Dear Friends:

This month we will be celebrating our fourth annual Association Sunday. Association Sundays are a request by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) for all congregations to recognize and support, both in spirit and financially, the national work of the Association. The UUA is asking all of our congregations to schedule a Sunday service and special collection to affirm our connection, and to bring our resources together for greater effect. These Sundays are an opportunity for us to come together to grow our faith and our influence in the world.

Here at FPUU we will be joining with more than 500 UU congregations in celebrating Association Sunday on October 3rd. Proceeds from this year's Association Sunday special collection will go to ensuring that our faith thrives for generations to come. The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) will embark on an indepth strategic review of leadership and growth in order to develop an action plan to strengthen our community for future generations.

As you may know, 2011 is the 50th anniversary of the creation of the Unitarian Universalist Association as the result of the merger between Unitarians and Universalists. As we begin our next fifty years, Peter Morales has this to say about how he sees his vision/our mission:

"We want congregations that are spiritually deep places where strong and enduring relationships can flourish, and that are engaged in their communities as sources of moral vision and effective action. We want our religious homes to be truly multi-generational and reflect the racial and cultural diversity of the wider world. And, we want professional religious leaders who are visionary, spiritual, innovative, and diverse."—The Rev. Peter Morales, President of the UUA

Since the beginning of these "Association Sundays" the UUA has been more focused on delivering "specific" services to our churches. As one example, the "Tapestry of Faith" curriculum that has recently been released and is free to congregations is (in my humble opinion) excellent and is being considered seriously for use at FPUU before this year is out.

As you may remember the UUA's original target was fifty million dollars; twenty million in immediate funding and thirty million in legacy grants (pledges to be collected over time). On Sunday October 3rd I will give you a full accounting of our progress and bring you up to date on what initiatives have been accomplished and what is yet to come.

FPUU Executive Board Notes

Notes from Meeting September 16th

- Finalized hiring of <u>new Director of Religious Education</u>, **Shelley Dennis** who started work on September 7.
- Finalized hiring of new <u>Administrator</u>, **Sandra Andreassi** who began work September 8.
- <u>Church Calendar</u> process established: all meeting and activity dates will be put on the website calendar by the Administrator.
- Voted to recommend that the <u>UHouse roof</u> be replaced. \$9000 cost must be approved by the members of the Church. Special Meeting called for Sunday October 3. This item is not in the budget.
- <u>Wireless antenna</u>: T-Mobil to do structural study of steeple. They plan to file with Town this month. Historical study of steeple design completed. It will provide basis for eventual design of new spire.

October 3 Special Meeting

A Special Meeting of the First Parish will be held following Church service at 11AM on October 3rd. The purpose of the meeting is to authorize funds for replacement of the UHouse roof. The roof has been leaking for several years. The leaks have increased and are affecting a closet and classroom. There are several layers of roofing and patching or partial replacement are not viable options. The cost is quoted at \$8800 so the Board is requesting \$9000 to cover any incidental costs. This expense is not budgeted, and there is no money in the capital reserve account. There is enough free cash to do the work in October, but we will face the end of the year with a larger deficit. We may need to consider a special fundraiser to help cover the cost of the roof.

This meeting will take less than 15 minutes and will directly follow the service before coffee hour. A quorum will be needed. Please plan to attend.

4 October 3rd Association Sunday

This Sunday marks the fourth annual appeal from the UUA to fund the growth and diversity of our association. Proceeds from this year's Association Sunday special collection will go to ensuring that our faith thrives for generations to come. Beginning in spring 2010, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) will embark on an in-depth strategic review of leadership and growth in order to develop an action plan to strengthen our community for future generations. Today I will report on the UUA's progress and future plans.

4 October 10th "Getting Past God: What UU's Can Take Along" Dr. Gary Strichartz

Today we will have a guest seminarian from Andover-Newton Theological School as is our custom each year on this weekend. In his sermon, Dr. Strichartz will address the question: Does humanism fulfill our religious and spiritual needs or can we realize within a "modern mysticism" the connections between scientific paradigm and spiritual truth?

4 October 17th "Who Tells You Who You Are?"

The title of this sermon is a question that William Sloane Coffin asked shortly before he died in 2006. Another form of this question is: "Whose Are You"? Today we will ask these questions of ourselves and examine their importance to our lives.

4 October 24th "The Heart of God: Creativity"

Today we will look at Process Theology. Over the years I have explained in small doses how Process Theology influences my belief and living. Today I will attempt to define it more fully.

4 October 31st "Whose Afraid of the Wicked Witch?"

In celebration of Halloween I will examine the history of pagan religion and the place witches had in it. Is there anything of value in it? Should we dismiss, condemn or perhaps even fear pagans? These are some of the questions that today's sermon will attempt to answer.
