

Ministerial Musings

Welcome to January! As always, with the new year comes a sense of promise and hope for the future. We wonder what will come in our lives. We make resolutions and flimsy promises. We enthusiastically tell ourselves, "This is the year that I will get in shape and be my best self!" ...well, at least until Groundhog Day.

Yet as optimistic as we might be for the future, we cannot shake the memories of the year that was 2025. A year when hope often seemed in short supply. We remember war and genocide, mass shootings, abuses of power, environmental disasters, reckless rhetoric, attacks on immigrants and refugees, rising food prices, and a growing sense of despair. This past year increased our collective anxiety, leaving us a nation harshly divided and angry at one another. It truly was a year many of us would like to forget.

But yet, as Unitarian Universalists, we simply are not able to turn a blind eye. We know that there is much work to be done to make our neighborhoods, our country, and our world a kinder and fairer place. For we are a faith that declares that every person is inherently worthy and has the right to flourish with dignity - *everyone* - not just with those whom we agree. We are a faith that seeks out justice and equity, in a very unequal and unjust world. We are a faith that understands that we are part of an interdependent web, and what affects one, affects us all. As UU's we are called to love one another in the best way we know how, *even with those whom we may not even like*.

These Unitarian Universalist values are easy to say, but what would it look like if we actually *lived* these values? Well, that is another matter altogether; something I am sure we all struggle with every day. Our principles call us to rise to be our best selves, even when we are angry and bitter. We try to live our values, but often we fail miserably. I am reminded of the words of the playwright Samuel Beckett, "Ever tried. Ever failed. No matter. Try Again. Fail Again. Fail Better."

So, as we enter into 2026, may we strive to open our hearts to the beloved stranger. May we move out of our comfort zones and challenge our preconceptions of *the other*. May we strive to respect our differences, and learn from those who see the world in a very different way. Some days we will make mistakes and forget our best selves, but I pray that we will have the wisdom to get back up and try again tomorrow. For if we are to heal our individual and collective wounds, this is what the times require of us.

My friends, compassion is hard to practice. But try again. Fail again. Fail better.

Tips for using the virtual hymnal

Hi all, thank you for your willingness to try out the virtual hymnal! I hope you have enjoyed some of the new songs we've programmed this fall. I've had some feedback from congregation members, and wanted to offer some tips on how to get the most out of the virtual hymnal, both in and out of the service.

1 - You can find upcoming (and past) Sing Out Love hymns at www.firstparishmedfield.org/hymns.

We don't have it more prominently featured on our website as we have a subscription for our congregation members only.

2 - If using a small device like a phone during the service, make sure your phone can rotate to landscape mode (horizontal) for a larger font size.

3 - Come early to church to snag a paper copy! I do print out a small number each time I incorporate a new hymn. They will be at the back of the church by the programs.

4-log into the website to listen to the pieces, explore hymns we haven't yet sung, and learn about their history of the pieces and biographies of the composers. E-mail me for the password!

The Executive Board hereby notifies all voting members of First Parish Unitarian Universalist Medfield of the Semi-Annual Parish Meeting, to be held **in person in the sanctuary and on the Zoom conference**

platform beginning at 11:30 AM on Sunday, January 11, 2026. A quorum of 25 percent of Full Members eligible to vote at the time of posting of this notice must be present to conduct the business of the Congregation. This translates to 19 members.

In accordance with the Bylaws of First Parish Medfield (approved on June 3, 2012 and amended on December 22, 2024) in Article 4.2, the Semi-Annual Meeting is described as follows:

Article 4.2 Midyear Meeting

Article 4.2.1 Time and Place: A semi-annual Parish meeting is held in the fall between the first day of November and the last day of January.

Article 4.2.2 Purpose: The semi-annual Parish meeting shall be held to update the Congregation on the status of the Church at the time of the meeting and conduct any other business as determined by the Executive Board.

The following topics will be addressed at the Semi-Annual Meeting:

- 1) Acceptance of minutes from June 8, 2025 annual meeting**
- 2) Report on the general state of the church by the board chair, Martha Castle**
- 3) Minister's report - Rev Dave Egan**
- 4) Financial update from the treasurer, Michael Taylor**
- 5) Capital Campaign Exploratory Committee findings presented by Glen D'Abate**

Over the past several years, First Parish Executive Boards have been increasingly concerned about the extensive physical needs of our historic Meeting House. It has become clear that First Parish cannot pay for necessary capital expenses from our budget or assets. In June 2025, the Board established a FPUU Capital Campaign Evaluation Committee. This committee met 7 times between June 16th and December 10th, 2025, with a mission to evaluate whether this is the right time to initiate a capital campaign at FPUU and, if so, what the scope and goals of this campaign would be. The Capital Campaign Evaluation Committee's full report will be sent with the meeting materials and will be presented at the meeting followed by a congregational vote whether to proceed with the capital campaign.

- 6) Authorization to enter into contract(s) for roofing and solar panel vendor(s)**

The Board is seeking authorization from the congregation to enter into contract(s) for a roofing vendor and a solar panel vendor (they may be the same vendor) to replace the 33-year-old Meeting House roof and install solar panels. This contract shall not exceed \$103,000. This meeting's approval is important given the time-constraints of solar panel direct incentive payments currently available.

7) Authorization to take a loan for up to \$100,000

The Board is seeking authorization from the congregation to take a loan for up to \$100,000 from either: (1) FPUU member(s); (2) Needham Bank; or (3) a solar panel vendor to allow First Parish to move forward with the Meeting House new roof/solar panel project ahead of the Capital Campaign funds being available.

8) Medfield Historical Society request to place King Philip's War historical sign on possible First Parish property presented by David Temple

The Medfield Historical Society (MHS) is seeking approval of placement of a sign commemorating the 350th anniversary of King Philip's War where the current Meeting House Pond sign resides. It is unclear whether First Parish owns this piece of land but to be certain, the MHS is seeking First Parish approval. The Board is in favor of allowing placement of the sign, and according to the FPUU Policy Governing Public Statements, is asking for the congregation's input and approval.

The sign will state the following:

Top of Marker: Medfield Town Seal
Heading 1: Medfield in King Philip's War
Heading 2: February 21, 1676

The raid on Medfield during King Philip's War was one of many by Native Americans to regain ancestral land and save their way of life. Before dawn on this date, several hundred Native warriors led by Nashaway Sachem Monoco moved silently into Medfield. Many residents had already sought refuge in five garrisons. About 75 armed inhabitants and 125 soldiers defended the town. After a morning of fierce fighting, a cannon fired near this spot to warn Dedham of the raid prompted the Native forces to withdraw across the Charles River. Thirty-two houses and two mills had been burned. Seventeen colonists and an unknown number of Natives were killed on this, the most significant day in Medfield history.

9) Anti-Racism Team proposal for congregation to support MA Indigenous Legislative Agenda presented by Jeanette Ruyle

The Massachusetts Indigenous Legislative Agenda involves an Indigenous-led coalition working to support five bills currently before the Massachusetts State Legislature that will benefit Indigenous Peoples. They have created an endorsement form for other organizations to sign in support of passing the legislation. Endorsements will be listed publicly. In concordance with our Unitarian Universalist values and principles, the Anti-racism Team of FPUU proposes that our congregation of First Parish Unitarian Universalist of Medfield sign on as an endorser.

Thank you, Fritz, for your work in protecting clear air, our health, and our environment. Thank you for helping FPUU be known around town as a "green sanctuary" in action!


