Executive Board Notes

An Executive Board meeting was held on September 18, 2014.

Financial Update:

FY 15 - at 22% through the fiscal year:
Pledges: \$30.1K (23.6%) out of \$127.7K (budget) collected
Fundraising: \$.8K (8%) out of \$9.7K (budget) raised
Rentals: \$2K (18%) out of \$11K (budget) collected
Cash on hand (Rockland Trust Account): \$34K

Clerk Position: The board was pleased to welcome Darline Lewis, who has accepted the position of clerk until the end of the church year.

Mondays at UU Medfield: Plans are underway for four Mondays at UU Medfield over the course of the church year. The first will be October 20: a presentation led by Fritz Fleischmann of the Green Sanctuary Committee on proposals.

New Education Center Feasibility Task Force:

The New Education Center Committee was chartered by the Executive Board in 2012 "to request architects' quotations to provide the following: (1) an approximate cost estimate to raze the existing U-House and replace it with a new educational center; (2) preliminary design of the new center; and (3) an architectural rendering of the new center." Now there are questions to be addressed in terms of the size, cost and phase-in possibilities before embarking on a major capital campaign. The Board discussed a charter for a Capital Project Assessment Task Force to assess questions of financial feasibility and alternative building plans.

Vision - We agreed to meet Wednesday, October 1 at 7:30 in the U-house for a 2 hour discussion of a vision for the church, in order to work on goal #1 for the EB - "Develop a vision for the church, by the November EB meeting."

and discussing a lot of movies (a UU curriculum called "Popcorn Theology"), eating food, and talking about sex: in particular, Our Whole Lives (OWL) for 10th-12th graders. While many UU congregations offer 7th-9th grade OWL (as we will also, this year), fewer offer the high school class. So we will have at least one participant from a neighboring congregation.



There's also the possibility of going to a youth conference together later in the year.

Whatever happens will largely be because the teens make it happen. They will be taking responsibility for everything: bringing snacks and chalice lighting words, reserving space in the vestry, putting announcements in the newsletter, "liaising" with the Executive Board, making sure there are movies and some way to watch them. (They've already raised money to help FPUU purchase a projector!) They will have the opportunity to facilitate the group on different nights. Ideally, the adults will be there only in an advisory role (and to plunge the kitchen sink when it gets stopped up with spaghetti).

10th-12th grade OWL will meet once a month and Youth Group will also meet once a month. So every other Sunday at 7 pm, high school youth will be gathering at FPUU.

Offerings for High School Age People



Our Whole Lives for 10-12th graders will meet every month. This sexuality education curriculum is facilitated by trained adults and is open to our congregation and our larger community. The sessions are Sundays at 7:00 pm starting on September 28th. There is a parent orientation on September 28th at 6 pm.

Our Whole Lives for 7-9th grade age youth will meet 2-3 times a month. This sexuality and spirituality curriculum, first offered at First Parish 10 years ago, provides our young people with the tools and information to "live their values." Starting Sunday, October 26th at 7:00 pm with a parent orientation on October 19th.

OWL is open to the community.

YOUTH GROUP

Youth Group for grades 10-12, will also meet monthly, alternating with OWL. The Group has chosen "popcorn theology" as a main focus.



Specific movies will be viewed and discussed for their spiritual content. During Medfield Day, our youth and their friends raised \$650 for an HD projector for First Parish and especially for popcorn theology!

Notes from the Music Director Eva Kendrick



I am excited to announce that I will be writing a monthly music-related column for the church newsletter this year. I was inspired by my experiences in the Music Leadership Certification Program (MLCP) to make this one of my yearly goals.

Last year, I conducted an online Music Survey for one of my MLCP courses. About 30% of members at FPUU Medfield responded, and I found the answers fascinating and inspiring, so I wanted to share these survey results with you for my first newsletter article.

I had asked for your favorite hymns. The favorite hymns were the ones set to the Finlandia tune ("We Would Be One" and "This Is My Song") which ranked first, "Spirit of Life" which was second, and "Dark of Winter" and "Blue Boat Home" which tied for third. With typical UU independent spirit, there were 20 hymns with only one vote apiece. There was a preference for familiar hymns, and one or two members suggested practicing the hymns before the service or a hymn sing-along.

When polled what style of music members would like to hear included more in services, most people indicated jazz/blues followed by folk music and classical. Most were happy with the current

balance of organ and piano. Most respondents said they would like to hear the choir sing during services more often. Some of the favorite choir anthems included pieces I have written, "Shalom Chevarim" and "Sing We Now of Christmas."

Musical fundraisers topped the musical event list with 20 votes, and a musical Coffee House was second with 14 votes. For concerts at FPUU Medfield, a Guest UU Musician or Folk Group was preferred (14 votes each), a jazz concert or a cappella concert second (12 votes), a pianist/organist third (11 votes), and classical or cabaret/showtunes fourth (10 votes).

The topic of how people preferred to experience the prelude and postlude has come up during several Worship & Music Committee meetings, but I don't know that a formal poll has ever been conducted before this quiz. A slight majority of respondents (11 people) voted that everyone should be free to come and go as they please; 10 people preferred moments of quiet reflection after the service, and 5 voted for quiet reflection before the service.

Some of my conclusions about the survey are as follows: we are a very independent-minded congregation with many different opinions and tastes in music. We know that respect and consideration is due to others but we enjoy freedom as well. We enjoy familiarity in hymns, and many of us do not feel confident as singers but

would not mind stretching our boundaries a bit in a comfortable setting.

There were quite a number of kind comments in appreciation of the music I provide at First Parish, and there were many thoughtful comments on each topic. I greatly appreciate the time and effort it took for you to respond, and I hope to be able to incorporate many of your suggestions in the services. Don't be surprised if you come in to a jazz prelude on the piano or if you are invited to a hymn sing-along. I value all of your input and hope that in reading this you will come to learn a little more about one another as well.

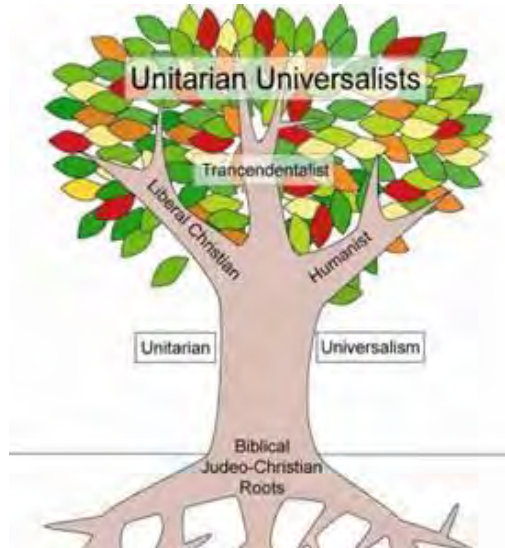

From the New Education Center Committee



The New Education Center Committee met on Monday September 22, 2014 to review Architect David Sharff's ongoing work, and to establish next steps to complete his work. Mr. Sharff's proposal in two phases is given as follows:

Phase 1: Programming:

- Work with planning representatives from First Parish Medfield to develop the current needs assessment and then translate that into a final working document of space usage, room size and required adjacencies.
- Site Plan Review – check compliance with Town of Medfield bylaws.

Deliverables:

- Site plan and approximate building footprint to scale.
- Up to 3 planning meetings with First Parish Medfield
- Draft a written/graphic program

Fee: \$1,800

During Phase 1, which was completed in June 2013, it was confirmed that First Parish owns two-thirds of the land behind the church.

Phase 2: Preliminary Design

Deliverables:

- Floor plans and exterior renderings, drawn to scale indicating proposed exterior materials
- Prepare approximate budget estimate.
- Preparation of final master plan.

Fee: \$5,000

To date, two alternative plans for the New Education Center have been prepared. Thanks to generous donations from members of the Congregation, sufficient funds have already been raised to execute both Phase 1 and Phase 2 of Mr. Sharff's work.

Plan 1 and Plan 2

The two alternative plans (Plan 1 and Plan 2) are shown below, wherein each is approximately 6000 square feet in size, at an estimated cost of approximately \$300/square foot. These plans have been prepared to meet the following objectives:

- (1) Meets the needs of our present Members and Friends as well as the needs of future Members and

Friends for generations to come.

- (2) Is Barrier Free, so that all of our Members and Friends have access, regardless of their abilities or disabilities.
- (3) Is Energy Efficient and Green, to be commensurate with the goals of our Green Sanctuary Committee.
- (4) Meets the needs of our current minister and staff in support of our Mission, and will attract future ministers and staff.
- (5) Is Architecturally Commensurate with the Church Building and other structures in the Historic District

Next Steps

The Executive Board is now organizing a Capital Project Assessment Task Force, whose purpose includes the evaluation of fund raising potential and financing mechanisms to determine what the Congregation can reasonably afford, should it decide to move forward with a Capital Campaign and subsequent construction of the New Education Center.

The New Education Center Committee looks forward to the Capital Project Assessment Task Force's evaluation and recommendations. Once received, the Committee will work with David Sharff to finalize the Phase 2 Preliminary Design for presentation to the Congregation.
