### The Parson's Packet

Dear friends,

The interim transition is one congregational process that is supposed to come to an end. It is unlike most other elements of congregational life, which tend to wax and wane in intensity but flow on from year to year or even from decade to decade. The Interim Minister is supposed to arrive, help with the process, and then go away. That can be hard.

Well, did we get everything done? Did we accomplish everything this congregation wants to have in hand before your new settled minister

arrives? Probably not -- it is an unrealistic expectation to think such a thing would ever happen in a human community. The interim does have a two-year timetable and we work from a list and we do – and this is crucial – broadly agree on what steps are critical. Interim ministry is as much about agreeing on the steps, which are the expressed and implicit needs of the people, as it is about somehow getting them all sorted. Your local car dealer does not sell all the iron on the lot and then close up shop. Neither does a church.

Our "inventory," our stock-in-trade if you will, is people. People come and go. Our lives ebb and flow. Every one of us is different today than we were yesterday or will be tomorrow. As individuals, we present essentially the same needs over and over in different ways over a lifetime. As a group we live out together all those ways in the explicit circumstances of this time and this place, even as we know it can never be exactly the same for any of us.

The truly hard part of the interim process is parting from the people. But I believe, and your

Executive Board and the Interim Transition Team concur, that you have accomplished the things most needed in the current transition. It is as finished as it will ever get, ready to make growing room for the way you will be together going forward. You are ready. You deserve all the credit for this. You did the work. You reset the relationships, affirming what has sustained you and owning what needed to be renewed or revisioned.

### Notes from the Executive Board



Dear Friends:
As you saw from the article
by our Ministerial Search
Committee, they will not

present a ministerial candidate to our congregation at this time. The search committee has worked diligently to do what is right for First Parish, and we owe them thanks for their hard work: Shirley Riga and Karen Wians (co-chairs), Chris Flaherty, Duncan Glover, Jessica Razza, Rebecca Stephenson, and Sarah Zitoli. All seven are also committed to continuing their work for next year's search. Thank you, one and all!

The good news is that Rev. David Chandler has agreed to stay with us as a contract minister, subject to arrangements with the UUA Transitions Office. The Board has voted unanimously to appoint Rev. David to this position. We are grateful for his willingness to continue his valuable work with us and look forward to having him with us next year.

Many good things have happened at First Parish since I last wrote to you; let me just highlight two.

(1) The repair work initiated and overseen by the Buildings and Grounds Committee is continuing. You may have noticed that the large hole on the left side of the vestry entryway, which had been made to provide access to a frozen pipe last December, has now been closed up. Another visible improvement is coming up in the kitchen: Eve Potts and Susan Stromgren met with representatives from both the Medfield and the Massachusetts Board of Health to determine what renovations are needed there to meet all regulatory requirements. As a result, we will be installing a new counter with a triple sink (two for dishes,

- one for washing hands) as well as a new dish washer. This will not only assure our continued certification by the Board of Health, but also open up new opportunities for rentals. Thanks to all who are doing this important work!
- (2) In last year's annual report, I informed you about the project to digitize certain First Parish documents held by the Medfield Historical Society, and about our conversations with the MHS to resolve the ownership question. Earlier this month, the Congregational Library & Archives announced that their "New England's Hidden Histories" project (under whose auspices our documents are to be digitized) had received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. This means that funds are now available to proceed with our documents as well. I am happy to tell you that Board member Darline Lewis has collected our documents from the MHS, delivered them to the CLA in Boston, and drafted a carefully worded loan agreement with the CLA, which I have signed. You will hear more about this project in the future – it is a milestone not only for preserving our congregation's history, but also for future local collaborations to weave that history into Medfield's self-representation as a town with a rich and fascinating past. Thank you, Darline, for your dedicated effort!

Since this is the last newsletter column I am writing as your Board chair, I will take the

liberty to comment on two events in April in which I was personally involved.

- (1) The Earth Day service on April 22, led by the Green Sanctuary Committee, included some of our congregation's children in two short playlets, in which the adults pledged to protect the environment for coming generations. The adults attending the service also pledged to help the children with creating a garden at First Parish. It was a lively and moving example of an intergenerational service, and I hope we can have more of these in the future. (I was also asked by several people to share my closing words more widely, so you will find them elsewhere in this newsletter).
- (2) On April 28, the Expresso Yourself Coffeehouse featured our church band, The Larger Circle. Led by professional dance caller Jacob Bloom, our audience danced

into Spring with a variety of international dances from Eastern Europe, the Balkans, Israel, and Spain. For me, it was one of the highlights of this church year. Let me close, then, with the poem by Wendell Berry, after which we named our band:

We clasp the hands of those that go before us,
And the hands of those who come after us.
We enter the little circle of each other's arms
And the larger circle of lovers,
Whose hands are joined in a dance,
And the larger circle of all creatures,
Passing in and out of life,
Who move also in a dance,
To a music so subtle and vast that no ear hears it
Except in fragments.

## Closing Words on Earth Day 2018

The environmental degradation of the planet is the deciding issue of our age.

In this space of memory and hope, we have talked about the concept of "sanctuary" as shelter from the coming storms. Our commitment to the Green Sanctuary concept means that we commit to both prevention and adjustment – and that we invest in each other.

The details of our personal lives look insignificant when we look at the looming crises before us. But we need to start in our personal lives. All the values that we hold dear, that are expressed in the first six UU principles, are in jeopardy if the basis for living is eroded. Our imagination is challenged to envision the coming decades, in which the greenhouse gas emissions already in the atmosphere today will change the climate and the seasons, subverting the ways of abundance to which we have become accustomed. As individuals, we become easy prey to dystopian fears and fantasies; as a community, we can face reality together. To be any kind of sanctuary, we must be a "green" sanctuary – with and for each other.

## **Green Sanctuary Update**



Thank you everyone who participated or listened to the Green Sanctuary Committee Earth Day service. In our service, not only did we think about the big picture of why Earth Day was created in 1970 because of the concern about

the environment, we offered an action plan to First Parish that was actually started by the children of our congregation.

Last month, the children said they wanted a garden. The GS Committee felt it was our obligation to listen and help the children get their wish. And in our service, we made a covenant with them. A questionnaire went out to the congregation, resulting in enthusiastic responses. 80% of the respondents want a flower and vegetable garden; a few suggested native species.

Another suggestion was a hummingbird feeder (Marshall even offered to donate one). 18 adults offered to help with the children's garden. As Mary Corthell summed it up, "This is fantastic. Together we will create and maintain the garden." Your GS committee is honored to have facilitated this new activity at First Parish, and we are grateful to the children that they made their wishes clear.

# Ministerial Search Committee Update



Spring greetings (has it finally arrived?) from your Ministerial Search Committee! We have

important news to share with you.

As you may recall, the "first round" of the UUA search process ended in late March; we did not find a suitable ministerial candidate during the first round of the search.

Ministers and congregations that did not find a match during the "first round" could then select to enter the "second round". FPUU entered the second round, and April was a busy month of second round activities.

Unfortunately, we must report that our 2017-18 search process has concluded without a ministerial candidate to bring forward to the FPUU congregation. As disappointing as this is, we are confident that we conducted the search thoroughly and objectively.

Even as this year's search concludes, MSC members must observe strict confidentiality related to the number and/or nature of candidates and our related deliberations.

All of us on the MSC want to thank you for your continued support and patience throughout this search year. The Executive Board will update the congregation on future plans.
