The Parson's Packet

Dear friends,

Someone neatly folded the blue index card and put it into the "Ask the Minister" basket.

There was no question written on it.

Someone else turned in a one-word query: "Why?"

And there you have the challenge and opportunity of ministry. I don't mean the professional ministry you expect from the person who holds that UUA credential. I mean the ministry we all do with each other. Your minister may facilitate and does even lead occasionally, but this larger ministry includes everybody. Its practice is all the ways you relate in the First Parish

community. It is often one-to-one and essentially personal, but it is also crucially collective. We take our cues from those around us as we solve the problems and enjoy the opportunities of living every day. This is the purpose of houses of worship, as Kenneth Patton reminds us. We gather to live together.

There are always questions – "billions and billions," as Carl Sagan famously said of the stars. The empty card is a perfect metaphor. It leaves lots of room for anything and everything. Maybe in this moment no one inquiry stands out, but it will come. We remind each other there is no inquiry that isn't worthy of our consideration and

our response. That is a human debt we owe to the worth and dignity of all other humans. Some questions are hard, some are easy, some are painful or confusing or funny, but this is what people do and questions are essential to the act of living.

And then there is, "Why?" This is the ultimate question of course. Why, indeed. It's where children usually start – they can drive us crazy but their hunger to know and understand is

the instinctive cultivation of meaning. At church we are in the meaning business as well. We need to articulate and use wise adult rules: Asking why can be inconvenient or even out of order at the moment, but it is never wrong at its heart. On good days we are likely to respond, why not? This is a profound theology. The other flippant answer – because I said so – is also a profound theology.

Why not – that's what UUs say. Best wishes, Rev. David

Religious Exploration is underway with their journey on exploring the sources of Unitarian Universalism. In the pictures, the child had been learning about the source of Wonder for UU.

The upcoming Love Will Guide Us Religious Exploration class calendar is:

October 7th: Columbus Day Weekend- NO RE CLASS. The service is not for All Generation so please let us know if you plan to attend with your children. We will have additional babysitters downstairs in the Vestry to accommodate the older (RE aged) children.

October 14th: Love in Our Congregation- We will Introduce the fourth Source of Unitarian Universalism, "Jewish and Christian teachings which tell us to love all other as we love ourselves" and explore the meaning of community, the importance of community in our lives, and the role of love in community.

October 21st: Love is Eternal - This session will introduce the sixth Unitarian Universalist Source, "Spiritual teachings of earth centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature". We will introduce Unitarian Universalist rituals, customs, and


teachings related to death and sorrow, deepen children's understanding of the cycle of life and emphasize that love lives beyond death. ***Because of the sensitive nature of this lesson we will be communicating with parents in early October regarding this session.

October 28th: All Generation Service: Day of the Dead - NO RE. Children attend the service with their family.

November 4th: We Are Loved, Flaws and All. We will discuss the first Unitarian Universalist Source, "the sense of wonder we all share" which was introduced on September 23 in the Awesome Love lesson. Today's lesson will teach that qualities which appear as faults can be turned into strengths and encourage participants to turn blemishes into beauty in their own lives. We will reinforce the idea that despite human failings we are all loved and loveable.

November 11th: Give Love- This session will introduce the second Unitarian Universalist Source, "the women and men of long ago and today whose lives remind us to be kind and fair", teach that giving time and love is more valuable than giving material objects and strengthen children's sense of community in the congregation.

November 18th: Winter Solstice Service Planning #1- The RE Class leads the annual Winter Solstice Service which this year will be held on December 16th. We will start planning the service at the November 18 session.
