs to continue having these important conversations about its "business model". The EB also needs to look at fiscal issues in the entirety, not just consider how to sustain the building. Don Rolph suggested that the EB go through a set of activities to come up with a plan for a sustainable budget by 2020 for this church. Dan mentioned that the church continues to believe "tomorrow, things will be better". Perhaps there is some way to put the building into a trust, so townspeople could help maintain the building. There was also some discussion as to what might be other options, such as selling the property and moving the congregation elsewhere.

<u>Approved:</u> Dan moved that the EB appoint a committee to explore the potential formation of an overarching organization (such as but not limited to, a nonprofit foundation or trust) to own the Historic Meeting House, determine what grants might be available to it, review issues and concerns related thereto, and report its research results to the congregation in 12 months. Glen seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with all but 2 in favor and 2 opposed. No abstentions.

Rev. David then indicated that this committee and the congregation will need to think about how much control over the building they are willing to lose, which could change the church's polity. While it would be attractive to have a vehicle that could be potentially funded by grants etc., it is likely there would also be some negative consequences that need to be considered. A number of congregants commented on the positive upward trajectory of the church, including the reinvigorated children's program, the Chili Kick-off Cook-off and other events. David Stephenson mentioned engaging in a more aggressive outreach to new members. Others mentioned that perhaps we can do more with rental space, weddings and memorial services. The church's former treasurer reminded the congregation that the balance sheet is actually improving, we tended to outperform income projections and have fewer expenses than anticipated.

<u>Approved:</u> After discussion, Fritz moved to accept and approve the 2019 Budget as presented in the warrant with a deficit of \$16,723 as of today. Don seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

7. <u>Approved</u>: Fritz moved that the congregation take a vote of appreciation for Dawn Amaral in thanks for her hard work coordinating and tracking pledges over many years. Don Rolph seconded. The motion carried, accepted and adopted by the congregation, with no abstentions.

Margaret Rolph then presented flowers to Susan Stromgren who is retiring from the EB. Darline Lewis presented several gifts to Fritz Fleishmann, who is also retiring, with grateful appreciation from the EB for his leadership and many years of service and a standing ovation from the congregation.

There being no other business put forward by those present, Fritz moved to adjourn, and Marshall Sugarman seconded the motion. The Annual Meeting concluded at 1:20 PM. Respectfully submitted by Darline Lewis, Clerk on June 14, 2018.
