From the Minister

Fathomless Ocean of Love, ever creating the universe anew: Give us grace to go about all our doings cheerfully, Rhythmically, with hearts lifted high, knowing that no matter how troubled the surface waters of life seem to be, we are constantly upheld by your deep tides of joy.



Dear Friends,

When you read this letter it will be close to the New Year. It will be quiet, and a good time to reflect on the months just past, on our new shared ministry.

I hope that you will take some time to reach out to me or someone else in leadership soon and let us know how the church is feeling to you now, after half a year with this new minister. What are you glad about? What do you wish there was more of as you think about the future at FPUU?

I want to let you know what I will be focusing on in the New Year, in addition to the worship services and continuing to getting to know you.

- We will resume our <u>congregational</u> <u>covenant</u> conversations and gradually work our way toward a vote to possibly adopt one at the annual meeting.
- I will be beginning one or more small • groups ("covenant groups" or "chalice circles") in February. These are groups of six to ten people that meet once or maybe twice a month in gatherings that invite intimacy, allow for serious engagement with religious and spiritual topics, and lead toward expression of our principles and values in action. The intention is to obtain a balance of the personal and the thoughtprovoking. The core of the content is the group's shared life stories in response to thought provoking UU oriented themes, and the insights we draw from them. The groups are open, supportive, nurturing environments that promote and facilitate

spiritual growth and mutual, interactive care for one another. Sounds good, right?

- Our new <u>monthly outreach series</u>, "Mondays in Medfield", will begin at the end of the month with Mark Samels, executive producer of PBS' American Experience, presenting and speaking about his latest documentary "The Amish: Shunned." Come, and invite your friends!
- I will lead a three-part afternoon workshop series on forgiveness beginning Sunday January 26 at 3:00 pm. In the first session we will view and reflect on an excellent documentary about a family in which the mother's cancer has recurred, and how that effects different family members as they struggle to use their "Gift of Time" well, to forgive each other for deep pain from their shared past. (Full disclosure, my brother is a film-maker, and the family is my family.) The second workshop will involve an experiential process, called the Tree of Life, through which we explore our life, gifts and resilience. The final workshop will focus on the process of forgiveness, and what we can do to help ourselves forgive when that is what we want to do.

From the Director of Religious Education

"What Are We Waiting For?"



I don't know about your kids, but mine keep asking "How many days till Christmas?"

Meanwhile, every time I go into a store, the friendly clerk at the register asks me, "Have you finished

your Christmas shopping?"

And all the moms at school pick up ask each other, "What are you doing over the holidays?"

This time of year, Advent, is about waiting, right? But does it need to be this frenetic Let's-get-there-as-fast-as-we-can kind of waiting? And what exactly are we waiting for?

It reminds me of taking trips with kids in the car, when someone demands "Are we there yet?" every few minutes. By the time we're "there," we're all cranky!

Where is it that we need to get to in such a hurry? What's so bad about NOW? I tell my kids to enjoy the view out the car window while we're driving... they don't buy it. And you--are you skimming this so you can get to the next item in the newsletter and be done with it? Are you wondering what the point is? Or is your mind already on the next thing you need to do today, or wishing something would just be over and done with? Maybe you're one of those people who really and truly enjoy the holiday season and all it offers. But if you're like many of us, you're just wondering, "Are we there yet?"

Of course, we're NEVER "there." We're always "here." So we might practice paying attention to here, and now, and helping kids practice that too. In some ways, they are masters of being in the present moment. Other times ("Are we there yet?" "Are we there yet?" "Are we there yet?") Not so much.

Family meals are a perfect opportunity for presence. I admit to finding family meals pretty stressful, and I often just want them to be over with. But I'm trying to make dinner a time when we can slow down, light some candles, and sit, and eat, and be together, in whatever states we're in.

We do the same thing in worship: We pause whatever else we're doing in our lives. We come to the sanctuary. We come together. We remind each other of something. And it's not "Are we there yet?" It's "Here we are!"

A poem adapted from Lao Tzu:

Always we hope someone else has the answer, Some other place will be better, Some other time, it will all turn out. This is it. No one else has the answer, No other place will be better, It has already turned out. At the center of your being you have the answers, There is no need to run outside for better seeing. Nor to peer from a window. Abide* at the center of your being The more you leave it, the less you learn.

*in other words, "wait, hold still!"

My wish for each one of you is at least one moment today when you say, "There's nowhere I'd rather be." And maybe even "There's no one I'd rather be." Yes, we are there. We are here. Welcome.

Executive Board Notes

An Executive Board meeting was held on December 19, 2013

Semi-Annual Parish Meeting: In response to the favorable sense of the congregation to the presentation by the architect, David Sharff, on planning for the new U-House, we approved the second phase of the architect's work (already funded), and discussed setting up a formal capital campaign in the new year.

Installation for Reverend Meg: We approved an expense of \$1500 for the installation, to be held in March.

Financial Update for FY 14

Pledges: \$63.8K (57%) out of \$111,063 (budget) collected Fundraising: \$6K (60.6%) out of \$9.9K (budget) raised Rentals: \$5.1K (34%) out of \$15K (budget) collected Cash on hand (Rockland Trust Account): \$50.7K

New Life Home Refurnishing: Home Refurnishing will be moving to bigger accommodations in Walpole in January; a date will be set soon for First Parish to volunteer.
