Ministerial Musings

A colleague told me that he had created a "word cloud" out of his 2023 sermons. I had never done this before, so I googled "word cloud generator" and found out that if you insert a large amount of text into their program, the 75 most frequently used words will create a cloud, the size of each word dependent on how frequently it is used. So I did it. I copied all of the sermons I preached during 2023 into their program and voila, within seconds a cloud appeared on my screen with "LIFE" the most prominent. Other words jumped out as well: People, World, Know, Time, Love, One, Many, Way, Found, Think, Well, Years, Religious, Like, Just. These, of course, are all perfectly good words to find in a sermon and create themes that I know I've been preaching for years now.

However, I was surprised to find that the second most prominent word in my "cloud" was "God." Those who are traditionally religious wouldn't find it odd that a preacher would talk about God, but most of us Unitarian Universalist ministers use the G word with a bit of fear and trepidation. Years ago, I had a parishioner who actually counted the number of times I used the word and complained if it popped up too often in any given

sermon series. You see, a lot of us still seem to image that old man sitting on a cloud watching us, eager to judge and punish. Don't believe in God, these folks say. And so, when I want to talk about the holy or that which transcends our understanding or the mystery in life, I stay away from using God language.

At least I thought I did until my word cloud revealed the truth. I talk about God. Apparently a lot. Often it's within the context of talking about the history of religious belief (and doubt) about one God, or many Gods, or no God. However, sometimes it just seems right to replace "The Holy" or "The Mystery" or "That Which is of Ultimate Concern" with the word "God."

I just hope you will know that when I do so, I'm not talking about the big guy in the sky but something which transcends our understanding, something that is beyond words and images. God is a shorthand way of talking about all of that. Which means, of course, that when I create a word cloud out of my 2024 sermons, God will probably pop out as one of my most frequently used words.

And yes, for those of you counting: I know that I've just used "God" twelve times in this column!

You've asked, and We. Are. Doing. It!!! This comprehensive sexuality program is in its 20th year at First Parish. Developed by the UUA and the UCC, the curriculum reinforces our values as well as educating in topics including Anatomy and Physiology, Relationships, Communication, options for safe sex, and Social Media awareness through role playing, discussions, and guest speakers.

A mandatory parent/guardian meeting will be held on Sunday, 1/7, at 7p in the UHouse. The curriculum and visuals will be reviewed as well as a Q&A. Permission forms will be distributed and must be on file by the start of our program! The sessions will meet most Sundays from 7-9pm, and is open to members of First Parish and the larger community (a \$100 materials fee applies for non-FP friends with scholarships available). OWL will be a 6-month long adventure, ending with a celebration in June. This year the facilitators are John Kornet and Cissy Hull-Allen with Jen Bartle as back up.

UU Consultant to Conduct Next Steps Weekend Visit January 5-7, 2024.

As we strive to strengthen our stewardship and prepare for a possible capital campaign, we have invited Barry Finkelstein of *Stewardship for Us* to spend Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, January 5-7, with us to conduct a Next Steps Process program. Barry has been a Unitarian Universalist Congregational Stewardship Consultant since the Fall of 2007, and has worked with over 120 UU congregations in all aspects of stewardship, governance, and planning. In addition, he is a professional management consultant with 35 years of experience supporting non-profits, US government agencies, and commercial firms.

Barry is also an experienced and energetic UU church lay leader, having served on the board and as board chair of a large church, and in leadership positions in social justice, finance, youth programming, and music. He is passionate about Unitarian Universalism and dedicated to helping UU congregations achieve their grandest dreams. Barry is married to retired UU minister Rev. Roberta Finkelstein, and they currently live in Alexandria, VA where they attend the Unitarian Universalist Church of Arlington (UUCA).

Barry hopes to accomplish three goals during the visit: 1) gather enough information to gain a clear sense of who we are and where we would like to go; 2) generate specific observations and recommendations to help us on our journey; and 3) explain how the Stewardship for Us Team can offer guidance and coaching as we move into the future.

Barry will meet with congregational leaders and committee chairs on Friday evening and Saturday morning. On Saturday afternoon, January 6, he will conduct an open, in-person workshop for everyone from 2:10 to 3:30 pm. Please plan to attend this session.

Barry will also participate in our worship service on Sunday morning, January 7. At 11:30 am, following the service and coffee hour, he will hold an open forum to share his observations and recommendations. The Sunday session will be hybrid, on Zoom at the Sunday worship link. We encourage all to attend.

Message and Invitation from the Executive Board



At the December 17 Semi-annual Parish Meeting, members of the congregation approved a board motion to create a task force to review the Black Lives Matter sign in light of some BLM chapters' support of Hamas. The Board is looking for 6-8 volunteers (including at least one Anti-Racism Team member) who will begin working together in January 2024 and will provide a recommendation to the Board by May 1, 2024, in time for the annual vote at our June Annual Meeting. (According to the Policy Governing Public Statements adopted by the Board in May 2021 and presented to the congregation at the June 6, 2021 Annual Meeting, approval of such public displays must be given by the congregation every year.)

Task force members should be willing to research and facilitate an open and respectful conversation about how First Parish displays its social justice values.

The task force is being asked to make a recommendation about the Black Lives Matter sign and is also empowered to make additional recommendations on how we display our values.

Task force meetings will be open to attendance by all.

Monthly Mediation & Reflection

We are living in unusual times. The world is amidst transcendent change, and like a fish, we cannot yet see beyond the water we reside in because we are still surviving the storm. Long buried roots of complacency are shaken loose. People are dying. People are surviving. Hearts are breaking open in a global movement with awakenings of massive proportions.

The world is dismal, and yet when one looks, there is beauty in nature, miracles of resilience, and wonder witnessed in kindness extended from one to another.

It is exciting and terrifying. One moment I feel helpless and the next I feel such power in presence. Thankfully my breath continues automatically without a reminder.

It has been ten weeks since I broke my leg. This broken leg, subsequent surgery and weeks of rehab has forced me into a place of deep surrender, and I have not done so gracefully. I have kicked and screamed my way through recovery, resisting and resenting, refusing to give in. To me, giving in is giving up. Surprisingly, I have found the opposite is true.

Giving in to what life has offered, allows me to flow with my days instead of fighting them. I have more inner comfort with surrendering than I do with resisting. Acceptance in the moment makes for smoother days instead of days riddled with emotional ups and downs. A day is full of moments.

Like the ocean, we ebb and flow with love and fear. We either stand steady as love and fear moves through us, or we choose to fixate on fear. The secret for me is to remember not to fixate on fear, but find light in my multiple moments.

So, when you become aware in a moment, remember the importance of gratitude for every small miracle, the blessing of community, love in any form, gentle kindness for yourself, knowing this power of belief can hold a positive or negative charge. We each hold the power to change our mind.
