The Parson's Packet

Dear friends,

We have three cats at home, and two staircases – one at the front of the house and one at the back. We tromp up the front stairs and rattle around the second floor until one or more cats gets curious enough to follow, and then slip down the back stairs before they catch up. The result is the feline stampede we call "the running of the cats," as they dash through the house chasing each other. All concerned get a suitable amount of exercise.

The UUA Ministerial Search Process seems designed to be sure a similar purpose is

accomplished – all concerned get a suitable amount of exercise. Lots of running around is the methodology.

You will read elsewhere our Search Committee did not find a suitable candidate in the first round of Search, which ends March 29. They plan to enter the second round, which begins April 6. The Executive Board concurred, as noted in Fritz Fleischmann's report from the March 22 EB meeting.

The second round happens because both ministers and congregations have gone through the initial sorting and not everybody got a place. This is almost always a matching challenge, not a quality problem on the part of either ministers or congregations. The last several years at least, more ministers have been lining up – sometimes 20 or 25 – to try to secure the pulpit in a limited number of churches, just like everybody angling to get into Harvard. Small congregations draw less interest in the first rush – not for any intrinsic reason but just human nature.

Beginning April 9, several dozen ministers will get a second chance to indicate interest in First Parish. This is a good thing for you and there definitely will be qualified ministers in that group. It is the same sorting process but less of a "running of the ministers" than the first round. Your Search Committee has the same mandate – find us the best person for our needs and preferences. They will apply the same care and the same standard and they will not propose anybody who does not match up.

This is a challenge for FPUU, not a problem. There is a good minister out there.

Notes from the Executive Board



Dear Friends:

I would like to start this month's note with a reminder: <u>the</u>

date for this year's annual meeting will be May 20. That Sunday will be also be the day of our annual Coming of Age service, and I hope we'll have a strong turnout to congratulate our young people on reaching that milestone in their lives.

The newly organized Buildings and Grounds Committee, now under the leadership of Eve Potts, has initiated a variety of repairs around the place, a process that will continue through the rest of the church year (have you noticed that all the faucets in the rest rooms are working?). Eve has also taken two online courses on food safety to become our certified Food Manager – one of the requirements for having our kitchen permit renewed by the Medfield Board of Health. (Thank you, Eve!)

Requirements for church kitchens have become more stringent in recent years, in minor and major regards. Minor: you will notice new signs about washing hands; not so minor: we are supposed to have two separate sinks in the kitchen. This is not a new issue for us: a couple of years ago, an inquiry from a potential tenant (who could have added substantially to our rental income) came to naught when he learned that we have only one sink and no commercial dishwasher. Now that we find ourselves having to live up to legal requirements, it is time to plan for some overdue remodeling.

At the March 22 meeting of the Executive Board, we received an update from Rebecca Stephenson, chair of the Negotiating Committee of the Ministerial Search Committee, and we learned that no viable candidate has emerged from the first round of the UUA's search process. The Board then authorized the Search Committee to enter into the second round. In the system developed by the UUA Transitions office, these "rounds" are basically efforts at matchmaking: helping congregations find candidates that best meet their needs and match their profile. The quality of candidates in the second round is no different from the quality of those who already found a match in the first. Since there are twice as many candidates looking for settled ministries this year than congregations looking for ministers, we remain optimistic about our chances of finding the right minister for us. And we thank the Search Committee for its diligence and its ongoing hard work!

Among the interesting events coming up this month: April 15 is Commitment Sunday; April 22 will feature an Earth Day service organized by the Green Sanctuary Committee; at the Expresso Yourself Coffeehouse on April 30, a professional caller will lead you in some easy folk dances, to the music of our own Larger Circle band.

Kickoff Cookoff First Prize Chili Recipe!

Vegan Cincinnati Chili

Inspired by a richly flavored recipe made famous by Cincinnati's Skyline Chili, we developed this meatless version when our son David became a vegetarian. We use four or five different kinds of beans chosen for their variety of color. Avoid beans packed in "chili sauce", as these will distort the flavors added here. We think the best spices come from The Spice House (www.thespicehouse.com) in Chicago. Fresh peppers (bell, jalapeño, etc.) may be used instead of the canned variety. After years of browning the soy crumble and sautéing the onion stovetop before adding other ingredients, we've decided doing so isn't necessary. We now simply combine everything in a crockpot.

- 5 15 oz cans various beans: black, dark and light red kidney, pink, pinto, etc. (we use Goya)
- 12 oz Lightlife Smart Ground soy crumbles (frig section at market)
- 4 oz Old El Paso green chilies, chopped (or fresh chopped)
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 3 cloves chopped garlic
- 1 24 oz can crushed tomatoes (we prefer Tuttorosso)
- 3 Tbs jalapeño hot sauce
 1/2 square Baker's Unsweetened Dark Chocolate, finely grated
 1/2 tsp ground cloves
 1/2 tsp cinnamon
 1/2 Tbs ground cumin
 2 Tbs chili powder
 1/2 tsp red pepper flakes
 1 tsp salt
 1 Tbs Worcestershire sauce
 2 Tbs white vinegar

Empty 3 cans of the darkest beans with their packing liquid into crockpot. Reserve liquid from the remaining two cans; add beans to pot. Break up the soy crumble over the beans. Add chopped chilies, onion, garlic, tomatoes, hot sauce, chocolate, spices, salt, and Worcestershire sauce. Stir until ingredients are well blended. Set crockpot for desired cooking time (60-90 mins minimum); make sure beans are cooked through until tender. Stir occasionally. If chili becomes too thick, add some of the reserved liquid. Just before serving, stir in vinegar. In Ohio and the Midwest, chili is served over shaped pasta (macaroni, rotini) and topped with chopped onion, grated cheese, and a dollop of sour cream.

Memorial Service for Dr. Marshall Emanuel Deutsch April 28th

Very unfortunately, Marshall, who was the husband of Judy Deutsch, who served as First Parish called minister during the 90's, died on December 23 after having two strokes on December 6 and contracting a C-Diff infection and developing sepsis.

We had moved to New Mexico on June 28, living with our daughter and son-in-law while each couple was having a house built 150 ' across from each other. I moved into my (not our, as planned) on 2/21 and Pamina and Michael moved into theirs yesterday.

I love my house whose address is 1498 Sagebrush Drive, Corrales, NM 87048.

There will be a memorial service for Marshall 3:00pm, Saturday, April 28, at First Parish, Sudbury, 327 Concord Rd., Sudbury, MA 01776.

Some of you may want to attend.

Obituary

Dr. Marshall Emanuel Deutsch, 96, died on December 23. He was born in New York City, and recently moved to Corrales, NM, after 51 years in Sudbury, MA, and earlier times in New Jersey, Detroit, Michigan, and New York.

A graduate of DeWitt Clinton High School and the City College of New York, he served in the Army Air Forces in World War II (for which he was awarded an Air medal) and received his Ph.D. in physiological studies from New York University in 1951.

Marshall had a varied career, but considered himself primarily an inventor of diagnostic tests for medicine, and held 60 patents, including two patents that introduced a simplified automatic system of assay, later applied to home pregnancy tests and referred to in hundreds of subsequent patents by others.

An extremely witty person to the end, Marshall was a solver of difficult puzzles including The Nation's puns and anagrams puzzles and the NY Times diagramless ones, a folk dancer for more than 70 years, a linguist, a lover of Mozart operas, and, for more than 12 years, a columnist for, and editor of the Boston Mycological Society's Bulletin. He was a traveler to 25 countries (in part to work for the US Agency for International Development and the UN Capital Development Fund), the author of many scientific and non-scientific articles and letters, and especially proud of his letters in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Marshall produced and presented more than 200 radio shows on nutrition and science that were produced over WBAI and KPFA, and wrote articles on nutrition for The Realist. In 1955, he founded a Unitarian fellowship in Morristown, NJ, which still flourishes.

An American Association for the Advancement of Science Life Member, he also was a member of the International Network of Cholesterol Skeptics, which researched the impact of cholesterol and debunked the myth that cholesterol was bad — a myth that is finally losing credence.

Marshall believed in exercise and worked out on a stationary bicycle for an hour each day up to December 6th, the day before he suffered two strokes.

He is survived by Reverend Judith Deutsch, his beloved wife of 70 years, and their three adult children — Pamina Margret Deutsch of Corrales, NM, Dr. Ethan Amadeus Deutsch of Seattle, WA, and Dr. Freeman Deutsch of Cambridge, MA. — and his granddaughter Melina Baron Deutsch and his son-in-law, Dr. Michael Baron of Corrales, NM, and his daughter-in-law, Jessie Saacke of Cambridge, MA. Many other cherished relatives predeceased him, including his grandson, Jan Angel Santa Ana Deutsch.

He is beloved by his family and many others, and will be greatly missed.

A Memorial Service for Marshall will be held at 1 PM, Saturday, April 21, at the Unitarian Universalist Westside Congregation in Rio Rancho, NM. Another Service will be held on Saturday, April 28, at 3 PM at First Parish Church in Sudbury, MA. Marshall was a member of both congregations.
