From the Minister

Dear FPUU friends,

I hope that each one of you had a restful Thanksgiving in the company of people and animals you care about, in places that remind you of how much you are loved. Thanksgiving feels like the peaceful oasis in the race through the desert of the holiday season. I hope that you can keep the oasis feeling with you and really enjoy your chances to visit and to give and receive in so many different ways over the next few weeks.

Thanksgiving is always a welcome respite, but this year it felt more sharply demarcated than usual, perhaps because of the Paris attacks before and the Planned Parenthood attack afterwards. This moment is also fraught with meaning for our world because of the international climate conference starting in Paris.

On a local level, our role in each of these situations is small but, together with others' actions, can make a real difference. Many of us are active in

related issues, but that raises the question of what the role of the church in situations like these.

The church is here to help each person find an oasis of spiritual growth and support so that we can live in the world as best we can in accord with our shared values. But to do that effectively, we need to do more than support our members. We need to articulate our shared *core* purpose, a mission that can guide our institutional actions in the world as well as toward each other, so that we can have greater impact.

FPUU articulated its' mission before, but a mission needs to be reexamined every three to five years according to the Unitarian Universalist Association, so that it reflects the current realities of members, the surrounding community and the greater world. Accordingly, for the past year the executive board has been working with the congregation to do just this.

Early in December we will have our semi-annual meeting, to which all are invited. There we will vote on the draft mission statement that the executive board, working with many of you over that year, arrived at. I hope, and the executive board hopes, that after that meeting we will have a mission that truly reflects the deepest

commitment of the church's members in today's world. Having it will guide our actions, priorities and focus. Having it will help us live out our shared values more effectively. If we were sitting around the Thanksgiving table together, I'd raise my cup and say "Here's to focused goals and shared purposes, to bringing our values more fully alive in the world as it is today!"

I look forward to seeing you at church. Many blessings! Rev. Meg

Semi-Annual Meeting First Parish Unitarian Universalist Medfield, MA

December 6, 2015 at 11:30 AM

The Executive Board hereby notifies all voting members of First Parish Unitarian Universalist Medfield of the Semi-Annual Parish Meeting, to be held in the Sanctuary of First Parish at 11:30am on Sunday, December 6, 2015. A quorum of 25 percent of Full Members eligible to vote at the time of posting of this notice must be present to conduct the business of the Congregation. This translates to approximately 26 members.

In accordance with the Church Bylaws of First Parish Medfield (approved on June 3, 2012) in Article 4.2, the Semi-Annual Meeting is described as follows:

Article 4 - ANNUAL AND SPECIAL PARISH MEETINGS

Article 4.2 Midyear Meeting

Article 4.2.1 <u>Time and Place</u>: A semi-annual Parish meeting is held in the fall between the first day of November and the last day of December.

Article 4.2.2 <u>Purpose</u>: The semi-annual Parish meeting shall be held to update the Congregation on the status of the Church at the time of the meeting and conduct any other business as determined by the Executive Board.

The following topics will also be addressed at the Semi-Annual Meeting:

- Financial update from the Treasurer
- Introduction of the newly formed "Committee on Shared Ministry" and brief description
- Update on new "Capital Project Feasibility Task Force" re: Potential New Education Center
- Update on Vision/Mission
- Addressing any other business that may be put forward by those present

We will convene right after an abbreviated coffee hour. The meeting should last about one hour. Childcare will be provided.

Notes from the Executive Board

Dear Friends:

As many of you know, Eva Kendrick is starting her much-deserved sabbatical on December 15 (fear not – she has promised to return on May 1, 2016!). Earlier this fall, the Executive Board created an adhoc search committee for an interim music director, led by David Temple and including Becca Kornet, Shirley Riga, Susan Stromgren, and Rev. Meg. Last Sunday, we met with Vinh Pham, a graduate of the Longy School of Music and of Emerson College, for an interview and brief recital in our sanctuary. All who heard him agreed that Vinh would be an excellent choice for the role, and I am happy to report that he has accepted our offer.

Please join us in welcoming Vinh when he joins us for Eva's last performance and choir rehearsal this year on Sunday, December 13 – and in thanking David and the search committee for a job well done!

Following our congregational mini-retreat on November 1, the Board has reflected on where were on our journey toward an updated mission and strategic plan. Our conclusion: while we are ready to present the new mission statement for a congregational vote at the upcoming semi-annual meeting on December 6, more work needs to be done by the Board before we can ask members of the congregation to join us for the next round of discussion. We have therefore postponed the follow-up retreat planned for December (I had

asked you to hold the date) to the next year (date to be determined), and have instead agreed to meet for another Board retreat on January 10. I will keep you posted as this discussion goes forward.

Many of the participants on November 1 expressed a desire for more informal fellowship among members and friends, for socializing, for camaraderie, for getting-to-know-each-other opportunities, preferably over food! Therefore, we are hoping to start a new series of informal inhome dinners in the New Year, a way of getting together that (I am told) was very successful some 15 years ago. It sounds like an old tradition that is worth reviving! We imagine friendly groups of 6-8 persons, talking to each other, about themselves and the world – not necessarily about anything related to First Parish (and certainly not about fundraising). And to cut down on the work for the hosts, the new incarnation will be in the form of potlucks – hosts will only be expected to provide a table and clean dishes. For families with young children, babysitting will be provided at the vestry. Please tell us what you think about this! At the semi-annual meeting, we will ask for volunteers to form a small ad-hoc organizing committee for the first half of 2016.

CONCERT DESCRIPTION

Musicians from the Medfield community will perform holiday and community-themed works to benefit the New Life Home Refurnishing non-profit organization in Walpole. New Life Home Refurnishing provides gently used furniture and household items to people in need in the surrounding communities who have lost homes to fires or floods, to veterans of war, and to people who have been homeless.



Concert pianist David McGrory, a resident of Medfield, is featured on this program and will perform three movements from Liszt's dazzling *Wienachsbaum*. McGrory is a Belfast-born pianist who began studies at the age of four. In 1998 he won the piano division and was an overall concerto finalist at the RTA Musician of the Future competition in Dublin. He has been a finalist at the Blacktie National Piano competition in Ireland, the Concerto Competition at the Longy School of Music, and an Honors Competition winner at New England Conservatory. McGrory is also a musical director for various Boston musicals and a composer as well. He recently released his debut CD, *Beethoven & Bizet: Variations*.

Other performers include the First Parish Medfield Choir, who will perform a work by composer and First Parish Medfield Music Director Eva Kendrick; Meg Fisher, a Medfield resident who performs with Boston Cecilia; Thea Iberall and Mary Corthell, who will read poetry; professional vocalists Becca and John Kornet; the Trills 'n Chills vocal



group, made up of middle and high school students from the Eva Kendrick Voice Studio; Sing-Off winners Cole Foster and Matthew McGrory—and much more!

This concert is organized by First Parish Medfield Music Director Eva Kendrick and supported by the Green Sanctuary Committee at First Parish Unitarian Universalist of Medfield, which raises consciousness about environmental issues and generates commitment to community action and sustainable living. First Parish Medfield frequently hosts musical fundraisers, including a concert by San Francisco Opera Bass-Baritone William O'Neill and three original dramatic works written by Kendrick: *Emily*, a chamber opera based on the life of Emily Dickinson; *Le Bistro Café* which was presented as a dinner theatre; and *Operator*, a touching story about telephone operators in the 1950s, which received its world premiere at First Parish Medfield in May 2015.

At this time of thanksgiving, we are grateful for the manifold blessings of Creation and the new energy among people of faith to raise our voices on issues of climate change and social justice.

The MA Interfaith Coalition for Climate Action continues the campaign for an energy policy that meets our moral obligations for a clean, just energy future here in Massachusetts. 

All Church Read



Let's read a book and talk about it! Our common read will be the extremely well reviewed <u>Between the World and Me</u> by Ta-Nehisi Coates, and we will meet on January 31 after the service to discuss the book.

Mr. Coates is a black author who writes beautifully about the hazards and hopes of black male life. Between the World and Me is written in the form of a letter to a black teenage boy. The boy is Coates's 15-year-old son, who is trying to make sense of blatant racial injustice and come to grips with his place in a world that refuses to guarantee for him the freedoms that so many others take for granted.

"I write you in your 15th year," Coates states in the early pages. "And you know now, if you did not before, that the police departments of your country have been endowed with the authority to destroy your body. . . . I tell you now that the question of how one should live within a black body, within a country lost in the Dream, is the question of my life."
