Global Climate Strike, Friday September 20

On September 20, three days before the UN Climate Summit in NYC, young people and adults will strike all



across the US and world to demand transformative action be taken to address the climate crisis. No matter what your age is, you are invited to join the movement.

Many, many organizations are partnering in the <u>Global Climate Strike</u>, including the UUA, Side with Love, the UU Ministry for Earth, and Interfaith Power and Light.

A number of us from FPUU plan to leave for the Boston strike via the commuter train leaving from Walpole station. Watch for specific plans about carpooling to the station from church or meeting us there in Walpole or Boston.

Other nearby strikes are in Worcester, Andover, Providence RI, and at Lexington High School.

A play about nature, Thoreau, and Emerson

Nature: a Walking Play, put on by The Trustees at Old Manse in Concord, sounds like it is right on the mark for many of us at FPUU. The warehouse is located on Route 27 at the Walpole Station Business Center. The address is 102 Elm Street, Walpole. From Medfield, take Route 27 South towards Walpole. Just after passing under a railroad overpass, take a right into the warehouse parking lot. You will see three loading docks. Enter the door to the left of the loading docks. A NewLife volunteer should be waiting for you inside the warehouse on the first floor. The NewLife space for the stored furniture is on the fourth floor.
