From the Minister

Dear Friends:

From June 23rd to June 27th we Unitarian Universalists will be holding our General Assembly (GA) in Minneapolis, MN. (GA) is the annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations. —General Assemblies shall make overall policy for carrying out the purposes of the Association and shall direct and control its affairs. Voting at each regular and special General Assembly shall be by accredited delegates from certified member congregations, certified associate member organizations, and trustees." (from the UUA bylaws)

If you are planning to attend please let me know, as there is paperwork necessary to give you voting powers at the assembly as a delegate from First Parish. If you are not attending, that does not mean that you can't participate in all that's going on. The UUA is making some of the proceedings and events available to on-line viewers.

This year, the Opening Celebration and Banner Parade will feature singer, songwriter, and Unitarian Universalist (UU) Peter Mayer.

The Ware Lecturer this year is Minnesotan Winona LaDuke, an internationally renowned Native American activist working on issues of sustainable development, renewable energy and food systems.

Rev. Dr. Galen Guengerich will be following up last year's hugely popular UU University program track, Theology for a Secular Age, with a new, eightpart workshop series entitled The Necessity of Virtue.

This year's General Assembly will also present dozens of workshops which support congregations and individuals in their spiritual growth. Please check out the following link for a complete list:

In addition, this year's General Assembly will offer Local Tours:

TOUR #1 Guided tour of three local Unitarian Universalist congregations and Sculpture Garden

See three of the Twin Cities' oldest (founded in the 1800s) and largest (500+ members) UU congregations. Trip includes guided tours of Unity Church-Unitarian in

St. Paul, The First Unitarian Society in Minneapolis and First Universalist Church in Minneapolis. Learn about the long and storied history of Unitarian Universalism in this area; for example, the oldest church in Minneapolis was built by First Universalist, the Humanist Manifesto I was signed by First Unitarian's minister, and William Channing Gannett served at Unity.

TOUR #2 Narrated boat ride down the Mississippi River

The historically narrated public sightseeing excursion departs from Harriet Island in St. Paul and runs 1 1/2 hours. Sights along the way include: the St. Paul High Bridge, Pig's Eye's Cave, Minnesota River mouth, Pike Island, Fort Snelling and the timeless splendor of the mighty Mississippi River. All sightseeing cruises offer a full bar and snacks, such as hot dogs and popcorn, at your own expense (please no outside food or beverage).

TOUR #3 Ethnic cook's tour of Minneapolis and St. Paul

Scheduling for the religious education program for children usually seems a bit scattered during the Sundays of April and early May because of Easter, school vacations, and the Walk For Hunger. This year, we have an unusually long time period between the two workshop Sundays of our final Rotation IV—April 11 and May 9—although we did offer a relevant all-ages activity on April 18 (see photos). One thing holding us together during this time has been a common thread reflected in these events:

- Rotation IV has been about exploring—the interdependent web of all existence" through the geological phenomenon of sand.
- 7th and 8th graders learned about the Judaism religion. Although they may not have discussed this directly, Judaism and the other Abrahamic religions have traditions involving honoring earth as God's creation. Other world religions view earth and all it contains as being divine in some way.
- 9th and 10th graders in Coming of Age have been reviewing core beliefs of their own and that of Unitarian Universalism.

 Contemplating their relationship to this planet and all of existence is part of that.
- As a congregation, we honored the 40th anniversary of Earth Day with a multigenerational worship service on April 25.
- We began a 40-day commitment to actions for the sake of the Earth, our environment, the inter-dependent web.

Earth Day Connections



About the -40-40-40" Earth Day Sunday worship service-- everyone at First Parish is welcome to join in on this idea. The idea is to choose to commit to some kind of action, of any size, that will in some way benefit our environment. There are many, many possibilities. Your action could be as simple as turning off the water while you brush your teeth. It could be as life-changing as giving up your car. It can be about conservation of water/land/wild life, reducing pollution, contacting your elected officials about your concerns, reducing energy consumption, being mindful about what you eat, recycling, picking up litter, and so on. No one is judging your action; it is for you to contemplate and experience what it is like to make a commitment of this type for this length of time. Our 40 days start from April 18, but you can begin this process at any point. Forty days is also about the length of time a conscious behavior has a chance of becoming a habit. In the vestry is a literal thread connecting all of the written commitments people made on April 25. Take a look! There are cards, pencils, and yarn for you to add your action if you would like.

40 DAYS OF EARTH DAY - IDEA:

CHECK YOUR ELECTRICAL USE-- FIND THE "ZOMBIE" ELECTRICITY HOGS IN YOUR HOME.

A "Kill-a-Watt" electrical meter is available to borrow. Use it for knowing how much electricity your appliances, entertainment systems, and computers are using. It is simple to use. Plug the KaW in the wall, plug your appliance into the KaW then read electrical use. Find those hidden, "zombie" electrical users that suck up power but don't provide any use. Find out how much power is wasted by the VCR, the instant-on TV in the basement, the empty refrigerator in the garage. See if your appliances measure up to today's standards. Contact Fred Bunger to borrow the Kill-a-Watt meter OR, check one out from the Medfield Public Library.

This sermon will look at the issues of immigration in Arizona as well as the recent legislation passed to deal with them. One of the proposed UUA Study Action issues for 2010-2014 being discussed next month at General Assembly is: —Immigration As a Moral Issue." We'll examine that proposal as well.
