The other morning, as I sat on the Pinky Meader memorial bench overlooking the Meetinghouse Pond, I could feel the cool, crisp morning air fill my lungs. Across the pond, I noticed that majestic tree just beginning to turn to shades of autumn, its brilliant colors reflecting on the rippling water. A bird perched in the tree, looking for its breakfast kept careful watch on the pond, and every so often would dart down to the surface and come up with a small fish.

I was reminded of the words of Mary Oliver in her poem *Song of Autumn:*

In the deep fall don't you imagine the leaves think how comfortable it will be to touch the earth instead of the nothingness of air and the endless freshets of wind? And don't you think the trees themselves, especially those with mossy, warm caves, begin to think

of the birds that will come — six, a dozen to sleep inside their bodies? And don't you hear the goldenrod whispering goodbye, the everlasting being crowned with the first tuffets of snow? The pond vanishes, and the white field over which the fox runs so quickly brings out its blue shadows. And the wind pumps its bellows. And at evening especially, the piled firewood shifts a little, longing to be on its way. I sat there on that bench taking in all of the life that surrounded me, just breathing. Eventually, my eyes opened. I turned and saw our peace dove weather vane glimmering in the morning sun atop our historic meetinghouse. I was overcome with such a deep sense of gratitude. A sense that I am where I am meant to be. Thank you for welcoming me so fully and graciously into this community. I am so blessed to be here. I look forward to walking on this journey together.

Religious Exploration Library Book Tower

Have you ever noticed in the vestry the four-sided wooden structure that holds children's books? It has been part of the Religious Exploration/Education program for years and houses most of the children's RE library. The books are selected and curated to reflect our Unitarian Universalist values and passions. Although a few of them can also be found in the local public libraries, many were purchased because they would not otherwise be easily available. The books are for children to look at while they are in the vestry. At times they serve as a resource for RE sessions and for worship.

Soon there will be a system in place for anyone to sign out a book to borrow and take home. The book categories will also be updated with new easy-to-understand signage, and the tower might be moved to a more accessible spot in the vestry.

If you are interested in helping maintain the RE library—sorting, straightening, labeling, planning etc.—please let <u>Samantha Nemeth</u>, Coordinator of RE, or <u>Leanne Harvey</u>, chair of RE Committee, know.

These are three recent RE library book additions:



Power Poems for Small Humans is published by Flamingo Rampant, a micro-press producing feminist, racially-diverse, LGBTQ positive children's books "in an effort to bring visibility and positivity to the reading landscape of children everywhere." Trouble at the Watering Hole by Greg Relyea and Josh Weiss—about conflict resolution. The Grandad Tree by Trish Cooke—about remembering good times with grandfather.



Building and Grounds



There was a lot of activity toward the end of the summer in anticipation of the arrival of Rev. Egan. To wit:

- Dan Bibel has taken a well-earned rest from emptying the trash and recycling bins, and we've instituted a rotation system of volunteers.
- Sandra Andreassi and Dawn Amaral cleaned out the RE Office and closet, and the office now looks presentable and functional.
- Eve Potts and Sarah Zitoli removed masses of old curriculum and other items from the closet in one of the classrooms. This material has been set aside for interested parties to look over, and what is not claimed will be recycled. Eve has been particularly active in attacking the buildup of the years that has accumulated in the dark corners of our buildings.
- Susan Stromgren and David Russell painted the minister's office with paint donated by Wills Hardware. Please patronize Wills whenever you can. If you do, mention that you are there because of their support of our congregation. Ask them to pass the message on to Ken Wills.
- Rev. Dave also has a comfortable new desk chair in which to ponder.
- Sara Drumm, Susan Stromgren, and Sara's daughter removed the crabgrass from between the bricks of our walkways.

- Susan Stromgren and Eve Potts also planted chrysanthemums in the children's garden. These can easily be moved if and when the children want to make their own plantings. Eve also planted chrysanthemums in the planters that flank the center entrance stairs and spruced up the small garden plot to the right of the North Street staircase.
- Jeannette Ruyle re-puttied and painted the black windows on the vestry entrance side.
- David Maxson and David Russell wrestled the old furnace that was in the basement onto a trailer and over to Allied Recycling in Walpole. They paid us \$50 for the scrap—all 700 pounds of it!
- David Temple and David Russell prepared and primed the church stucco, front step risers, and part of the North Street corner of the building. Wills Hardware made a donation to this project.
- Duncan Glover and Louise Rachin tidied up the sanctuary before the ingathering service.
- David Maxson purchased a new set of microphones; he also has our fire inspection in process.
- Many, many thanks to all the above. The church and U-House look significantly better. I fear I'm missing some people who pitched in this summer. If you know of such "elves," please let me know so they can receive recognition.
