## From the Minister



Dear Friends:

Over the past two months we have made significant progress in the IF Justice Study group. I hope you like our new logo as Marcia Trahan took a concept agreed upon by the study group and turned it into a beautiful reality. But we are more than the pretty face our logo affords us. We have developed a mission statement and a set of goals. Here they are:

### **IF (Initiatives For) Justice**

**Mission:** To identify and act on humanitarian service opportunities that will educate FPUU participants, empower recipients, and build bonds of friendship and respect.

**Goals:**

1. Educate FPUU about social, economic, and political inequities.
2. Establish an enduring relationship with a community by way of a reliable, established agency.
3. Perform service that is meaningful, measurable, needed, and lasting, on a scale appropriate for our time and resources.

On a daily basis we are bombarded with images and stories that make us feel we could do more. We know that our participation in a service activity won't change the frequency of the images and stories that break our hearts. So, we do what we can do. We establish relationships in a community that we can engage with year over year. We learn first hand why things are as they are and we ask, "What can we do to help empower you."

If this sounds interesting to you, I invite you to join the IF Justice study group. Expect that doing so will facilitate the opportunity to come to new understandings and integrate them into your faith and life. This group will offer some time for reflection on the work we choose. When reflection is minimal or missing—when those involved in short-term missions do not ruminate on their experiences, ponder the situations of those served and relate them to their own understanding—a precious opportunity is lost.

Such encounters disturb our spiritual status quo. It is one thing to work alongside people living in humble circumstances; it is quite another to ask why the prosperity of a relative few is predicated upon the existence of a permanent global underclass. That is an example of something explored by reflection.

We meet again on Sunday, March 6<sup>th</sup> from 11:30 a.m. until 12:15 in the sanctuary as we continue our exploration of agencies we may partner with. Hope to see you there.

## From the Director of Religious Education

### LIVING THE DREAM

So many wonderful things are happening in and around Religious Education it's hard for me to know where to start. The Visioning session was amazing—we had a great turnout, and everyone who participated deepened and enriched the conversation. We created a veeeerrrry loooooong list of the many qualities, traits, skills and ideas we wanted to foster in our children. There were several suggestions made at the visioning, and we are already acting on them—living the dream, as it were.

For example, Rev. Bob suggested the idea of having youth on committees. Subsequently, the Religious Education Committee has invited Lizzie Bryant and Jack Kornet to become members. Lizzie has already attending one meeting (unfortunately Jack was sick), and her perspective was incredibly helpful. She came with many ideas for adjustments we could make to our RE programming that would provide for deepening relationships between the children and fostering thoughtful reflection on the themes raised in the stories and activities. She spoke strongly in favor of increased youth participation in Sunday worship service, and said that lighting the chalice and collecting the offering were things that made her feel acknowledged by the church as a budding leader.

Several people have asked me how they can increase youth participation, and I have one suggestion for all of them: talk to the older youth during coffee hour, the same as you do the adults.

Ask them questions, run your ideas past them. Get to know who they are, what their skills are, what they enjoy. A lot of committee work is informally addressed over coffee hour, and including a youth perspective can be a part of that work. This informal survey of the youth and children makes it possible to include their many, excellent, ideas into your committee's plans. Maybe you will some new ideas that will invigorate your committee, and possibly you get an energetic new committee member out of the deal as time goes on!

### WHAT'S THE STORY?

THIS MONTH'S THEME: LOVE CONNECTS US

This month we begin using the Love Connects Us curriculum in earnest. We will select two stories from the curriculum. One possibility is the story of Joseph Tuckerman, one of the founders of the Benevolent Fraternity, which is now known as the Unitarian Universalist Urban Ministry. Joseph Tuckerman was a minister who was more interested in serving the poor than impressing people with academic papers. He believed that the best way to help people was by talking with them to find out what they need most. I'm bringing this story to the forefront in this newsletter because several of the children have expressed an interest in doing social actions that involve both direct contact and developing relationships with those they are

## **FAMILY TRADITIONS:**

### CREATING A UU HOME

Way back in November, which seems soooooo long ago, the RE committee and I were engaged in deep discussion over emails regarding family-based spiritual practices. Initially, some of us weren't sure we had any family-based spiritual practices. Then we realized that any family ritual that draws us into deep, authentic connection can be seen as a spiritual practice. Practices which deepen

authentic intimacy brings to life the words of the First Principle, tangibly demonstrating our deep honor for our children's worth and dignity.

For my family, mealtimes were always an important time to connect. Like other families, our schedules didn't always lend themselves to nightly dinner together, but we made a commitment to having Family Dinner at least twice a week. At dinner, we played "Three Goods and a Bad," each of us sharing three good things and one bad about each day. We each took turns, and listened attentively to the ups and downs of each other's days, sharing in the joys of the "goods" without trying to fix or change the "bads." Mindfully connecting to each other was the only purpose of the game. Including the bad things sent a clear message that neither life nor my children had to be perfect in order to be worthwhile. Now that we are miles apart, we play this game via text, and still feel connected.

What meal time rituals does your family share that helps you connect more deeply to one another in ways that reflect your Unitarian Universalist values?

### FPUU Board Notes:

- **NEW SPIRE APPROVED:** At a Special Parish Meeting on February 13, 2011, a quorum (30+) of the congregation unanimously authorized the FPUU Executive Board to:
  - Conclude negotiations and sign the contracts with T-Mobile and MetroPCS.
  - Design, engineer and construct a new 50 ft. spire to replace the existing spire at a cost not to exceed \$110,000.
  - Arrange for financing to secure funds to build the spire (the 2 wireless carriers will be expected to pay for 50% of the cost of the spire).
  - Finalize a design for the new spire.

All of the above is to be accomplished in the best interest of the Church.

Both contracts must be signed before proceeding with the project. The financial analysis indicated that the \$60,000 invested in the new spire would provide a 23.1% rate of return assuming a potential for up to 4 carriers over 4 years.

- Fritz Fleishmann, Mark Samels and CB Doub are working together to apply for grant funding to help First Parish.

**FPUU Announcements**

Our GAYT program began on November 21, 2010, and officially ended January 9, 2011.

\$1,125 in donations were collected from First Parishioners, eight qualifying for matching gifts from Shelter Rock Congregation (\$825); one qualifying for a company match (\$100) for a total of \$2,050 so far.

This compares with last year's amount of \$2,855 total, which includes matching gifts and a company match.
