Dear friends,

The snow is swirling and I hear the sleet scratching on the storm windows. Maybe I should go out and clear this mess – except it is far from over. Tonight whatever I don't clear, or falls afterward, will all freeze rock-hard.

This could be a classic New England metaphor for things going from bad to worse. On the other hand, I am not out on I-95. I sincerely hope you are not, either. And we get to watch the Patriots play for the Super Bowl. Both these remind us that human initiative can ameliorate bad

things and certainly helps very good things happen. Now that it actually feels like winter, we can properly grumble about the cold and snow, but we also get our proper moment to appreciate the deepness of the season. We are embraced in it.

My lesson from my first winter in Madison, Wisconsin – after growing up in suburban Philadelphia – was to let go of pretending that winter was not going to happen. That was and is easy in a coastal climate. Not so downwind of the Great Plains.

You have to get ready for it and you have to live through it. "Living through it" is not entirely a metaphor. One January a woman on the way to work fell before dawn on the sidewalk two blocks from my apartment and died of exposure before anyone found her.

Mostly we are fortunate to be spared such catastrophe in our lives. Still, there is a lot to be said for snow tires, gloves, hats and scarves, and making sure the furnace is functioning properly. And then there is the "mind of winter," as already mentioned in our Janus Service. It is good to have

a bit of attitude about it – bring it on, Frosty! And it is good to let it speak to us in only the ways cold and quiet and things larger than human activity can do.

Remember your church community is warm and welcoming, or at least willing to shiver a bit in company. We are busy in many ways. Some are for now, some are for the near future and some for later on. Spring beckons!

Notes from your Executive Board

Your Executive Board (EB) held its monthly meeting on Thursday, January 21st. The following are some of the topics that the Board would like to share with you:

Our financial status is on track. A pick up in pledge contributions during December brought us back in line with our expected cash flow for the church year. Our expenditures are currently in line with our planned budget, except that we are likely to incur more expenses than planned for our ministerial search effort.

Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) representatives, co-chair, Karen Wians, and Committee member, Chris Flaherty, attended the EB meeting to give us an update. The good news is that we have a number of good qualified applicants who have expressed sincere interest. We are in a good place and have every reason to be optimistic. We are hoping that candidating will take place in May and a Vote to Call Meeting will take place after the second Sunday service. We encourage you to think about the ministry you want and how we will do it together. Your MSC is working very hard and spending an amazing amount of time doing the proper diligence on our behalf. We owe them a great deal of gratitude and appreciation.

Building and Grounds is continuing to make strides toward establishing a committee that is fully effective. The current focus is on making sure we are ready and prepared for winter. The thermostats have been properly programed and set, we have antifreeze in the vestry heating system and our snow plow service is ready and standing by. David Russell, our EB liaison to B&G and the chair of B&G is looking for some help to

salt the walkways when necessary. If you are willing and able to help, please see David.

The Green Sanctuary Committee is moving into its next phases, implementing a green environment

and increasing awareness both within the congregation and within the community. Fritz Fleischman is starting a Green Book Club that will initially be open to First Parish members, but will be open to the larger community once it gets going. See Fritz to find out more.

The EB reviewed the long term viability of the Farmers Market, which we have been running for a number of years during the summer months. Financially it has been a struggle to turn a profit, with the bake sale being the primary income source. Because it has been such a labor intensive effort and relies on a constant supply of volunteers, it is becoming harder on the members managing and supporting the Market. Also most of the vendors are not making any money. Susan Stromgren has been managing the Market for the last few years, doing a terrific job, but has been looking for someone to share the load to no avail. Although the Farmers Market has been a good way to bring the surrounding community closer, we have some difficult decisions to make about its future.

We are making some progress on finding a permanent home and support for our recently acquired desk and bible. Rich met with Christine McCue, a Medfield resident, writer and supporter of the acquisition to discuss plans to publicize the acquisition and their importance to the town. Rich also met with Pete Peterson, a town Selectman, to talk about the Town's long term support of the desk and bible and, more importantly, Medfield's

Historic Meeting House. We have been invited to meet with the Selectmen at one of their meetings to discuss how we might work together.

Bill Wians is leading an effort, initiated by the EB, to reach out to the Medfield Police and other local authorities in an effort to help us develop a safety plan for the congregation. The Religious Education Committee will also be discussing the subject of safety at their next meeting.

The EB has been working on its goals for the church year and finalized four primary goals: a) Find a new settled minister, b) Develop an initiative to identify external sources of funding that will support the long term maintenance of Medfield's Historic Meeting House, c) Revitalize

our Building and Grounds Committee and d)
Increase visibility and outreach within Medfield
and the surrounding Communities. We are well on
our way to achieving our goals.

We have set a tentative date for our Annual Meeting: Sunday, May 19th, pending the Candidating Week dates.

There is a lot going on. Your Executive Board and all our Committees are working very hard to make our congregation a safe, supportive and enjoyable place to come together. Feel free to reach out to any member of the Executive Board if you have any questions, comments or suggestions.

Our first meeting will be in the Vestry on Tuesday, February 19, at 7 p.m.



Leading our book club will be Fritz Fleischmann, a professor at Babson College, where he has been teaching courses on nature and the environment for a number of years.



First Parish 10 foot Screen Instructions


First parish has a 10 foot screen for presentations that can easily be set up in either the vestry or the sanctuary. It can be set up on the altar or in front of the altar for presentations in the sanctuary. It works quite well and I'd like to explain how to set it up.

WHAT IT IS: It consists of 4 PVC pipes and a clear bag that contains 3 black out curtains and one large white spandex cloth sleeve.

WHERE IT IS STORED: the pipes are in the electrical closet. The clear bag is in the closet at the back of the vestry.

TO SET THE SCREEN UP. Set it up near where you will use it. It is 8 ft. high and 10 ft. wide.

- 1. Place PVC#1 and PVC#2 on the floor in parallel. These are the upright poles with feet.
- 2. Place PVC#3 (top) and PVC#4 (middle) on the floor between PVC#1 and PVC#2. These are the cross struts.
- 3. Unzip the clear bag and thread PVC#3 (top) through the three black out curtains.
- 4. Insert PVC#3 and PVC#4 into PVC#1 and PVC#2. Lightly use the hammer (in the kitchen drawer) to bang them in. See Figure 1.
- 5. Fit the white cloth sleeve over the frame and bring it down over the black out curtains and struts. See Figure 2.
- 6. Lift up screen and set in place.



TO TAKE THE SCREEN DOWN:

- 1. Lay the screen down.
- 2. Remove the white sleeve and fold it up and return it to the clear bag.
- 3. Lightly bang the struts and detach them from the uprights.
- 4. Remove the blackout curtains and fold them up and return them to the clear bag.
- 5. Place the pipes back in the electrical closet.
- 6. Zip up the clear bag and return it to the closet at the back of the vestry.
