Dear friends,

We get spring this month. There are no guarantees on the weather, but Daylight Savings Time begins at 2 AM on Sunday, Mar. 12. Set your clock AHEAD one hour, or you'll be late for Sunday services! I usually spot folks from the pulpit, but I won't be leading worship that day, so maybe you will get lucky and nobody will notice.

The first day of spring is Mar. 20, and that will happen, also no matter what. It is a dead lock bulbs will be up, at least in the sunny spots and at least the ones that can take frost and snow. The day before, Sunday, Mar. 19, will be our Annual Fund Drive Sunday. Fill in your own church metaphor. Yes, we do come up every spring, at first in the sunny spots. Yes, we can take some frost and snow. We have to remind ourselves of this and it is also a very good time to thank everyone who makes this church happen. That

means everyone – because every member of this congregation is essential to its well-being. YOU are essential to our well-being. I hope you feel the same way about your church. Now is the time we act together to make it go for another year. If we don't, it won't.

By the time you read this, another spring will have appeared – Cindy Spring, the UUA Ministerial Settlement Representative assigned to help with our, umm, ministerial settlement. that settled a new minister last August. She will meet with your Executive Board on Feb. 25 and with the congregation at 11:30, after worship, on Sunday, Feb. 26. All members and friends are welcome. I'm excited that Cindy will speak as a layperson. She wants to explain and answer questions so well that every member feels able to consider being on the Search Committee.

This is exactly right. Search is not an "old-timer" prerogative. It is an "I care about my church" prerogative. Experience is welcome, but so is new perspective and energy. We need yours.

Notes from the Executive Board

Dear Members and Friends:



The Executive Board had its second meeting of the year on February 16.

(1) The focus of the meeting was the first draft of a new budget

for 2017-18: once again with a projected deficit and no projected contribution to the capital needs fund. We all agreed that we should make every effort this year to balance the budget and invest more to maintain our buildings. The "evergreen list" of deferred maintenance keeps growing, and we simply have to face the reality that

we need to spend more in order not to lose what we have.

This is also the year in which a new ministerial search committee will begin the work of reaching out to find us a settled minister. We need to decide on the scope of this position (full-time or less?), and figure out the best way to position ourselves as an attractive congregation. The pledges we make and the budget we will be able to vote on will be an important aspect of this positioning.

(2) Among the monthly reports on the work of our various committees, I shared some of the work that has been going on to support the Buildings and Grounds Committee, whose chair, Fred Bunger, will withdraw from this role at the end of this church year. While his shoes are impossible to fill, it had also become clear to me that those shoes are unreasonably big to begin with - the workload needs to be carried by more shoulders, by a larger committee, just as Buildings and Grounds as a whole needs more support from the congregation (on which more below). I was happy to report to the Board that Greg Beedy and Dan Bibel have agreed to serve as co-chairs for the time being and that five new members have agreed to join the existing committee (Dawn Amaral, Wesleigh Behn, Fred Bunger, David Maxson, Eve Potts, Nate Razza): Sara Drumm, Bill Harvey, John Kornet, Clayton Springer, and David Temple. My thanks to all these caring

members who have agreed, as their time permits, to help with the maintenance of our facilities, especially our historic church building.

While this gift of time is a necessary condition for our ability to maintain our place, it is by no means a sufficient condition: see item (1) above.

- (3) The Board approved the final version of our six-month appraisal for our interim minister, for submission to the UUA Transitions Office.
- (4) We continued the work of reviewing parts of our by-laws that deal with the calling and dismissal of ministers. This had been suggested by Rev. David, who was concerned that some of our present language might be a deterrent to potential candidates for settled ministry. We expect to conclude this work at our March meeting and will then distribute a proposal for discussion and consideration at our annual meeting.

If you haven't already signed up for one of the small suppers on March 11 or 18, please do so without delay. And please come to church on March 19, our Annual Pledge Drive Sunday, when Rev. David will explain his own perspective on our capacity to be a meaningful, successful and fiscally stable congregation.

2017-18 ANNUAL FUND DRIVE

We hope that you will join us for the *Annual Fund Drive* Service on Sunday March 19 and then be a part of our *Commitment Sunday* Service on April 2, wherein we will submit our pledges and renew our shared commitment to this church and the principles that bind us together.

In preparation, we invite you to reflect on First Parish and how it touches your life. Our purpose, our commitment is to be a truly loving community in which we explore our spiritual understandings while working to make the world a green, safe and welcoming place.

We know that now more than ever, our church matters in our lives. We need our relationships of sharing and caring, of reflection and inspiration, of music and words. We need our good work in the community and the world, sharing and standing up for UU values. We know now more than ever, we need each other.

Your financial support is vital. Our congregation is entirely responsible for funding the church's expenses. Here is a pledge guideline:

How Much Should You Pledge?

Your pledge in any amount is greatly appreciated. However, the UUA Fair Share Guide is a helpful resource for determining your pledge amount. The financial commitment levels in the Guide are suggestions, with a starting point of 2% of adjusted income for congregants earning up to \$1,000 per month, with giving levels rising with capacity as follows:

- Supporter: The congregation is a significant part of my spiritual and intellectual life that I want to support. My fair share financial commitment starts at 2% of my income and rises to 6% as my income and capacity rise.
- **Sustainer:** The congregation is my central community; I am committed to sustaining the programs and ministries of my congregation. My fair share financial commitment starts at 3% of my income and rises to 7% as my income and capacity rise.
- Visionary: My commitment is a clear demonstration of the unique importance of this congregation and of my spiritual principles. My fair share financial commitment starts at 5% of my income and rises to 9% as my income and capacity rise.
- Transformer: I am deeply committed to the congregation; my contribution provides fuel for transformation and is part of my spiritual practices in living out my UU Principles. My fair share financial commitment represents 10% of my income.

We believe that if all of us pledged a minimum of 2% of our household incomes we would balance our budget. Last year (2016-17), the total pledge was \$100,790 from 49 households. The average pledge was \$2,057. This year, we can balance the 2017-18 budget with \$5,000 funding of capital reserves if the average pledge is increased by 15% to \$2,366.

Green Sanctuary Committee



Martin Luther King said, "All life is connected, tied to the garment of destiny. What affects one affects all." This is the UU 7th principle: respect for the interdependent web of all existence. This is the principle upon which the UU Green Sanctuary program is based. As we all know, that web of all existence is seriously threatened. A report issued by a UMASS professor says New England is warming faster than the rest of the country and by the year 2025 – 8 years from now – our region will cross the 3.6 degree threshold. What it will mean

is the constancy of what we've experienced: frigid 5 degree temperatures and 8 inches of snow that disappears the next day in 55 degree heat. In the summer, it will mean months of days over 90 degrees. I was in Southern California experiencing days of 119 degrees. And I remember thinking, the air is no longer something to ignore. It felt like a threat, it felt oppressive, and there was nowhere to run.

There are things we can do to slow down climate change. Who will do it? The founder of the Interfaith Power and Light says, "Religious voices are going to be the agent of change." They are working with 18,000 congregations. First Parish is one of them.

The UUA began the Green Sanctuary program to raise consciousness and generate commitment to community action. Two years ago, FPUU became a Green Sanctuary Candidate with an ambitious 14-point plan. We've had much success with our projects. Our goal this year is to become a UU Green Sanctuary congregation. Another goal is to triple membership in the Green Sanctuary Committee so that the committee is too large to sit around Fritz's and Katrin's dining room table. 
