Tiane and Kirsten, RE co-chairs, are starting to form a search committee, and will plan to convene soon to get the process underway this Spring.

But, the RE Committee needs your help! Our experience has been that word-of-mouth has been the most effective way to find candidates for this quarter time position. Our last two CRE's have come to us through personal connections with either an employee or member of First Parish. OWL update: Fritz and Arnold will be attending O.W.L. training with the UUA in the coming months. We are very appreciative of their time commitment and willingness to co-lead in this important volunteer capacity.

We are blessed to have Sarah Zitoli continuing to share her time and energy by serving as our curriculum manager and lead teacher for our classroom.

From the Executive Board

Stewardship for Us Final Report Now Posted on FPUU Website



The final report by consultant Barry Finkelstein of Stewardship for Us has been posted in the members area of the First Parish website. Also posted are Barry's more personal reflections about First Parish based on his visit.

The report covers present challenges and future opportunities, both financial and otherwise, and makes a variety of concrete recommendations. It also contains a

detailed summary of the survey congregation members completed in advance of Barry's visit.

As anyone who participated that in January weekend will recall, Barry's consultation produced a palpable sense of excitement and showed us our strengths and potential. Since that weekend, the Executive Board met with Barry by Zoom to discuss his report and has begun work on recommended next steps. Actions already taken range from the small and symbolic (for instance, sharing the Sunday offering with local charitable organizations) to much larger efforts like compiling historic pledge data and creating multiyear budget projects and costs for capital improvements.

Black Lives Matter Banner Task Force

The Black Lives Matter Banner Task Force was established at the request of the board: "The task force is charged to review the sign as it now appears with its distinctive iconography and, if it judges a change to be appropriate, to recommend an alternative or alternatives to be voted on by the Congregation at the Annual Meeting on June 2, 2024."

The Task Force has been meeting weekly and has:

- provided a survey on this issue to the congregation: we have received 21 responses so far

- performed research on Black Lives Matter and its associated iconography with the material available at: <u>https://bit.ly/49ZdWlv</u>

And the Task Force has scheduled listening sessions after church on Sunday Mar 24 and Apr 7. We will also hold a Zoom listening session tentatively scheduled for Wed Apr. 10: we will send out a formal announcement once this session is established.

Based on the research done by the Task Force and the input from the community, the Task Force is on track to make a recommendation at the annual meeting on Jun 2. UUA General Assembly



UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY VIRTUAL GA · JUNE 20 - 23, 2024 The 63rd General Assembly will take place virtually **Thursday, June 20 through Sunday, June 23, 2024**. Adult registration is \$280 and includes access to General Assembly 2024 in the Whova event app, as well as on-demand programming, featured speakers, and major worships. Register through February 29 with a down payment of \$50 by selecting the Early Bird Payment Plan at checkout. Voting delegates who wish to participate only in General Sessions may also register with the business-only option; this option is no-cost, but a donation is suggested. Registration rates increase March 1, 2024.

Update on the Proposed Revision of Article II

To be voted on at General Assembly 2024

At last year's General Assembly (GA), a preliminary proposed revision of Article II was passed after discussion and voting on a first set of amendments to the proposal. In October 2023, the Article II Study Commission incorporated the approved amendments and completed a <u>final draft</u> of its proposed revision. After that, further amendments, per UUA by-laws, could be submitted by congregational petition to the Study Commission. There are specific rules for this procedure and the deadline was



February 1, 2024. The process is described in <u>this letter</u> from the UUA Board to congregations, as well as in various articles on uua.org

Currently, the latest amendments are publicly posted on the <u>Discussion Forum</u>. There are <u>four amendments</u> that met all the submission criteria and will be moved to the final GA agenda for voting. [An editorial comment by this writer*: For anyone who has questioned some of the wording of the proposed revised Article II, these latest amendments might be of particular interest.]

Space for Wonder

In that envelope of time when I just wake up, eyes still closed on the edge of sleep, I am in my special time when I ask questions, see images, and tiptoe around, carefully maneuvering around my sleeping ego. I do not want to wake her just yet as she is all about schedules and customs, timelines, and to-do lists.

I have a small chair in this space where I can sit in silence, take my time, breathe in clarity and be with those that support me beyond the veil. This is truly my place where I am always welcomed, sated with images, wisdom, and comfort beyond the body.

I found this special place not by exploring, but by falling into despair. Day after day, year after year I woke to deep inner sorrow. As awareness dawned every morning, the veil of darkness descended. Before rising out of bed I was laden with heavy sadness weighing down my energy.

I coped for years lugging around my unresolved problems and despair. I side-stepped my anger and ignored the small whispering thoughts. I sought therapy and listened to their words. I circled around the advice, always landing on my despair. Until the day I decided enough.

Every day is a new beginning. Every morning holds that moment when my unconscious meets my conscious mind and thinking starts. With curiosity, I began nudging open that space between the unconscious and thinking mind and discovered the envelope.

I learned this in between space is much like when I sit in silence. My ego is less in control and my imagination is free to explore, to fly and create beyond expectations.

The transitional state between awake to sleep is termed the hypnagogic state [1]. I contend this transition exists the other way as well, between sleep and waking.

I jumped on the chance to explore this space hoping it would make a difference for me. I began by using

music setting it up to turn on about the time I stirred. I estimated around five o'clock or so. The music was upbeat. I think I used an oldies CD.

What initially happened was I woke to the words and music playing in my head. I created a distraction. I kept up this practice until I became bored with it. Next step I changed the music and kept going with that until I became bored.

I believe I nudged my mind away from the habit of sadness and distracted it with music. It helped.

I am my own advocate. I take action to help my discomfort.

I have learned this space of time is an easy time to ask for help. I experienced access to my Higher Power in this transitional state and using music helped ease my mind.

I believe the veil is thin during this period. I can have conversations with my spirit team, my Higher Self. I ask for clarity and support and guidance.

This morning, my agenda was the same. On cue as I stirred, I saw a beautiful colorful parrot and the word "wonder" accompanying it.

I thought I would write about wonder this morning, along with awe and beauty for the incredible colors and creations in nature.

As I sit with this inspiration with Google looking at images of parrots, I realize the true wonder is in finding this envelope of time, and creating this special space where I am in awe of the support, guidance and comfort having discovered a room of my own.
