Our mission is to raise consciousness about the environment, motivate for change, generate commitment to community action, and promote environmental justice, recognizing that all injustices are connected.




One might notice that our mission statement says nothing specifically addressing our First Parish UU buildings and their "greenness." And yet we as a committee/group have been closely involved with and concerned about the state of our physical structures in regards to our overall carbon footprint. Our buildings, as well as our behavioral habits, have an impact on the environment, including climate chaos, and therefore affect the welfare of the interdependent web of all existence. So, the condition of the First Parish buildings is one angle from which the Green Sanctuary Committee carries out our mission, but is certainly not the only one.

As we finish constructing removeable interior storm windows for the vestry windows (the third one, pictured here, was completed at the January Game Night), we will be working in concert with the Building and Grounds Committee and other FPUU leaders on additional ways to lessen our carbon footprint. A Mass Save representative was at FPUU recently and we are awaiting their report for both buildings.

What is UUtheVote?

"In moments of moral crisis, Unitarian Universalists know we are called to show up. And 2020 is one of those moments. If we are to survive—as a human species broadly and as a UU religious community specifically—we are called to speak with moral courage and act with prophetic clarity, making our lives and our actions an embodied example of the relevance and saving power of our values and our faith communities."—UUA

In 2008 in California, I knew something was wrong when same-sex marriage was more of a moral issue than climate change. So, when I moved to Massachusetts, I joined First Parish in Medfield because of its principles. As the UUA says, "Unitarian Universalist values of interdependence, democracy, and the inherent worth and dignity of all people are direct antidotes to the fear, bigotry, and inequity that define our world." For equality, equity, and justice as demonstrated by Cissy Hull and the kids in the Time for All Ages in the January 19 service.

The year 2020 is shaping up to be a critical year, and the UUA says our religious community must speak with moral courage and act with prophetic clarity and determination in the 2020 electoral cycle.

It is with that in mind that the UUA launched **Uuthevote** in January 2020. They say that if you have done any kind or social justice work, whether attending a rally to writing


postcards and letters to elected officials, you have already been doing the work of UU the Vote. This is about UU individuals and committees working together in collaboration.

UU the Vote is not about starting from scratch. It's about continuing in our justice ministries: our Green Sanctuary work, our walks for hunger, our volunteerism, community donations, and so on. The UUA is asking us to integrate electoral engagement into our strategies for change. UU the Vote will be supporting congregations to form teams for:

- Mobilizing voters
- Challenging voter suppression
- Holding values-based conversations
- Opening the doors of our congregations to justice partners
- Providing the spiritual sustenance

Ideas they suggest include things like offering our building for launching canvassing operations, encouraging climate activists to vote, hosting candidate forums, phone banking, and fundraisers. As the year progresses towards November, the UUA is going all out to support congregations in integrating these inclusive actions.

Chronic Sorrow

During the mid-nineties, I was actively parenting my adolescent children and practicing every selfhelp skill I knew of to help manage my daily stress. My youngest daughter had just turned 17 years of age, having lived her young life not knowing what a healthy body was. At the age of six weeks she had been diagnosed with two liver diseases. I was swallowed up in grief, fear and dread knowing there was no cure and doing my best to accept her diseases and deny them all in the same breath. I was clinically depressed, anxiety ridden and a constant worrier. On top of that, I was bullying myself to get a grip, pull myself together and smile. Positive thinking was the way to handle all problems, right?

Then I came across the term "chronic sorrow". Discovering what chronic sorrow was helped me find compassion for myself and ease the self-bullying. Chronic sorrow is a theory written originally by a neonatal intensive care unit nurse as she observed parents and caregivers experience recurring intense feelings of grief. I remember feeling like someone finally understands me. It was a puzzle piece to my never-ending sadness. More often than not, when another diagnosis was introduced, I would fall back

into a loop of sadness, like it was the first day it happened. It was a cyclical experience.

Looking back on these tumultuous years and having recovered from the deep loss of my daughter (if one ever really can), I am realizing how helpful it was for me to understand chronic sorrow. Since my discovery of this article more has been written about this theory that gives some comfort to those experiencing recurring feelings of grief and sorrow. When there's a chronic illness present in anyone's life, there is a recurring sense of loss that becomes a companion. There often is no closure for years. As a spiritual director, caregiver advocate and coach to those seeking help in chronic states of loss, I am also witnessing chronic sorrow with regard to the state of the environment, the ongoing saga of our government and the preposterous positions social media has put us all in. I'm seeing chronic sorrow in many arenas.

It is my hope as we step fully into 2020, those seeking peace of mind and understanding their life's purpose and self-care skills will include a sense of compassion for their own chronic sorrow. 2020 rings in new lessons on changing the paradigms so that we can become our own self-advocates, giving ourselves the comfort and care so many are seeking from others. It is truly the answer to many of our discomforts.
