#### **Christmas Eve Charity Collection**

Each year First Parish splits the proceeds from the collection at the Christmas Eve service with a selected charity. This year we are going to donate half of the Christmas Eve collection to Habitat for Humanity. Specifically, our donation will go a local group —The Tri-Valley Local Partnership Committee, part of South Shore Habitat for Humanity, which represents Millis, Medfield and Medway. Its current project, just getting started, is the building of a Habitat home in Medway, with volunteers recruited from community churches, as well as from other community groups. It takes over 1000 volunteers to build a Habitat home! Funds donated will be used for the building and materials for this project.

#### From the D.R.E.

The word "worship" is thought to have originated from the Old English word for "worthy." With the suffix of "ship" (originally "scipe") meaning to create or appoint, we can think of worship as being what we find to have *worth* for us. Our annual Winter Solstice Worship Service traditionally reflects the hope, faith, and wonders of the winter season as worthy of our attention. The Winter Solstice Worship Service, coming up on Dec. 20, is not a show or performance, as I explained to the children during our planning luncheon in November. Children *do* perform all kinds of tasks to contribute to the service; this is often a significant accomplishment for them in their development. Much community building can take place as well, across the ages. I always say to the children the solstice service is their gift to the congregation. It is also a gift to themselves, though they may not recognize it as such.

Beginning on Sunday Nov. 29, and then on Dec. 6 and 13, children's religious education will consist of group activities focused on the winter solstice and the meanings behind some of the winter holiday traditions. I will be looking for just a few volunteers to assist with these three Sundays and at the solstice service. If you are interested in helping, please let me know.

This year, the Winter Solstice Worship Service will include some new and varied pieces of music. Also, there will be adults participating as readers. It truly will be a multi-generational experience.

#### Workshop Rotations

Children in RE, 6<sup>th</sup> grade and younger, have completed the two fall workshop rotations. The second one, with the theme of Wisdom From World Religions, finished in November. Children explored an Islamic folktale from Turkey by learning about calligraphy as an art form (and in Arabic too!), how to make rope, and various games from Turkey and the Mediterranean area. Interwoven in all of that were ideas about hope, faith, and taking action. Unfortunately, I do not have any photos from this rotation, so you must use your imagination. *If anyone would like to be an official RE photographer, let me know!* You could do this for as many Sundays as you like.

November 29<sup>th</sup> "Creative Goodness: Grace Found In Community"

Today we invite the Rev. Fayre Stephenson, Program Director of the Ferry Beach Camp and Conference Center to First Parish.

December 06<sup>th</sup> "Essentialism"

Essentialism is the spontaneous tendency to assume your group shares characteristics such as niceness, and intelligence. Today's sermon will look at the results of recent studies regarding children and race, and the role of adults in the formation of healthy attitudes about race in their children.

December 13<sup>th</sup> "Claiming the Right to Question"

Many of us grew up learning to equate faith with doctrine. One memorizes the doctrine, espouses the doctrine, lives the doctrine and in so doing becomes a person of faith. Often the word faith troubles us because it seems linked to narrow-minded belief systems, lack of intelligent examination, or pain at having our questions silenced. Today's sermon explores the concept of faith as an inner quality that unfolds as we learn to trust our own deepest experience and frees us to claim the right to question.

December 20<sup>th</sup> "Solstice Service"

"An Old Story of Hope, Darkness, and Light." This service is Inter-generational, led by the children of our Religious Education Program and coordinated by Jeanette Ruyle, DRE.

December 24<sup>th</sup> Christmas Eve Candlelight Service 5:30 p.m.

December 27<sup>th</sup> "Life Lessons I Have Learned From Cancer"

Few would argue that a cancer diagnosis is a gift. But can it offer gifts to the patient? In this service, we explore some of the life lessons learned during a year with cancer -- lessons that can help us all, whether we're dealing with disease or not.

January 03<sup>rd</sup> "Winter: A Spiritual Season"
