From the Minister

Hi FPUU friends,

The church year has really gotten underway.

And that's just church. What about all the other things that are going on in our lives? Our culture – in work, education and recreation -- pushes us to achieve our greatest possible potential, to make sure we are doing all we can to care for those we love. Many of us end up feeling like we are constantly running, constantly busy.

But the beauty of the season here in New England beckons us to something else. These days, in which bright yellow, orange and red leaves rustle in the breezes under vivid blue skies, large acorns fall with a *thunk* from the oak trees, and squirrels scurry to find places to store the best ones... the beauty of these days invites us to put aside the busyness that fills our lives, and to pause, and come back to what is right here, right now.

How many of us check work email again and again in the evening, on the weekends? How many of us have long lists of projects we carry around with us in our heads or on paper? How many of us feel guilty if we aren't getting those things done, feel like we are being *lazy* if we stop running for a few minutes? And for me, the worst part isn't that our bodies are constantly on the go, but that our *minds* are.

One of my favorite Buddhist teachers, Thich Nhat Hanh, writes that 'We are here, but we are not', because our minds are filled with thoughts and emotions about the future or the past. Regret, fear, anxiety, joy, satisfaction, all these come and go, and go and come, and with them come and go thoughts about why we are having the feelings. As a result, most of the time we are not here, but skipping ahead into the future, or paddling around n past.

If we can heed the season's invitation to pause now, we harvest many gifts. We get to rest deeply. We are nourished. We get to bring our bodies and our minds back together by setting aside that mental busyness that hides us from what is here now, and coming back to the present.

Finally, coming back to the present moment gives us the opportunity to find the peace or joy that each moment might contain.

Somewhere in the very completely present present that each of us experiences, when we can slide beneath all the thoughts and feelings about the future and the past, there is some peace.

It's so very hard when the emotions are very strong, though.

And it's made even more challenging for us to get beneath the thoughts and emotions because as westerners we are brought up to equate who we are with those very thoughts and feelings. So getting beneath them seems rather alien.

But if the moment is right for you, I invite you to try it. You start by just saying yes to our beautiful New England fall, connecting in a focused and open way to some part of the immediate natural beauty that lives around you, letting thoughts and emotions pass through you as you focus your awareness on something in front of you.

Being in and attentive to nature was an important part of our Unitarian ancestors efforts to become better people through "self-cultivation." For Ralph Waldo Emerson,

apprehending nature directly in an almost mystical, non-verbal way, meant connecting with *reality*, and this was important because it was our direct connection to reality that meant we could know what was right and trust that knowledge.

beings innately have a sense of what is right and what is wrong, but how many of us knew that by immersing ourselves in the beauty of Fall, we would be building our capacity to know what is truly good and right in the world? How nice – take that, internal critic who would judge my walk in the park as lazy!

Like Emerson, many of us believe that human Mary Oliver says it so well.

"Around me the trees stir in their leaves and call out, "Stay awhile." The light flows from their branches.

And they call again, "It's simple," they say,
"and you too have come
into the world to do this, to go easy, to be filled
with light, and to shine."

Executive Board Notes

• At its October 15 meeting, the Board finalized plans for the congregational retreat on November 1 (12-2, in the vestry), which will be led by Mary Corthell.

At this retreat, we hope to finalize the mission statement (the "what") and then brainstorm about the building blocks for a strategic plan (the "how"). It is important that we get as much participation from the congregation as possible, so that we can proceed with a large consensus.

Our congregation, through our historians Dan Bibel and David Temple, has been offered the opportunity to have some of our early church records digitized, under an existing grant, with the actual records to be cataloged and archived at the Congregational Library and Archive in Boston. The documents in question pertain to the history of our church from the late 17th to the early 19th century and include many interesting statements of faith, which for a long time were required for full membership in the (then) congregational church of First Parish. Pending final disposition of some ownership questions (some documents are in the possession of the Medfield Historical Society), the Board voted unanimously to support this project.

 Other projects discussed at our meeting included: the creation of a centralized online calendar, to facilitate planning of events and reservation of space; the possible creation of a fundraising committee; the report on fair compensation to be presented at the semi-annual meeting in December. Various other items are in the early stages of discussion – more updates to follow when there is more to report!

FPUU members and friends are encouraged to contact any COSM member if they have ideas, positive feedback or concerns about the minister or ministries/committees in the church. The COSM member will listen non-judgmentally, make observations, and encourage direct communication with the involved parties. The COSM cannot be the messenger but will accompany anyone if additional support is required. In lieu of the ideal direct communication, active listening from a COSM member can prove helpful. Please don't let concerns fester or snowball. Contact anyone on the COSM. It's all part of being a member of our church family.

As outlined in the charter, the COSM is also responsible for assisting ministries/committees in a supportive, self-assessment process. The assessment goals are to celebrate the hard work and success of all our hardworking members and to increase quality or capacity wherever possible or applicable. The Committee on Shared Ministry will invite two ministries each year for review on a rotating basis starting this fall.
