## Ministerial Musings Dave Egan, Minister



A few weeks ago, on October 7th, several brave souls from the FPUU Men's Group drove up to The Forks, Maine for the weekend. This is a town where 33 people live... at least the last time they checked. It sits at the

intersection of the Kennebec and the Dead Rivers. The later is why we drove for four and a half hours.

The Dead River got it's ominous name from all of the dead soldiers, who had been commanded by Benedict Arnold during the Revolutionary War, who did not survive the long frigid winters, filled with disease and starvation. Eventually, as our rafting guide told us, folks started seeing corpses floating downstream. Thus, The Dead River.

This is where The Men's Group chose to raft.

In the gift shop of the rafting company, I purchased a tee shirt that read:

"ROW, ROW, ROW YOUR BOAT GENTLY DOWN A RAGING BONE CRUSHING LIFE THREATENING CLASS V STREAM, MERRILY MERRILY MERRILY LIFE IS BUT A DREAM" After a wonderful time out on the majestic river, we laughed and bonded as we enjoyed a big BBQ meal. When we were driving home, I checked my phone and saw the breaking news of the horrific attack by Hamas on Israeli civilians. Soon after, Israel declared war on I felt that familiar fear I had felt Hamas. after 9/11. I heard commentators filled with anger, seeking revenge, justifying further atrocities in the name of safety and security. The deafening beat of war drums seemed to be drowning out all else.

Moments earlier we were laughing about our time on the river and remembering our guide telling us about those poor frozen souls who died so long ago on The Dead River. Now all I could think about were the countless people who were taken hostage, scared and separated from their families, the thousands who were killed and being killed right now, and the coming war in the Palestinian territory of Gaza. As I looked down at the words printed on my new tee shirt, somehow they didn't seem so funny anymore: "raging, bone crushing, life threatening". These words now took on a whole new meaning. I couldn't get out of my mind the image of those dead soldiers floating down the Dead River so long ago, and wondering how many dead bodies were on the streets of Israel and Palestine right now, in what many refer to as the Holy Lands.

These are painful times we are living through, friends. We all have very big feelings surrounding this conflict in Israel and Palestine. As you likely saw in your email, you all are invited to join our Right Relations Team, Pastoral Care Team, and the Executive Board this Sunday, Oct 29th at 11:15am in the U House, for an open-hearted listening circle.

For in times like these, we need each other more than ever.

## Long-term Rental Will Soon Begin in the Vestry



At some point in the next few weeks, Opportunities for Inclusion, an organization serving people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, will begin renting the First Parish vestry Mondays through Fridays.

In preparation for OFI's use of the space, certain improvements are

being made in the vestry and parking lot to conform with requirements of the Massachusetts Department of Disability Services. These include widening the North Street exit to accommodate wheelchairs, hinging the door on the larger bathroom to swing outward rather than inward, and installing a railing on the ramp leading from the parking lot to the vestry entry doors. Once their occupancy begins, First Parish members will not be able to entry the vestry without arranging to do so beforehand with church administrator Sandra Andreassi.

Finding a long-term renter has been a major goal of the Executive Board. The rental income will go a long way toward stabilizing First Parish's financial picture. The Board looks forward to welcoming Opportunities for Inclusion, as its mission of serving others is consonant with our own.

## Continuing good news on lowering our heating bill and reducing our carbon footprint

Removable acrylic interior window inserts for the vestry (social hall) windows are installed! Pioneer Glass of Whitinsville, MA did a great job. A few people have already said they think they notice a difference in the vestry—less drafty.

The next step for "tightening the envelope" is doing something about the single-pane sanctuary windows, including long overdue maintenance.

The next step for our heating system is to get an assessment done by a qualified engineer to plan for an updated system, hopefully using air source heat pumps. Contacts have been made; stay tuned.

The Answer is Not in Our Mind



The biggest assumption I made in my life was when I expected life would be like I wanted with people like I wanted and things like I wanted and trips like I wanted

and anything else like I wanted. What a huge wake-up call life offers. I heard the other day children born over the last 20 years to today come into this life fierce. They arrive wise into this changing world. They do not have time to languish through the learning as so many of us did through the 50's and 60's. Life is happening faster now. They come in running with the train as they hop on into their existence.

I cannot assume if children suffer then they are in the wrong place at the wrong time. They come in with a purpose greater than I can imagine. My daughter lived 32 years on this earth struggling with liver disease and yet I believe she made the choice to arrive with this huge disability. (It is the only way I have justified in my mind and heart why a baby is born so ill) She made this choice in her life plan somewhere before she took presence in her human body to struggle so she could learn about compassion and experience the true meaning of conviction, commitment, and love.

I allow myself the luxury of believing her life was on a trajectory created by her soul to fulfill the lessons she needed to make her whole as a being of light. I cannot assume her life was wasted because she suffered and cried and struggled. There is more going on than my human mind can figure out. My struggle to accept and reason and hunt for cures was part of my life journey in acceptance for that which I can't control.

I lived under the great illusion that life on earth as a human is all there is. I was death phobic. That death is the end – another illusion in this life. The worst fate imaginable to me was death. I feared death for me and I feared it for those I loved. I used to believe God is outside of me and my goal is to hunt for God and be worthy to deserve a love if I earn it. I believed every bad deed I have done deserved punishment for my unworthiness and would be meted out by a judging figure up in heaven. As I love myself, I realize I am creating the beliefs based on my fears.

My illusions are transmuting into inner truths as I walk my journey and listen to my heart. I answer to my heart wherein lies my source. Change is happening at a much faster rate. Children are wiser and more knowing. They have opinions on the environment and kindness and what is good and what they want to do. It is important to listen. As an adult I am still the student discovering there is more to this world than I can see or know or experience.

Suffering is painful to witness no matter who the sufferer is. Its purpose is to break open the heart and feel. Break open the binds that hold the love we have inside. Struggle starts the process that feels like an inside tug of war between love and fear. Love is our nature.

Our job is to see through the illusions and walk our path and follow the gentle kindness we bestow on ourselves. Our job is to feed our body, mind, and spirit to help us grow so we can feel strong enough to open our hearts. This is our time to rise through our illusions.

The wisdom of the Universe guides us as we carry ourselves through a great change, opening our eyes and our hearts discovering that we are all one, in this together, transmuting together. Awareness helps us stay on our path. Truth is our sword to slash through the illusions that pop up as fear pulls us off our path. We have free choice. We have a strong will. We know what love feels like. These are our allies. We always can get back on the path and continue forging ahead knowing fear will rise again and this time we are ready.

Struggle is the life of everyone. Some describe it as a horrible demon but it is actually an angel and the well-wisher of everyone.

Struggle guides everyone's life. It leads human beings from untruth to truth, from ignorance to knowledge, from darkness to light, and from death to immortality.

Struggle is a very skillful sculptor. It transforms an ordinary human being into a deva who is respected by the world; it shapes the life of every great master of the world into a unique and unparalleled work of art.

Food will not digest without proper exercise. Likewise, life will not develop properly without struggle.

When happiness is experienced at the end of unhappiness, its sweetness is indescribable. When an individual has triumphed over his struggle and looks at his attainment, he then understands the true nature of struggle. Afterwards he no longer believes it is his enemy; he looks upon it as a kinsman or loved one."

1 Article II Purposes and Covenant

- 2 Section C-2.1. Purposes.
- 3 The Unitarian Universalist Association will devote its resources to and use its organizational
- 4 powers for religious, educational, and humanitarian purposes. Its primary purposes are
- 5 to assist congregations in their vital ministries, support and train leaders both lay and
- 6 professional, to foster lifelong faith formation, to heal historic injustices, and to advance our
- 7 Unitarian Universalist values in the world.

8 The purpose of the Unitarian Universalist Association is to actively engage its members in the 9 transformation of the world through liberating Love.

#### 10 Section C-2.2. Values and Covenant.

- 11 As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant, congregation-to-congregation and through our
- 12 association, to support and assist one another in our ministries. We draw from our heritages of
- 13 freedom, reason, hope, and courage, building on the foundation of love.
- 14 Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are
- 15 accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual
- 16 discipline of Love.
- 17 Inseparable from one another, these shared values are:



- 18 Image Description: This image is of a chalice with an overlay of the word love over the flame,
- 19 with six outstretched arms that create a circle around each of the core values and form a six
- 20 petal flower shape. Each arm is a different color and clockwise they are: Interdependence
- 21 (Orange), Equity (Red), Transformation (Purple), Pluralism Dark Blue), Generosity (Teal), and
- 22 Justice (Yellow).
- 23 Interdependence. We honor the interdependent web of all existence
- 24 We covenant to cherish the Earth and all beings by creating and nurturing relationships of care
- 25 and respect. With humility and reverence, we acknowledge our place in the great web of life,
- 26. and we work to repair harm and damaged relationships.
- 27 Pluralism. We celebrate that we are all sacred beings diverse in culture, experience, and 28 theology.

- 29 We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and
- 30 meaning. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.
- 31 Justice. We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive.
- 32 We covenant to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppression. We support the use of
- 33 inclusive democratic processes to make decisions.
- 34 Transformation. We adapt to the changing world.
- 35 We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Openness to change
- 36 is fundamental to our Unitarian and Universalist heritages, never complete and never perfect.
- 37 Generosity. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.
- 38 We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our
- 39 generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.
- 40 Equity. We declare that every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and
- 41 worthiness.
- 42 We covenant to use our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain fully
- 43 accessible and inclusive communities.

#### 44 Section C-2.3. Inspirations.

- 45 As Unitarian Universalists, we use, and are inspired by, sacred and secular understandings
- 46 that help us live into our values. We respect the histories, contexts, and cultures in which
- 47 they were created and are currently practiced. These sources ground us and sustain us in
- 48 ordinary, difficult, and joyous times. Grateful for the religious ancestries we inherit and the
- 49 diversity which enriches our faith, we are called to ever deepen and expand our wisdom.

#### 50 Section C-2.4. Inclusion.

- 51 Systems of power, privilege, and oppression have traditionally created barriers for persons
- 52 and groups with particular identities, ages, abilities, and histories. We pledge to replace
- 53 such barriers with ever-widening circles of solidarity and mutual respect. We strive to be
- 54 an association of congregations that truly welcome all persons who share our values. We
- 55 commit to being an association of congregations that empowers and enhances everyone's
- 56 participation, especially those with historically marginalized identities.

- 57 Section C-2.5. Freedom of belief.
- 58 Congregational freedom and the individual's right of conscience are central to our Unitarian
- 59 Universalist heritage.
- 60 Congregations may establish statements of purpose, covenants, and bonds of union so long
- 61 as they do not require that members adhere to a particular creed.

UUA Bylaws Section C-15.1: If the proposal receives preliminary approval, within six months after the close of the General Assembly, the study commission, taking into account the decisions of the General Assembly, shall prepare the proposal to amend Article II.

Here is the current statement, showing amendments: :

23 Interdependence. We honor the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part. 24 With humility and reverence, we covenant to [cherish] protect Earth and all beings from exploitation, [by ]creating and nurturing sustainable relationships of [care] repair, mutuality, 25 and [respect] justice. [With humility and reverence, we acknowledge our place in the great web of life, 26 and we work to repair harm and damaged relationships.]

Lines 45-49

As Unitarian Universalists, we proclaim that direct experiences of transcending mystery and wonder are a primary source of inspiration. These experiences open our hearts, renew our spirits, and transform our lives. These sources ground us and sustain us in ordinary, difficult, and joyous times. Grateful for the experiences that move us, aware of the religious ancestries we inherit, and enlivened by the diversity which enriches our faith, we are called to ever deepen and expand our wisdom.
