The Parson's Packet David W. Chandler, Interim Minster



Dear friends,

Where do we come from? Who are we? Where are we going?

You have probably sung this song in worship. The questions are the central mysteries of life. They also focus the transition time we call interim ministry. FPUU has already entered this time, in which I now join you for the next two years.

An Interim Minister is and should be a minister in full to each member and friend. I look forward to sharing your joys and sorrows, your accomplishments and disappointments, your dreams and fears, the events great and small of

your life. They are no less important to me just because my time with you will be limited. I will care for and about you each day.

As a gathered religious community – a visionseeking people – there are some protocols to the interim relationship. We do work together on those three big questions, and remembering that central purpose will help us stay on track. This is crucial: The answers must be your answers. A settled minister says "we," but I am required to say "you." That reminds everyone this work is ultimately your privilege and responsibility. I will quide and assist by asking the big three questions in many different ways, but the invitation is for you to talk to each other. You will share things you know. If the process works properly – I believe it will – you will also discover things you may not know, or not know fully, about your past, present and future as a congregation.

All congregations do some things well – often many things well. Are they the right things? Are there things we could do better? Are there

things that should be let go? What are the best opportunities within our reach? These are also key questions as we seek to worship and welcome and serve our communities.

We will work out the answers that make sense to you. The right answers for FPUU are the only ones that matter. Gaining that knowledge will sometimes be challenging, as true knowledge always is. It will also be fun, illuminating and inspiring. Here's to our journey of discovery.

2016-2017 Youth Offerings - open to FP youth and friends from the larger community



Our Whole Lives 8/9 Grade (JOWL)

This comprehensive sexual education curriculum, developed by the UUA and the UCC, offers age appropriate lessons and activities to include the values and attitudes of our 7 principles while reinforcing respect and compassion for the spectrum of people in our world. Role playing, values voting, and guest speakers add to the fun! The group will meet 1 to 2

Sundays/month from 7-9 pm and is facilitated by Cissy Hull-Allen and Chris Conley, both certified in OWL 7-12. JOWL parent orientation will be in October.

Our Whole Lives, 10-12 Grade (HOWL)

The high school aged Our Whole Lives expands the life skills and activities and is more group directed in activities. Following the OWL curriculum and supplementing with other resources, this group meets one Sunday a month from 7-9pm. HOWL will begin in October.

Youth Group, 10-12 Grade

The youth group is for young people in 10 grade and up. Meeting once a month, usually on a Sunday evening. Group driven, past activities have included service projects, movies, rock climbing, "slumber" parties, debates -and food! Youth Group will begin on September 25th at 7pm.

Gentle Reminder regarding Little Lights....



Little Lights, childcare during the Sunday services (9:45-11:15) for kids not yet in first grade, will be provided again this year during all services. We know it's difficult to keep RE-aged kids entertained during intergenerational services when there is no RE, but we ask that you please refrain from sending your kids downstairs; there end up being a lot more of them than

there are babysitters and it is easy for the situation to become out of control. We have a combination of veteran Little Lights babysitters and some newcomers, all of whom are certified in basic first aid. It is the parent or guardian's responsibility to make sure the child is signed in and out on the clipboard located with our babysitters in our area in the vestry. Please help us keep our area clean. If your child is still playing after 11:15, after the sitters have cleaned up and are preparing to leave, it is the caretaker's responsibility to make sure the space is left tidy. Thank you!

It's been a fantastic summer, the hottest June on record, and July the hottest month ever. The year 2016 will likely be the hottest year on record, according to NASA. While El Nino is partially adding to the heat, scientists place the blame on human activity. Bill McKibben says we are under attack by the climate and our only hope is to mobilize at the national level. Many of us at First Parish are trying to make sure we are part of the solution and not the problem.

Last year, the Green Sanctuary Committee worked hard at the local and systemic levels and joined with others. This interfaith work is paying off. This week the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court rejected public subsidies for fossil fuels.

Our agenda for the GS Committee is to continue doing and participating: promoting the anti-idling law and reducing our carbon footprint. Donations of non-perishable, unopened, unexpired food items may be dropped off in the narthex. Donations of canned tuna and chicken, canned pasta, canned fruits and vegetables, cereal, peanut butter, jelly, applesauce, juice, pasta sauces, paper products (paper towels, Kleenex, and toilet paper), cleaning products, and health and beauty aids such as shampoo, toothpaste, and shaving razors or refills, are always welcome.

Donations can be placed in the basket in the narthex. Eva Springer will take care delivering the donations to the Food Cupboard again this year.
