### Who are We? Who Are Our Neighbors? Learning to Speak Christian

The foundational source of Unitarian Universalism is what we might call the alternative Judeo-Christian tradition. It informs our Unitarian Universalist assumptions about the nature of the universe, of human beings, of the human predicament and our best responses to it, and the nature of what lies beyond and within all that is. Yet many of us are reluctant to embrace or acknowledge this -- we mistakenly identify "Christianity" solely with a contemporary, dominant form of Christianity that is not our primary heritage.

This class will explore basic Christianity, especially its two great divergent streams, and place them in historical and theological relationship to our contemporary Unitarian Universalist movement.

# From the Director of Religious Education



Greetings from your new Director of Religious Education! Can I tell you what I think about when I think about religious education? I'll start with what I think it's not...

First, it's not something that happens only on

**Sunday mornings** (in the Christian tradition). It's something we experience throughout our days, throughout our lives.

Second, it's **not just for children**. All of us can and should be engaged in learning at every age. (I try not to use the word "should" too much, but in this case, it's true!)

Third, it's **not necessarily about content or curriculum**. The most meaningful and memorable "religious education" is what we learn from one

another, about how to be in community together, and how very holy that is.

All of that being said, I will at first be focusing on Sunday morning programming for kindergarteners through sixth graders, primarily relying on the UU's Tapestry of Faith curriculum. As many of you know, Tapestry of Faith uses stories, discussion, experiential learning, and creative expression to encourage participants to reflect on the meaning and the practice and the challenges of things like "home," "community," "family," "forgiveness" and "justice."

We'll begin this fall with kids and adults crafting a covenant (an agreement about how we want to be together) and we'll have kids who've been in the program for a while teach the rest of us (or at least me) how children's worship has been done at FPUU. Then we'll figure out as a new group whether we want to make any changes. Throughout, we'll be referring to UU's Seven

Principles and talking about what they mean and how they can guide what we're doing.

Meanwhile, the question I will always be asking myself, and what I'd like you to think about, is this: How can this RE program provide sacred learning space?

Consider not just physical space but conversational space, creative space, relational space, and reflective space. The possibilities are many, and the ideas will come not just from me as the DRE but from everyone, including the kids.

I like to think about how all of these spaces might encourage **connection** of participants—to one another, to themselves, to the congregation, and to the wider world. I also want the RE program to build a capacity for **curiosity**. My hope is that everyone who participates (not just young people, but myself and other adults too) will learn with and from and alongside one another, drawing on their own perspectives and life experiences, and going beyond those (in a developmentally appropriate way) to what might be unfamiliar or challenging. Ideally, our differences will interest us rather than scare us, so instead of being fearful, we can be "wonder"ful! How does this happen?

### Stories

Our own experiences and stories are often our most powerful teachers, and hearing other people's (and other cultures') experiences and stories—truly entering into the experience of another—is how we develop understanding of and caring for each other, with all our differences and our struggles. We can read stories, tell stories, illustrate stories, act them out, respond to them

and explore where they take us in body, mind or spirit.

#### Rituals

Ritual helps promote sacred learning, connection and curiosity too. Ritual helps us enter into sacred space, mark it as special. That's why there's so much ritual in our worship. It opens up possibilities of something new happening, within us and between us and beyond us.

#### Questions

Unitarian Universalism is more about "searching" than "knowing," and its commitment is to community rather than ideology. UUism, and certainly RE, is concerned with how we ask and answer questions in community. We may have our own personal questions, but the big questions, the sacred questions, require us to go beyond ourselves. This is, to me, the hardest and most important work there is. Developing and maintaining a stance towards each other and the world that is both loving and questioning.


I promise to get more specific about this fall's themes and activities, but I wanted to give you a sense of where I'm starting from.

Executive Board meetings were held on June 13 and August 15, 2013

- Medfield Day Saturday, September 21 Plans are moving ahead for First Parish activities.
- ❖ Pledge Collections for 2013 and for 2014: Fiscal year 2013: \$109,600 of the \$117,500 pledged has been collected (93%). Fiscal year 2014: \$29,000 of the \$111,063 pledged has been collected (26%).

- For people interested in knowing more about FPUU and Unitarian Universalism, brochures and information will be set out and Rev. Meg will be available all day.



# A Bit of FPUU History...

The great hurricane of 1938 roared up the east coast and struck New England on September 21. Some 700 people were killed, over 50,000 houses were damaged or destroyed, and the damage total was the equivalent of nearly \$5 billion 2013 dollars.

The late Dorothy Kane was an active member at FPUU for decades; her husband, Howard, well into his 90s, still attends regularly. Dot once told David Temple she was sitting on the steps of the library, looking across at our church, during the hurricane. A gust tore off the steeple, flipped it around, and drove it into the roof like a spear. After she saw this, she understated, "I thought I'd better go home."

When the roof was repaired, the heavy slate steeple tip was left at the far end of the attic. In person, you can still see it, but it's too dangerous to attempt to get close enough for a decent photo.

As in the past, First Parish will be collecting food items for the Medfield Food Cupboard. The Food Cupboard exists to provide assistance to residents of Medfield who are in need of supplemental or emergency food. The Medfield Food Cupboard is generously supported by the residents of Medfield, the town's churches, and various community organizations.

To meet the needs of their clients, food distributions are held approximately every 2 weeks at the Food Cupboard home: the United Church of Christ, 496 Main Street, Medfield. If you need the services of the Food Cupboard, please call us at 508-359-4958 and leave a message.

Donations of non-perishable, unopened, unexpired food items may be dropped off in the narthex. Donations of canned tuna and chicken, canned pasta, canned fruits and vegetables, cereal, peanut butter, jelly, applesauce, juice, pasta sauces, paper products (paper towels, Kleenex, and toilet paper), cleaning products, and health and beauty aids such as shampoo, toothpaste, and shaving razors or refills, are always welcome. Financial donations may be mailed to the Medfield Food Cupboard at PO Box 172, Medfield, MA 02052. Financial donations are used to supplement food contributions by purchasing meats, cheese, frozen items, and any item in short supply
