Dear friends,

Time to put up the screens – metaphorically, of course. Spring is the turn-out-the-house season. When I was a kid it was window box time. My mother would go off to the Acme ("ak-a-mee," as we say in Philadelphia) and load up the station wagon with the brightest flowers she could find. We'd all spend a long day cleaning the boxes, potting the plants and remounting them on the windows. It was too much work to please me.

On the other hand, the first house Sally and I owned had storm windows and screens that had to

be put up and taken down every year. They were wood. They were heavy. They required a considerable amount of cleaning every time, and a lot of wrangling to squeeze the inevitably warped frames into the wooden windowsills. They were painted an ancient and flaking green-black, which did not go with the current house color. No matter – we loved every minute of it. It was our house, you see.

So this, then, about the church – it's your house, you see. Keeping it in good repair is something you mostly pay for. The skills and the

tools are professional grade and that's the best hope of getting the work done right the first time – or at least the second time. The expense is aggravating, but old houses are like that – and we know very well they don't make them that way anymore.

Keeping it loved is something you mostly do. Caring and attention matter more than high levels of skill. Tools generally come right out of the garage (or our basement). Almost anybody can do the work. This time of year we start thinking about

the grounds and gardens. Yes, we do have gardens! We have a lovely site, but it needs care – especially in the spring when the debris of winter needs removal. A modest stewardship pays off every time somebody goes by and sees an attractive and well-kept piece of the neighborhood. Remember the old paint color matters less than the pride you display.

Church Cleanup Day is on Sunday, April 14, immediately after the Earth Day Service. That's a very good time to get involved.

ANNUAL FUND DRIVE FOR 2019-20

"HOW MUCH SHOULD I PLEDGE?"

When we think how much our church means to us, we remember that First Parish people are entirely responsible for the church's expenses. First Parish cannot exist without the pledge of financial support from every Member and Friend.

The **UUA Fair Share Guide** suggests that we pledge at least 2% of our adjusted household income. (This is like the "adjusted gross income" used by the IRS.) More importantly, The Guide also asks us to reflect on how we relate to our congregational community:

- **Supporter:** The congregation is a significant part of my spiritual and intellectual life that I want to support. My fair share financial commitment starts at 2% of my adjusted income.
- **Sustainer:** The congregation is my central community; I am committed to sustaining the programs and ministries of my congregation. My fair share financial commitment starts at 3% of my adjusted income.
- **Visionary:** My commitment is a clear demonstration of the unique importance of this congregation and of my spiritual principles. My fair share financial commitment starts at 5% of my adjusted income.
- Transformer: I am deeply committed to the congregation; my contribution provides fuel for transformation and is part of my spiritual practices in living out my UU Principles. My fair share financial commitment represents 10% of my adjusted income.

All of us have obligations like housing and food, insurance and taxes, and support for dependents. How much, after these, can we set aside for taking care of our spiritual community? Each of us has to make this decision, depending on our circumstances. Since First Parish is here for us each month of the year, consider the monthly amount you can give to support the church. You can pay your total annual pledge in these monthly amounts, which helps the church's cash flow and yours. (For many of us, it helps to make monthly payments, automatically mailed by our bank, like a car or mortgage payment.)

Last year (for the 2018-19 budget), we had 47 pledging households; the average pledge was \$2,165. We have been managing persistent operational deficits for some years. Let us make a concerted effort this year to escape that cycle and welcome our new settled minister with a balanced budget. We can do it!

<u>Here is our sincere plea</u>: if all of us pledge a minimum of 2% of our adjusted household income, the Executive Board will be able to craft a balanced Church Budget for 2019-20.

Thank you for being in our community.




We won a prize!



Green Book Club






We of the Green Sanctuary Committee hope you will join us!

We have a very special treat for our April Expresso Yourself Coffeehouse. More than beautiful recordings, Crowes Pasture has an intimacy about their live performances. The romantic claw hammer banjo playing by Monique Byrne and expressive guitar picking by Andy Rogovin are enlivened by their personal chemistry and emotionally expressive vocals. Nick Noble, host of "The Folk Revival" on WICN-FM, has praised the duo for their "lovely harmonies and a passionate approach to musical performance". With a full tour schedule and new full-length album due out in 2019, Crowes Pasture is emerging from the sea grass dunes at the "edge of America" to bring listeners across the country together.

The Crowes Pastures Duo performs original music and eye-opening covers that reflect a mutual passion, sense of discovery and celebration of life. Their tightly blended vocal harmonies are mixed with an expressive instrumental style that is best described as a banjo-guitar romance. They have two EPs, two full-length albums, and their new single, "Hazy Shade of Winter" (Paul Simon). They have featured at the Joe Val Bluegrass Festival Showcase Stage, Club Passim's Campfire Festival, and were finalists in the 2018CT Folk Festival Competition. Their music has achieved airplay on over 70 stations nationwide including Tufts

Freeform Radio in Boston and Sundilla Radio Hour. The theme for the evening is "Acts of Courage."
