It's that time of year again, when you are asked to dig deep and renew your pledge of financial support to the work of the church. As we reach the one year mark of on-line worship services (our first Zoom Sunday was March 15th, 2020), we have learned much about how to be a community during difficult and strange times – most especially, how to continue to support one another

Neighboring Faiths



While we have not been able to visit houses of worship as part of the Neighboring Faiths program this year, we have been able to have virtual classes and the kids have learned a lot!

So far this church year, we have had virtual classes on...

- Buddhism, where we were joined by Andy Wood, an educator from the Zen Buddhist Center in Cambridge, who (among other things) taught the kids how to meditate
- Catholicism, where we attended a virtual church service at the Church of the Advent in Medfield, followed by a Zoom class including the church's Rector Marc Eames
- Scientology the first time the NF class has chosen this! Since we can't get access to anyone
 practicing Scientology, Andy Nemeth (Samantha's husband) learned all about it and taught this class!
- Islam, where we were joined by Saadia Husain Baloch from the Islamic Center of Boston/Wayland who did a wonderful job of educating the kids about Islam and sharing her own experiences (including Hajj in Mecca!)

Here's what we've got planned for the rest of the year:

- Two classes on ancient traditions (Celtic and Egyptian) in March, led by Sophie Davis, an initiated Celtic shaman (and John Kornet's cousin!)
- Judaism in April to be determined, but we will likely attend a virtual service and/or have one of the Rabbis from Temple Beth David in Westwood join us for a Zoom class
- Hinduism in May due to lack of contacts at the Sri Lakshmi temple in Ashland, this class will likely
 incorporate videos and other information about Hinduism in the US and around the world

We are so thankful for the kids for their patience and flexibility, their attentiveness to our presenters, and their thoughtful questions during our classes!

MA Climate Bill—an update

On January 28, the MA legislature again approved a sweeping climate change bill and sent it back to Gov. Baker who had vetoed it just days before. On Feb. 7, Gov. Baker sent the bill back to the Legislature, this time with amendment proposals.

The climate bill sets benchmarks for reaching a goal of net-zero carbon emissions by 2050. Boosting offshore wind energy and improving efficiency standards for appliances and cars are among the requirements. The proposal also designated "environmental justice" communities, requiring that proposed projects that could hurt such a community's air quality develop an environmental impact report.

As always, you can <u>write to Gov. Baker</u> and to your <u>Senator and Representative</u> and let them know your views on this.

Formation of Anti-racism Task Force for FPUU

The prevailing metaphor for our SJI is an umbrella. We are an umbrella for any and all social justice initiatives and projects at FPUU. The FPUU website lays this out. At our February meeting, we decided to form a specifically named Anti-racism Task Force that is now under the umbrella of the SJI. 
A few of the ideas the Anti-racism Task Force have been discussing are--

- Working with the Worship and Music Committee on possible worship service elements

In Medfield – Black History Month

A representative from <u>Medfield Together</u>, FPUU congregant Nicole Hall, approached the SJI in late January about possibly partnering with them in their Black History Month project. The proposal to have FPUU be one of the locations for a "portal" sign (pictured here) was endorsed by the SJI and passed on the Executive Board who gave their approval. Below is the project description from Medfield Together.
