Dear Friends:

On Sunday, May 1st Project Bread will be sponsoring the 43rd Walk For Hunger. The Walk For Hunger is the oldest continual pledge walk in the United States and as its website (<u>www.projectbread.org</u>) points out, it is one of the few walks dedicated to a social justice issue. Elsewhere in this newsletter, Louise Rachin provides the details for joining the First Parish Team of walkers; where and when to meet, how to prepare and how to register and get sponsors.

Today, Massachusetts estimates that over 500,000 people in this state alone are struggling to put food on the table. Project Bread is dedicated to finding creative ways to take measures that reduce hunger across the state. Project Bread has developed and supports four distinct programs for identifying and responding to people at risk

First, Project Bread educates people about food stamps and the requirements for receiving them.

Second, Project Bread has set up and advertises a "Food Source Hotline" which is available in 140 languages and also accommodates those with loss of hearing. Food source hotline counselors refer callers to sources for food in their local communities and also offer guidelines on good nutrition.

Third, Project Bread has instituted the Pediatric Hunger Prevention Project. This project trains health care providers to identify families at risk for hunger, and how to help them. In 2005, Project Bread began partnering with community health centers to show that hunger screening can be incorporated into a health care setting easily. Community centers were chosen because they are very effective at reaching out to low-income families.

Fourth, Project Bread has been involved with improving the quality and supply of meals available to children through school breakfast programs, after-school programs, and at children's summer recreation sites. This is work that I have been involved with myself through the Tuckerman Coalition and Promise Mass. Children and I know first hand of the great influence that Project Bread's funding has and of the great effect of the compassion they demonstrate in their work.

Whether you walk one or five or twenty of the miles of this Walk, I encourage you to participate if you can. You can of course also participate by sponsoring someone in our community who is walking. The Walk For Hunger supports Project Bread that understands that the systemic cause of hunger is poverty. They recognize that many of the hungry in Massachusetts are either children who are facing diminished health because of their lack of proper nutrition or elderly singles and couples on fixed-incomes who are in a constant struggle with whether to buy heat or buy food. No one should have to start their life with improper nutrition or end their life with a worry of how they will eat tonight.

From the Director of Religious Education

IT IS SO EASY BEING GREEN!

Hi everyone~

During the month of May the children's RE program will be focusing on Seventh Principle issues, which is a terrific coincidence, because I'd like to share with all of you some really exciting news. Recently I was chosen to be the intern for the Green Sanctuaries program at the UUA. It has been so exciting that I can't help but share my enthusiasm! I've had the pleasure of reviewing applications for Green Sanctuary Certification from around the country, and I'm inspired by what's happening out there.

For example, the UU church in Shaker Heights, Ohio has put in a 72-plot community garden. They farm 10 plots for donation to the local food bank. Of the remaining 62 plots, about half are farmed by non-churched members so they're doing great outreach to the community at the same time that they're working for a greener planet. The New Braunfels, Texas church has found new life through participating in the Green Sanctuaries program. The majority of their small, 73-member congregation is rallied around environmental issues and they are working to integrate sustainable living themes into every other element of their church life together. Not only that, but they are receiving a tremendous amount of positive press in the local newspaper as the result of their programs.

What excites me most about this program is the potential to unite the work of many committees in our church around a single theme. That type of coordination may help us all to feel like we are working in a common direction. If you happen to be on more than one committee, you can then create ways that your contributions serve both committees more effectively. The same applies if you happen to be involved in community-wide sustainability issues—you may end up using one project for both groups! It's possible that such certification could open the door to additional grant funding down the road, including grant funding to help replace the U House with a LEED certified building. Plus—there could be plenty of opportunity for good press coverage in the local newspaper which may boost the number of new visitors coming through our doors!

In order to earn Green Sanctuary Certification, a church has to take small but meaningful steps toward greater environmental awareness and practice. So, although the church doesn't need to go geothermal to receive certification, a church *does* need to make some forward progress.

Here is more detailed info about the types and numbers of projects required, along with some examples of things that might be appropriate here at First Parish:

1) Worship and Celebration: Two projects

Examples of possible projects: Earth Day service; Earth Day celebration with booths educating people about environmentally sound practices, commitment to one environmentally-themed reading or hymn during service every month; holding an environmental film festival.

- 2) Religious Education: Two projects, one for adults and one for children Examples of possible projects: most churches do a Northwest Earth Institute curriculum for their adult RE component. children's RE programs can use "The Story of Stuff" curriculum, have a children's garden plot, do a clean-up day with facilitated discussion about how the activity chosen relates to the Seventh Principle and why it is important.
- 3) Environmental Justice: Two projects, one of which involves establishing long term relationships. Examples of possible projects: hold a film festival about ethical eating; make a cookbook of vegetarian meals; hold an organic food drive for the food bank; work with UU Urban Ministries to teach urban gardening and/or composting to the people receiving services there; donating CFL's to a homeless shelter or to people in low-income housing; work with Habitat for Humanity on a building project and provide a recycling bin for the worksite.
- 4) Sustainable Living: Four projects

Energy audit of our buildings; weatherization of the U House; the Farmer's Market; we can establish a compost bin; a demo permaculture plot; a demo native grasses and plants garden; a rain garden to filter the run-off from the parking lot before it reaches the pond; encourage members to make small lifestyle changes; include Green Tips for White Space (a list of tips that get inserted into each newsletter or on OOS when space is available).



From the Executive Board

FPUU Board Notes:

- Farmers Market: First Parish is proposing to host a Farmers Market on Church grounds beginning in the summer. Tentatively, we will run the market from 1 to 6 on Thursdays. Local farmers and vendors will be given preference. Sandra Andreassi, Administrator will handle contracts and vendor relations, but volunteers will be needed to help with market operation. On May 2, FPUU goes before the Town Planning Board to seek approval of the Site Plan for the Farmers Market. Members are urged to attend to support our application.
- Religious Education: Shelley Dennis discussed the possibility of a new "Youth Membership" or "Junior Membership" category for 14-to-16 year olds as they finish their Coming of Age. Shelley encourages the committees to integrate activities and urges the involvement of youth members in Committees. Shelley is also working with the UUA on a Green Sanctuary Program - she would like to approach the church members to see if any would like to get involved (See Shelley's article about Green Sanctuary in this May newsletter)
- Rentals: A new brochure to market the opportunities for renting Church spaces has been prepared. It will be posted on the website.
- Spire Project: FPUU is awaiting T-Mobile and MetroPCS to review and take action on the contract proposals. Engineer interviews are complete. No action will be taken without signed contracts with both wireless carriers. (No change from March)
- Succession Planning: Still seeking nominees for Treasurer and At-Large FPUU Board members. Please see Rebecca Stephenson, Nominating Committee Chair.
