From the Minister

Dear FPUU folks,

Perhaps for you, as for me, it's easy to feel like there is so much to do, so many matters to attend once the beginning of December rolls around.

Perhaps, like you, I look at the growing list and am tempted to completely throw myself into all the business to which my name is attached.

Thankfully, my two office windows face a beautiful green space and mill pond. When I look up, I see leaves drift down in the sunlight and cold breezes, and dance across the grass as the wind picks up.

These remind me: no amount of doing makes me a better person or minister.

One of my joys in this month, or any month, is remembering to touch that place in myself where I connect to what is so much bigger than my little self and bigger than anything I can imagine or name. I touch this when touch within myself a deep sense of belonging in this world, an almost fierce appreciation for the gifts of life and beauty that are so utterly interconnected with each other and my own brief existence. So this month I share with you a poem that helps me to touch those two things.

Written on Christmas Eve, 1513

I salute you. I am your friend, and my love for you goes deep.

There is nothing I can give you which you have not. But there is much, very much, that, while I cannot give it, you can take.

No heaven can come to us unless our hearts find rest in it today.

Take heaven!

No peace lies in the future which is not hidden in this present little instant.

Take peace!

The gloom of the world is but a shadow. Behind it, yet within our reach, is joy. There is radiance and glory in darkness, could we but see.

And to see, we have only to look. I beseech you - look!

Life is so generous a giver. But we, judging its gifts by their covering,

cast them away as ugly or heavy or hard. Remove the covering, and you

will find beneath it a living splendor, woven of love by wisdom, with power.

Welcome it, grasp it, and you touch the angel's hand that brings it to you.

Everything we call a trial, a sorrow or a duty, believe me, that angel's hand is there. The gift is there and the wonder of an overshadowing

presence.

Your joys, too, be not content with them as joys. They, too, conceal diviner gifts.

Life is so full of meaning and purpose, so full of beauty beneath its covering, that you will find earth but cloaks your heaven.

Courage then to claim it; that is all!

But courage you have, and the knowledge that we are pilgrims together, wending through unknown country home.

And so, at this time, I greet you, not quite as the world sends greetings, but with profound esteem and with the prayer that for you, now and forever, the day breaks and shadows flee away.

From the Director of Religious Education

Love in the face of fear



At the November meeting of the First Parish UU Youth Group, we watched *Bowling for Columbine*, a Michael Moore documentary about America's relationship with guns.

As the youth noted, there were a few stereotypical "gun nuts"/conspiracy theorists/anti-government activists interviewed. But the film went much deeper than that, asking important questions about why some Americans are so attached to guns and to the Second Amendment "right to bear arms." There were some typical looks at the role of the media and the glorification of violence, and the role of violent video games, but then there some more surprising explorations: for example, the killers in the Columbine High School massacre did play a lot of violent video games, but on the morning of the shooting,

they actually went bowling. Also, while gun violence is much lower in countries where fewer people own guns (like in Europe and Japan), it is also much lower in countries where many people own guns, like Canada.

To me, the most interesting part of the film was a comparison of the culture of fear and distrust of neighbors in the US vs. the culture of 'no locked doors' in Canada. Even in Canadian cities, where populations are racially and socioeconomically diverse, there seems to be less fear of "the other." Is it that the US was founded upon individualism and freedom and their Bill of Rights (including the Second Amendment) above all else? Is it that we are a more violent and aggressive (and thus also a more fearful and defensive) society? (The film showed lots of footage of Americans invading, bombing, and otherwise getting involved in violent ways in other countries.) Are we so oriented towards our own success and our own "stuff" and our own safety that we are more concerned with protecting those things than with making the world safer and healthier for others?

The film didn't ultimately answer these questions, nor did we, in our discussion. But it was a really important conversation, one that I think we should be having. In what ways does our culture promote fear, competition, and greed? In what ways does it promote trust, cooperation, and generosity? What is our role as Unitarian Universalists? As parents? As citizens? How can we practice love and care even when some of our impulses and habits are selfish and defensive, when fearmongering is rampant, when it's so much easier to withdraw and seek refuge in our little corners or circles or comfort zones? Are there really such places of refuge, anyway, when we all share this environment, this internet, this human brain and body, this time in history, and whatever legacies we are leaving for future generations?

Do we dare to care for each other's children and great-grandchildren the way we care for our own?

This is our path to walk, in faith.



From the Director of Music, Eva Kendrick

To Clap or Not to Clap?



An interesting and often spirited topic of conversation that comes up frequently at the Unitarian-Universalist Musicians Network Conference is whether or not applause is appropriate during a church service after a musical piece. Some people think of the church musician as a performer who should be commended for his/her musical accomplishments, while others think that church music exists solely to complement the service, and it is therefore inappropriate to applaud during a service.

A fellow UUMN musician friend of mine refers to music during a worship service as Holy Theatre, in that many elements of church music are

similar to performance, and I think there is a good deal of truth in this. The musician expresses/plays/performs something musically while a separate audience/congregation listens. Choir "rehearsals" culminate in "performance." There are specified times during each service where nothing else is happening except music (prelude/postlude). I have occasionally caught myself saying "performance" when I really mean participation, in regards to the choir singing during a service, but I do not feel as if the word performance is completely inappropriate either. Performance implies advance preparation and a live, public realization of this preparation, just as a sermon is planned in advance and delivered in public.

Although music can touch and move us in many ways, I believe the primary difference between playing piano during a service and playing piano in a concert is the fact that church music is functional. Its function is to complement the service, whether to complement the message of the sermon, the theme of the service, and/or to offer a moment of musical meditation or reflection. Music may touch a listener emotionally and it may augment or underscore the listener's spiritual journey.

I have been moved when on occasion the congregation has burst into spontaneous applause after a song sung beautifully by the choir—the first time the choir sang "When I First Came In," the first hymn I wrote and dedicated to this church, stands out in my mind, for example. Other times, I am happy when a meditative piece sung by the choir settles into a peaceful silence. I'm sure each of us has experienced moments in our lives when we burst into spontaneous applause and other moments where we applauded only because others around us were applauding. I understand that appreciation of music can be experienced and demonstrated in many ways, and I encourage you to experience your enjoyment of music in whatever way feels most natural to you.

An Executive Board meeting was held on November 20, 2014

New monthly book discussion club after Sunday Service: Rev. Meg reported that the first book club meeting was held on Nov. 16 after the church service.

Mondays at UU Medfield: The Green Sanctuary held a well attended panel on proposed legislation for a carbon tax in the Massachusetts legislature.

Formation of "Capital Project Feasibility Task Force:" The task force has been formed to explore the range of capital funds that the church can reasonably expect to raise in recognition of the need for the church to have religious education/administrative/rental space that is safe, accessible and energy efficient. Four members of the task force were voted on by the board - Dan Bibel, Duncan Glover, Darline Lewis and Glen D'Abate. Dan and Darline talked with the board about their plans for talking with other UU churches that have recently completed capital campaigns/building projects, and exploring potential options for financing.

Vision Statement - We discussed the results of the two congregational meetings on the vision statement. The vision statement and plans for developing a mission will be discussed at the Semiannual meeting, scheduled for Sunday, December 7 at 11:30am in the sanctuary.

FPUU Yard Sale: The yard sale was scheduled for Saturday, March 14, 2015 with set-up on Friday, March 13.

Our next board meeting will be Thursday, December 18 at 7:30

Committee on Shared Ministry (COSM)

Many of you will remember the Committee on Ministry (COM) that existed several years ago here at First Parish. This committee met periodically with the minister to listen, provide support, and gather feedback from the congregation. Since that time, the understanding of how such a committee can best serve a faith community has evolved. Now, the UUA has expanded the function of the COM to serve the overall health and well-being of the entire congregation and to strengthen the quality of the shared ministry (committees, staff, lay leaders, members, and minister).

The UUA recommends that all churches have an active Committee on Ministry. Last spring the Executive Board appointed four members (Terry Ballantyne-Ballard, Kay Bennett, Fred Bunger and David Temple) to serve on FPUU's reconstituted COM.

The COM has been meeting regularly with Rev. Meg since then, defining its role and developing a meaningful charter. This included participating in a UUA webinar, studying UUA policies, and consulting with neighboring UU churches. On November 20, the Executive Board approved the charter for the Committee on *Shared* Ministry (following this article).

Why the new name? The committee members and Rev. Meg decided an expanded title would better reflect that the committee exists to serve all church parties in a shared ministry where everyone has a role in furthering our mission. The COSM encourages direct communication and collaboration between members, staff and minister. This function is especially important when concerns and issues arise to prevent triangulation and misunderstanding. A process will be followed for promoting open dialogue when issues need to be addressed.

Please contact any COSM member with your questions, concerns or suggestions. The COSM looks forward to working together with the congregation to support a strong, thriving faith community.

CHARTER FOR THE COMMITTEE ON SHARED MINISTRY

Adopted by the FPUU Executive Board on 11/20/14

Establishment

There is hereby established a Committee on Shared Ministry (COSM) for the First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church of Medfield.

Role of the COSM

The COSM is a small group of First Parish Members whose goal is to foster, model and deepen healthy relationships with and among congregants, the minister, program staff, and committees. The COSM exists

to serve the overall health and well-being of the entire congregation and to strengthen the quality of the shared ministry by:

- 1. promoting and enhancing direct, open, respectful communication when concerns and challenges exist within the minister/congregation relationship or in any congregational relationships
- 2. assessing and supporting the various ministries (outreach, fellowship, pastoral care, worship, religious education, social action, small groups and others) of the church, including both ministerial and congregational roles. This will include conducting a performance evaluation of the minister to be shared with the Executive Board
- 3. acting as a feedback path to the minister, as appropriate
- 4. functioning as a sounding board for both the minister and the congregation
- 5. assisting the minister in developing plans for professional development and sabbaticals

Trust, integrity, and confidentiality are essential to the work of this committee.

Committee Structure, Membership, and Terms

The COSM shall consist of four members with staggered three-year terms. No member may serve more than two consecutive terms. The members of the COSM and the minister shall jointly submit nominees to fill vacancies on the COSM, and said nominees shall be appointed to the COSM by majority vote of the Executive Board. No member shall serve concurrently on both the Executive Board and the COSM. The members of the COSM shall select a committee member to serve as chair. The Executive Board shall appoint one member of the Executive Board to serve as its liaison to maintain communication with the COSM.

Committee Meetings

The COSM shall meet monthly during the Church year, and shall have a written agenda. The COSM shall meet in the presence of the minister except in those instances where it is mutually agreed in advance that the minister need not be at the meeting. All discussions held within each meeting shall remain confidential unless otherwise agreed by all members and the minister. When appropriate, the COSM shall devote a portion of its meetings to invite members of the congregation and/or staff to present concerns or offer input and updates on matters concerning the overall ministry of the church.

Process and Procedures

The COSM shall develop a process for reviewing all the ministries of the church on a regular basis with the goal of enhancing communication, trust and collaboration. The COSM shall promote reconciliation and the resolution of any conflicts and disagreements through direct consultation between the parties. When necessary, the COSM shall facilitate the discussion of disagreements that cannot be resolved through direct consultation. The COSM shall develop and publicize a written process for addressing such conflicts and disagreements between the minister and members, or within the membership of the congregation.

Inaugural Theodore Parker Lecture

UUs and their guests are invited to honor the legacy of theologian and activist Theodore Parker, the bold 19th-century proponent of social justice. Our speaker, Rabbi Brian Walt, was a student activist in South Africa, worked with Rabbis for Human Rights in Israel, and was a founder of Rabbis for Human Rights North America. He is a member of the Rabbinical Council of Jewish Voice for Peace and is rabbi emeritus of Congregation Mishkan Shalom, an activist synagogue that he founded in Philadelphia. Rabbi Walt will address why Israel-Palestine is an issue that must engage all of us, despite the difficulties, despite the controversies.

This will be the first in a series of annual lectures that feature clerics or theologians whose work reflects Theodore Parker's drive to bend the arc of the moral universe towards justice.


