This holiday season is certainly like no other in recent memory. Instead of looking forward to big family get-togethers, holiday office parties, and festive choral concerts, we are told that any of these events could put ourselves and others at risk. For this time of year there are so many treasured traditions that we look forward to, that help keep us grounded, that remind

us of times long past. But now we may have to forgo these things due to an out-of-control pandemic, and it leaves us with profound feelings of loss, sadness and perhaps even anger.

But yet, as we were reminded by Father Steve Zukas who preached at the Medfield Interfaith Community Thanksgiving service, now more than ever we must learn to develop an "attitude of gratitude". For as he

said, "Upset about having to pay too much in taxes? Be grateful that you have a job. Tired of cleaning out the gutters, raking the leaves, and washing the windows? Be grateful that you have a home. Angry about that big heating bill? Be grateful that you are warm."

This is a powerful reframing of our mindset, something that is so important these days. For these days we are sure to face disappointments, losses, and even deep sorrows, but we are in control of how we respond to each of these things. Not able to go to your child's school for the traditional holiday concert this year? Be grateful that your children's teachers care enough about their students to continue to teach them, while keeping them safe. I know it takes practice, but with time we can learn to develop a spiritual practice centered around gratitude.

For let me say, that I am grateful for all of you. Over the past nine months during this pandemic, we have supported one another in countless ways that showed deep compassion and love. We have played together, worshipped together, cried together, and laughed together. We have gotten through this together, and I know that we will continue to do so. And for that I am eternally grateful. Thanks to all of you for being a part of my life and for giving so fully of yourselves to this community every day.

So in closing, I would like to leave you with a quote from Thich Nhat Hahn, a Vietnamese Buddhist Monk and peace activist. He said, "Waking up this morning, I smile. Twenty-four brand new hours are before me. I vow to live fully in each moment and to look at all beings with eyes of compassion."

The Executive Board hereby notifies all voting members of First Parish Unitarian Universalist Medfield of the Semi-Annual Parish Meeting, to be held to be held **on the Zoom conference platform** beginning at t 11:15 AM on Sunday, December 6, 2020. A quorum of 25 percent of Full Members eligible to vote at the time of posting of this notice must be present to conduct the business of the Congregation. This translates to 20 members.

In accordance with the Bylaws of First Parish Medfield (approved on June 3, 2012) in Article 4.2, the Semi-Annual Meeting is described as follows:

Article 4.2 Midyear Meeting

Article 4.2.1 Time and Place: A semi-annual Parish meeting is held in the fall between the first day of November and the last day of December.

Article 4.2.2 Purpose: The semi-annual Parish meeting shall be held to update the Congregation on the status of the Church at the time of the meeting and conduct any other business as determined by the Executive Board.

The following topics will be addressed at the Semi-Annual Meeting:

- Report on the general state of the Church
- Financial update, including a vote to approve an amended budget
- A motion from the Executive Board to approve the continued display of first UU Principle and the Black Lives Matter banners on the front of the Meetinghouse.
- Any other business that may be put forward by those present.



Our mission is to raise consciousness about the environment, motivate for change, generate commitment to community action, and promote environmental justice, recognizing that all injustices are connected.

Anti-idling again!

Four years ago, the GSC started an anti-idling campaign in Medfield. Flyers and a video were designed and created with the help of Medfield high school students. Anti-idling signs were put up at several places in town. Letters were written. Medfield TV and newspapers helped deliver the message. The Green Sanctuary received a "Cool Congregation" award from the MA Interfaith Power and Light in 2017 for this community outreach and education.

The GSC is very aware that ongoing reminders and education are needed when it comes to trying to reduce and eliminate motor vehicle engine idling. As long as there are still fossil-fueled cars and trucks being driven, this will be needed. Several of us on the GSC have had the experience of gathering up our courage and speaking to someone who has been idling their car for over the 5-minute legal limit. The responses have varied from polite surprise and compliance to frank annoyance and defiance. Most of the time people end up turning off their engines.



Winter is a good time to renew awareness of the harm (and illegality) of engine idling. If you look carefully at this title

photo of the <u>YouTube video</u> made by the MHS students, you can see it is wintertime. Much of it was filmed outside in winter weather.

Think you need to run the engine for a while to warm it up in cold weather? Think

again. <u>Popular Mechanics</u> says, "Warming up your car before driving is a leftover practice from a time when carbureted engines dominated the roads... Unless you're rolling in a 1970s Chevelle—which we assume isn't your daily driver—bundle up, scrape off your car, and get it moving."
