Ministerial MUUsings...

Beverly Gaventa, a professor at Princeton Theological Seminary, tells the story of what happened to her one Sunday in early December. After the service, members of her church gathered in the parish hall for some cider and cookies. One member of the church smiled radiantly at her and said, "I envy your work this time of year. Teaching New Testament must make you feel especially close to the meaning of Christmas. That's where I'd like to be." Just a few minutes later, Professor Gaventa's friend, the pastor, came up to her and quietly confided, "God, I'm sick of this season already, and its just started." These reactions speak to the ambivalence many of us feel about Christmas. It speaks to the conflict we have over the way to celebrate the holiday season. It is becoming increasingly difficult to ignore our conflicted feelings, what with decorations up and Christmas music being played on radio stations around Halloween. "Black Friday" has taken on a life of its own and often brings out the worst in us. Dignity isn't bought with a discount. And then we are hard on ourselves as we get caught up in the hustle and bustle.

As a Unitarian Universalist, I don't totally accept the position of the "Keep Christ in Christmas" adherents, but I understand the impulse. For me, Christmas, as much as Hanukah, is about faith and hope. Hanukah, which overlaps with Christmas this year, also celebrates the cause of religious freedom. The focus should not be on presents or material things. Both holidays celebrate light being brought into the world at the darkest time of the year. Light amidst the darkness. This is something to contemplate.

Again, Hanukah celebrates the miracle of a flame burning for eight days and nights from oil that should have lasted only one day. Jesus, a child born of ordinary parents in an ordinary way led an extraordinary life. He was born as all children are born, in innocence and with great hope. Some say he was the Son of God, or a teacher, a martyr, a healer, a revolutionary. But first and foremost this child was a prophet, as all children are prophets; for, as the prophets of the ancient Israelites did, children hold all of us adults accountable for the successes and failures of our community. All children are prophets because, by their mere presence, they hold us accountable for their world. And yet why, in so many places around the world, including the United States, why are children on the margins? Why are millions malnourished and without clear water or good health care? Why are children ignored or abused or even worse, enslaved?

This past Sunday "Guest at Your Table" boxes were distributed and will be available for those of you who didn't get one over the next several weeks. The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee has among its many projects those that directly help children. In this season of celebration of the birth of a child, let us dedicate ourselves to bringing children out of the darkness and despair they face. Please be generous with your contribution.

We are called to hope in a time of hopelessness. We are called to act on that hope and to use our gifts and abilities – intellectual, spiritual and physical – to turn the tide of dismay into a river of promise.

Executive Board Notes for November

- <u>RE Director</u>: Joyce Fetterol has stepped in to provide continuity for the RE Program through the end of the Church year. The RE Committee and Rev. Stower decided not to search for an Interim RE Director. The search for RE Director will begin in the spring, so that a new RE Director can be on board for next year.
- <u>Wireless Update:</u> The Town ZBA approved T-Mobile's application for wireless antenna in First Parish spire on November 2. T-Mobile has indicated that they will wait until January to proceed. MetroPCS is considering the FPUU contract proposal and we are awaiting further contact. The Massachusett State Historical Commission and the Town Historical District Commission have been notified that FPUU intends to modify the spire and provide for wireless equipment installation. They are required to respond within 90 days.
- <u>Planning Retreat:</u> The FPUU Executive Board, Committee Chairs and interested Church members met Saturday October 29. Rev. Stower facilitated a discussion of the 5 developmental tasks in preparing FPUU to be successful in calling a new minister:

1. Coming to terms with the history of the First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church in Medfield.

2. Illuminating the congregation's unique

identity and culture, its strengths, needs and challenges.

3. Clarifying the multiple layers of leadership in the congregation and navigating the shifts in leadership that happen in a time of transition.

4. Renewing and strengthening connections with the UUA and beyond. 5. Renewing the congregation's vision, strengthen its stewardship, prepare for new professional leadership and look toward the future with anticipation and zest. **Richard Stower will be leading more sessions the Church development over the next year. If you would like to participate, please contact Rev.Stower.**

- <u>Mid-Year Meeting</u>: The Board decided to defer the mid-year meeting until January. Currently, there is no congregational business to conduct and wireless and financial status should be clearer after the first of the year.
- <u>Fundraising and Calendar:</u> Either the last Saturday of February or the First Saturday in March have been reserved for an as-yet determined fundraising event to replace the Auction held the last 3 years. The Board is seeking creative ideas for an evening of fun, friends and fundraising. Who would like to help?
