#### **Ministerial MUUsings...**

## INHERENT WORTH AND DIGNITY

Years ago I had a co-worker from India, Jyothi. At a work retreat she shared the story of her birth—she'd been born in rural India, on a banana leaf under the moonlight. This was such a romantic picture that I easily overlooked the fear her mother must have felt giving birth in a completely remote area with no one to look after her or her baby.

The reality of childbirth for mothers in developing countries is not romantic at all; their needs are underserved and mortality rates are higher as a result. For example, the maternal death rate in Haiti is 65 times the rate in the US! A friend of mine, Jocelyn Brown, is just finishing her training as a midwife and will be volunteering as a midwife for MamaBaby Haiti, a position that she must fund herself to the tune of at least \$150/week.

Since the IF Justice group has considered Haiti a possible destination for a service mission trip, I thought we could direct the children's RE fundraising efforts to paying for at least one week of Jocelyn's stay with MamaBaby Haiti. That way we are beginning a youth congregation to learn more about Haiti and developing relationships with organizations there as well. Who knows? Maybe someday someone in our ~~October 16<sup>th</sup>~~ <sup>October 23<sup>rd</sup> Oct will meet one of the babies born during the week we sponsor.</sup>

Our fundraiser will be facilitated by the women from Hearts for Hope, a non-profit organization that assists school and church groups with fundraising, who will join us for Children's RE on October 16<sup>th</sup>. They will guide us in making beaded sun catchers with Swarovski crystal hearts that we will sell during coffee hour, so be sure to bring some money to buy these beautiful sun catchers made by our very own children and youth!

## WHAT'S THE STORY?

### THIS MONTH'S THEME: WHAT ARE PRINCIPLES?

Ours is a creedless faith, a source of both joy and consternation. We are so diverse we are often hard pressed to answer the question "What do UU's believe?" Nonetheless, we *do* have the Seven Principles, with which most of us agree. This month we will be embarking on an exploration of the various ways of enacting our First Principle—the promotion of the worth and dignity of each person.

## BRINGING IT HOME:

### QUESTIONS FOR CONVERSATION

It is easy enough to say that each person has dignity and worth, but this can be challenging to enact as we go through our busy days. Furthermore, it's quite possible that each of us has different twists or spins on this principle and that each of us feels moved to different actions in response to it. During a family dinner, or at bedtime, take a few minutes to reflect with your child on the following questions: What did I do today to show that I respect each person's worth and dignity? What's one thing I can do tomorrow to build on that? How did other people show me that I am worthy? When people behave in ways that make me, or someone else in the room, feel small, how can I stand up for myself? These questions are just some of the questions that may arise, and there are no right answers. The goal is to get you thinking, and get you talking, alongside your children.

## FAMILY TRADITIONS:

### CREATING A UU HOME

Pay extra attention to times when your child shows respect for other people through acts of kindness and consideration. Point out instances of your

child acting faithfully, that is, in a way that reflects the Principle of inherent worth and dignity. Also, notice when you demonstrate this behavior yourself and let your children know that you are not merely "being polite" by holding open a door, saying hello to a neighbor, or donating to charity, but you are acting on your deeply held conviction that all people have worth and dignity.

## Executive Board Notes

- Wireless Update: On September 18, the Congregation voted to proceed with the installation of a new spire. A \$50,000 gift plus the \$25,000 from T-Mobile leaves only \$35,000 to be financed by FPUU. David Maxson provided a thorough financial analysis of the project.
- The Medfield Zoning Board of Appeals is considering T-Mobile's application for permission to install an antenna in the FPUU spire. Engineering will begin when a completed contract is signed with T-Mobile.
- Planning Retreat: A retreat for FPUU Executive Board, Committee Chairs and interested Church members is being planned for Saturday October 29 9:30 to 3 PM. The purpose of the retreat is to begin the transition process that the Church will be experiencing over the next two years. Rev. Stower will be facilitating the day. Members of the Executive Board, committee chairs or their representatives are asked to attend. Any other member of First Parish who is interested in participating is asked to talk with Rev. Stower.
- Treasurer's Advisory Board: Glen D'Abate, Peter Gaines Steve Rose, and Michael Taylor have agreed to serve on a Treasurer's Advisory Board to:
  1. To make arrangements for, and schedule audits of the Church financial reports.
  2. To provide advice on the handling of the Church endowment funds
  3. To provide advice and help to the Treasurer as needed.

- Farmers' Market: The Market continues to attract a good crowd on Thursday afternoons from 2 to 6:30 and will run through Oct. 27 FPUU will be applying to the Planning Board to extend the Farmers' Market through the winter months.
- Medfield Day: FPUU had a fun and successful Medfield Day.

The Historic Clock Tower tour attracted 43 intrepid climbers who donated \$47.



The Bake Sale headed up by Jen Bartle, Queen of Cakes, made \$ 556.



The children's pumpkin painting sold out 150 pumpkins and brought in \$150.



A Farmers' Market table was set up to provide Market information and sell tomatoes and potatoes. Vegetable sales netted \$70.

## Metrowest Pet Pantry



*"Two and a half years ago, I lost my job and became desperate, yet too ashamed to ask for help. Before I eventually went on food stamps (which do not cover pet food), the dogs, cat and I were eating cooked plain spaghetti twice a day for quite some time. I didn't know a place like yours existed. Well, I finally found work, am off food stamps and we are all eating much better. Now that I know what it's like, I will help whenever I can." –A grateful pet owner, now a Metrowest Pet Pantry volunteer*

My name is Brianna Cusanno (daughter of Frank and Nancy); I am a lifelong Medfield resident, longtime member of FPUU, and a Girl Scout. When I decided to earn my Girl Scout Gold Award I knew I wanted to do something that would help both families and animals in need. I knew that especially because of the recession, many families are dealing with economic struggle. I realized that people facing financial difficulties might need to choose between feeding themselves or feeding a beloved pet. They might even have to give up a pet to a shelter. For families already suffering under the burden of financial trouble, giving up a pet that can provide so much comfort might be a crippling blow. Furthermore, as I began researching for my project I found out that the Humane Society estimates that between three and four million cats and dogs are euthanized each year. After learning about the effects of the recession as well as investigating how the economic climate has affected animal care, I became determined to help.

And then I learned about the Metrowest Pet Pantry and its founder, Shelley Goes. Metrowest Pet Pantry's mission is to "keep pets together with their families" by providing food and supplies for families in need. Ms. Goes decided to open a pet food pantry because she'd "been volunteering for animal rescue for over 10 years.

Over those years, I realized just how many people/families have to give up their beloved pet(s) because they can't afford to care for them. [I] thought [that] even if I could help a few people, it'd be worth it." After nearly five years of considering opening her own pet food pantry, Shelley took action in April 2010. Metrowest Pet Pantry Ms. Goes says she now receives inquiries about the pet pantry almost every day.

My goal and Shelley's goals can't be realized however, until Metrowest has a strong volunteer base to help with fundraising and donations. My role is to create awareness about Metrowest Pet Pantry, set up a system of donation bins, and most importantly to provide the pet pantry with a strong volunteer base. At the end of July I put up my first donation bin, which is located at Shaws in Medfield. So far the response to my project has been overwhelming. Every week the bin has been filled with donations, and one young girl and her father volunteered to build and decorate the gorgeous donation bin that has replaced my original Rubbermaid box. I plan to have two to three more boxes set up before the end of August.

I have now also set up bins at the Center for the Medfield Council on Aging, and at the Medway Starmarket. I am pleased to announce that a fourth bin has been established at First Parish. The pantry accepts all donations of pet food and supplies (including used or unused pet beds or leashes, as well as new and opened bags of pet food). Metrowest especially needs cat food and kitty litter. The pet pantry greatly appreciates whatever you can donate, whether this been in the form of material food in supplies or in the donation of your time as a volunteer.

The quote at the beginning of this article came in an email I received after the Shaws collection bin had been in place for only one week. ## Holly Near: a fundraising concert to abolish hunger
