Each year as the holidays approach, what I tell my family is that what I really want for a present is a gift of time. This time of year I always feel a bit crazed as I tick off the days remaining until Christmas and wonder how I will ever get it all done. For I am determined to carry on the traditions I learned from my mom. So there are days spent baking & decorating cookies, assembling the homemade gingerbread house, and of course making the traditional cinnamon rolls. Hours spent stringing lights on the porch outside and transforming our house into a magical Christmas wonderland. By the time December 24th arrives and it is time to get to the Christmas Eve service, I feel enormous relief. Time is up. Can't do one more thing. I sit there wrapped in candlelight, singing familiar carols, listening to the story, and my whole body relaxes into a great ahhhh.

It is so tempting to get caught up in the craziness of the holiday season. Standing in lines, waiting to get a big bargain, trudging through malls, short-tempered & exhausted, worrying about all those people on the list. The Religious Exploration class is busy preparing for the children's Winter Solstice Service on December 17th, and there are just a couple of Sundays remaining to plan and rehearse!

For over a decade, the Winter Solstice Service has been 'produced' by the RE kids (with some help from their leaders and guides) and it has become a cherished tradition at FPUU. The evolution of the Solstice Service 'play' into a complete worship service, led and designed by the RE children, was a natural outgrowth of our

values. Our church community cherishes and celebrates intergenerational perspectives, and encourages all persons at FPUU to contribute to our shared worship experiences.

We are grateful for the extra effort that Sarah and the kids are devoting to Solstice planning. We are also grateful to all of the parents for getting their kids to church on Dec 3rd and 1oth, during this busy season, so that the kids can help to plan and rehearse. Note that there will be a 'part' or role for every interested child on December 17th, regardless of prior involvement leading up to the service.

After the Winter Solstice service, RE will resume In January with our short videos and activities from the 'CartUUns' and 'Bluey' curricula. We have many volunteer openings starting in January and for both RE and Little lights Guides. Check the links on the members page of the FPUU website to sign up. (When signing up for Little Lights, select the 'Guide' role, because Jackson or Avery will generally serve as the 'Lead sitter')

BELONGING

"<u>A deep sense of love and belonging is an irreducible need</u> of all people. We are biologically, cognitively, physically, and spiritually wired to love, to be loved, and to belong. When those needs are not met, we don't function as we were meant to. We break. We fall apart. We numb. We ache. We hurt others. We get sick." Brené Brown

Our FPUU community is strong and mighty. We may not be large in numbers but we are large in spirit. I am a month out of my traumatic accident in the Netherlands where I broke my leg in four places, surgery, rehab and the long road back.

I had the choice to pursue my surgery in the Netherlands, and I considered the surgery so far from home for about twelve hours. Until I reflected on what's back home: my family, my community and of course, the Boston medical system.

There is no fundamental requirement to belong to our UU community except to have an open heart, a willingness to share and a human need to belong. We are all from different walks of life, different wants and needs, even different family systems, but we all have a desire to embrace the values that our UU holds – one of them being the inherent worth and dignity of every living being.

This is short and to the point, unlike other articles I have published in the past, but the time is at hand, and my ability in short supply. I want to say, thank you First Parish community for the collective heart put to use through the actions that we each do to express our deep desire to help, contribute, and reinforce better living, better believing, better belonging and better overall energy in our day to day lives.

Thea and I deeply express our gratefulness for our community, as we lean into the difficult challenges at hand. Challenges come to all of us in all shapes and sizes, and we know the value of a community to lean into.

The power of belonging is strong along with the values we live our lives in. Each of us has control over the present moment only, and sure we can plan for the future, but the future has a way of resulting in surprises we don't plan for. My order of business is to love myself through the grieving process of losing our vacation while we embark on the long, arduous path of recovery that involves both of us. Am I grumpy and unhappy? At times, yes, I am. It is important to feel my emotions and then let them drift off as the moment passes to another present moment. It is the only way to survive in this changing and tumultuous world.

So this moment I am breathing. I am alive. I face my challenges physically, emotionally, and spiritually looking for the light in each moment. There is something I am learning with each experience. With no doubt in my mind, the world is full of wonderful, loving and caring people who want to do good. Thea and I experienced this first hand in the first part of our European trip and in the aftermath of my fall. I hold on to that fact, live in my moment and love what is in front of me, including my FPUU community. Thank you thank you.

1. Article II Purposes and Covenant

2. Section C-2.1. Purposes.

- 3. The Unitarian Universalist Association will devote its resources to and use its organizational
- 4. powers for religious, educational, and humanitarian purposes. Its primary purposes are:
- 5. to assist congregations in their vital ministries,
- 6. to support and train leaders both lay and professional,
- 7. to foster lifelong faith formation and spiritual development,
- 8. to heal historic injustices,
- 9. to support and encourage the creation of new Unitarian Universalist communities, and
- 10. to advance our Unitarian Universalist values in the world.
- 11. The Unitarian Universalist Association will actively engage its members in the transformation of
- 12. the world through liberating Love.

13. Section C-2.2. Values and Covenant.

- 14. As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant, congregation-to-congregation and through our
- 15. Association, to support and assist one another in our ministries. We draw from our heritages of
- 16. freedom, reason, hope, and courage, building on the foundation of love.
- 17. Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are
- 18. accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual
- 19. discipline of Love.
- 20. Inseparable from one another, these shared values are:



21. Shared Unitarian Universalist Values

PROPOSED REVISION TO

[Suggested shift to Rule and recommended edits] The UUA may create visual representations of the values, which put love at the center and interconnect each value, and may periodically update that image. A version of this image shall be included, with image description, after "Shared Unitarian Universalist Values" in the published version of these bylaws.

- 22. **Interdependence.** We honor the interdependent web of all existence. With reverence for the 23. great web of life and with humility, we acknowledge our place in it.
- 24. We covenant to protect Earth and all beings from exploitation. We will create and nurture
- 25. sustainable relationships of care and respect, mutuality and justice. We will work to repair harm
- 26. and damaged relationships.
- 27. Pluralism. We celebrate that we are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and28. theology.
- 29. We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and
- 30. meaning. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.
- 31. Justice. We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive.
- 32. We covenant to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppression. We support the use of
- 33. inclusive democratic processes to make decisions within our congregations, our Association,
- 34. and society at large.
- 35. Transformation. We adapt to the changing world.
- 36. We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Openness to change is
- 37. fundamental to our Unitarian and Universalist heritages, never complete and never perfect.
- 38. Generosity. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.
- 39. We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our
- 40. generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.
- 41. Equity. We declare that every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and42. worthiness.
- **43**. We covenant to use our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain fully accessible **44**. and inclusive communities.

PROPOSED REVISION TO ARTICLE II

45. Section C-2.3. Inspirations.

- 46. Direct experiences of transcending mystery and wonder are primary sources of Unitarian
- 47. Universalist inspiration. These experiences open our hearts, renew our spirits, and transform
- 48. our lives. We draw upon, and are inspired by, sacred, secular, and scientific understandings
- 49. that help us make meaning and live into our values. These sources ground us and sustain us
- 50. in ordinary, difficult, and joyous times. We respect the histories, contexts, and cultures in which
- 51. these sources were created and are currently practiced. Grateful for the experiences that move
- 52. us, aware of the religious ancestries we inherit, and enlivened by the diversity which enriches
- 53. our faith, we are called to ever deepen and expand our wisdom.

54. Section C-2.4. Inclusion.

- 55. Systems of power, privilege, and oppression have traditionally created barriers for persons
- 56. and groups with particular identities, ages, abilities, and histories. We pledge to replace
- 57. such barriers with ever-widening circles of solidarity and mutual respect. We strive to be
- 58. an Association of congregations that truly welcome all persons who share our values. We
- 59. commit to being an Association of congregations that empowers and enhances everyone's
- 60. participation, especially those with historically marginalized identities.

61. Section C-2.5. Freedom of belief.

- 62. Congregational freedom and the individual's right of conscience are central to our Unitarian
- 63. Universalist heritage.
- 64. Congregations may establish statements of purpose, covenants, and bonds of union so long
- 65. as they do not require that members adhere to a particular creed.
